**Export Shipments for March Expected to Fall Below Monthly Million Tons Goal**

Washington, March 27.—(AP)—Efforts to obtain wheat to meet export demands to hungry areas abroad this month are being hampered by difficulties in obtaining a sufficient quantity of wheat to meet export demands.

## Agreements Settle Claims With Britain

*(Continued from Page One)*

...by the other, and proceed for water of claims on which agreement was not reached.

...Transfers ownership of leasehold stocks held by British civil authorities (such things as coal, lumber and steel) and coal and stocks held by U. S. civil authorities on V. J. day.

...Does virtually the same thing as U. S. for lend-lease and reciprocal military supplies held by armed forces of both countries.

...Oil, ships and non-combatant civilians.

...British gets Title to Flavors.

...Gives Britain Title to a number of lend-lease transport planes and permits leasing of others, but provides for the return of some non-combat planes to the U. S.

...Defines the share of each country in oil stocks sent to the other under lend-lease or reciprocal aid.

...Each government may withdraw certain amounts of oil from its share for use by its military forces.

...Provides for the transfer of U. S. installations on British territory to Britain and of British installations on American territory to this country.

...Transfers to Britain with some exceptions, U. S. Army and Navy surplus property now in that country.

...Provides that each country will gift claims of its citizens resulting from the presence of troops of the other on its soil.

...As a part of the agreement, the U. S. retained a virtual "right" for an indefinite period for military use of third countries outside Britain and its colonies.

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## Deadline Is Set For Draft Action

Washington, March 27.—The Senate Military committee today set April 9 as the deadline for a vote on whether to extend the draft law and, if so, for how long.

Meantime, it will hold hearings on the need for continued induction. These probably will begin tomorrow with Selective Service, Army and Navy officials as the witnesses. Opponents will be heard.

A unanimous informal agreement on this procedure brought expressions of satisfaction from members contending both for and against a year's extension of selective service, now due to expire May 31.

## Second Magnetic Field Discovered

Moscow, March 27.—The newspaper, Evening Moscow, said today that a second magnetic field had been discovered in the Arctic region by Soviet magnetic specialists Prof. B. P. Orlov. The field is located on the northern shore of the American continent, Orlov said.

The Soviet scientist declared that the new discovery, aside from its scientific implications, presents great practical possibilities, including the development of polar flying.

## Hospitals in State Will Be Surveyed

Hartford, March 27.—The State department of health, Commissioner Stanley H. Osborn announced today, has completed plans to conduct a state-wide survey of hospitals, public health centers and their personnel.

The purpose of the survey, directed by Gov. Raymond E. Baldwin, is to provide complete information of the state's needs and qualifications to participate in proposed Federal aid to hospitals and public health centers authorized in a bill now before Congress.

The survey, Osborn said, will study population, economic, geographic and other factors bearing on the need for hospital services; determine the hospital needs of the state and draft a plan which would provide an adequate system for coordinating hospitals and public health facilities serving all parts of the state.

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**Leapfrog That Russian Walk**  
 It is an awkward way of trying to bridge a chasm in relations between nations, but the opening of British broadcasts to Russia is in all respects a leapfrog that Russian walk.

Equality of relationship between nations should mean that the ordinary people of both nations have an equal opportunity to hear and understand the point of view of the other fellow.

There are no hindrances placed around the spread of the Russian point of view. A statement from Stalin, made in Moscow, is subject to its censorship when it appears in the British and American papers or on the radio.

Equally, broadcasts from America are full of individuals, open Communists and all degrees of fellow travelers, who do nothing but spread the Russian point of view. They are neither halted for their activities, nor punished for them.

But a statement from a British or American leader is guaranteed to give in the newspapers of those nations, if it does appear, it is likely to have been censored and edited. And there is no freedom of speech inside Russia for those who might choose to espouse and defend some outside point of view. The Russian people are a friendly people, and they may be our friends. But we never know that they know the same facts we know; we can never calculate that they know the British or American side of a question.

Most of us would like to see orderly Russian rule and a just and humane Communist off-spring, coming to this country and learning to know it. 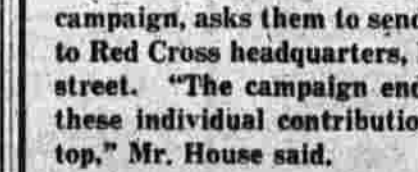

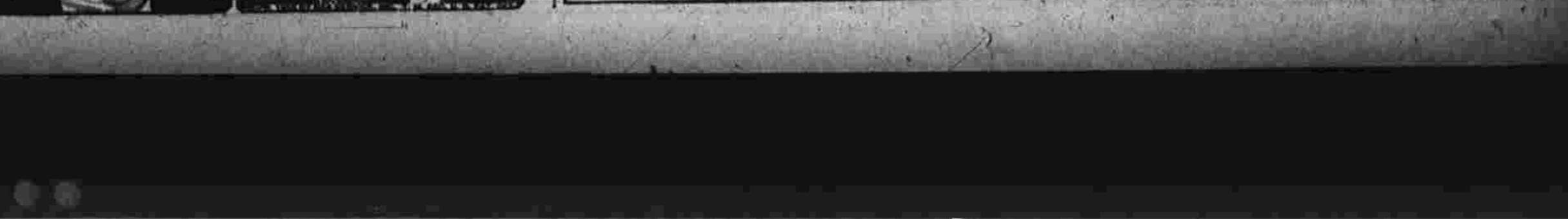
