(Ist) Boyle's column today is in the form of a letter to his wife, Frances.

Rome, April 10.—Dear Frances: Well, here I am in this place where you are supposed to be, at least in the better neighborhoods. But high prices beat heavily on the low income classes who can't buy, Italy's low display and the merchants make beautiful presents of their wives.

Cars Killing People At Startling Rate

Truman Has Called Conference To Consider Problem; Deaths 45% Above Last Year

Washington, April 10.—(AP)—Take it easy with your automobile and—if you don't have a car—look out for cars.

Cars are killing people at a startling rate. It's so startling that President Truman has called a national conference to consider the problem.

The worst year in history for auto deaths was 1941. The score in that pre-war year: 40,000 Americans killed.

Deaths Estimated

What will it be in 1946? At the present rate, the National Safety Council estimates, 38,000 will be killed this year.

In January and February, a total of 6,450 were killed, or more than 45 per cent above the number killed in the same months in 1945. That rate, the council estimates, another 5,450 or so will have been killed in March and April.

And the injured in those four months? The council's estimate is 370,000.

Why the sudden spurt of deaths on the streets and highways? People have gasoline, new cars are coming and they don't tend to drive around in their old ones.

War-time controls, which called for slow driving and careful use of automobiles, are gone. But the fatalities so far this year occurred in cold months when far less cars were in use than will hit the highways now with warm weather here.

As early as last December, seeing the rising death rate, President Truman took steps to save lives by the time warm weather driving started.

He said then he wanted a conference—it's called the President's Highway Safety Conference—here in Washington May 8, 9 and 10. He named the conference chairman, who is Federal Works administrator and thus boss of the Public Roads Administration, to be conference chairman.

Governors of all the states have been invited to attend the conference as heads of their state delegations.

Those delegations will include chiefs of state police, highway and motor vehicle commissioners, various other state officials and leading representatives of groups interested in safety.

What they do will be done voluntarily back in their own states when they return from the conference.

Planning has organized, meanwhile, a committee of leaders. To study special problems.

This committee has set up a number of subcommittees to study special problems within the traffic problem.

The subcommittees will make their reports to the conference when it opens.

Hartford, April 10.—(AP)—State and municipal police stand alert throughout Connecticut today for a possible invasion of gambling syndicates from New York City.

State Police Commissioner Edward J. Hickey, leaving a meeting of the Executive Committee of Crime Prevention here yesterday, asserted that members of his department have been alerted to watch for an influx of gamblers "now that the heat is on them in New York City."

Police Chief John A. Gleason of Greenwich, president of the Connecticut Police Chiefs' association, in commenting on Hickey's announcement said:

"I'll back that to the limit. 'Unless we are watchful,' he warned, 'these gambling operators, with their big investments in equipment, may try to get a foothold in Connecticut. Our attitude toward them will be the same as it is in New York.'

At the conclusion of its meeting, the committee issued a statement in which it said that "the committee's attention has been focused on the preventative measures recently adopted in the city of New York whereby all pawn and slot machine operators have been ordered from the city of New York."

"Realizing that the operators may seek a haven in Connecticut, the committee gives due warning of that impending danger to the youth of the state, and urges that there be a strict enforcement of the laws and public alertness against these evils."
