A committee will confe with the heads of the Connecticut Company and the Silver Lane Bus Lines to see if they will contribute their share of the expense of the construction of such stations, and if not, the town will proceed with plans for the construction of the ong-deferred comfort stations. Several plans for centralizing the bus routings into Manchester have been considered, some o them jointly with the State High-Traffic Commission, but noth ing definite ever came of these
