Good Soil Starting Point for Gardens

Liming First Consideration; Limestone Easier to Handle Than Hydrated Lime

(Editorial Note)—The following starts a series on gardening prepared by the staff of the Connecticut Agricultural Experiment station and distributed by The Associated Press. The station suggests that home gardens will be an important this year as during the war the view of widespread food shortages and the need for food conservation and maximum food production pointed out by President Truman.

New Haven, April 1.—(AP)—The starting point for any successful garden is good soil, properly prepared and well managed. A good garden is a pleasure to work in and a source of delicious fresh vegetables and fruits.

The best consideration is liming. If your garden has not been limed for the past four or five years, it will be deficient in lime.

If you are planning to grow an early crop like peas, begin right away to apply the lime to that section of the garden and prepare it for planting.

Soil for planting. Soil for other vegetables can wait awhile, especially if a cover crop has been grown. The longer cover crops are allowed to grow, the more beneficial they will be: however, as a rule they should not be allowed to grow taller than 12 inches.

If a cover crop has been grown, this is a good time to put on the first application of fertilizer—at the rate of 15 pounds per 1,000 square feet of 5-10-10 or 5-10-5. Apply this directly on the rye or other green manure crop.

Apply this directly on the rye or other green manure crop. This favors spring growth and, when turned under, will hasten the decomposition of the cover crop.
