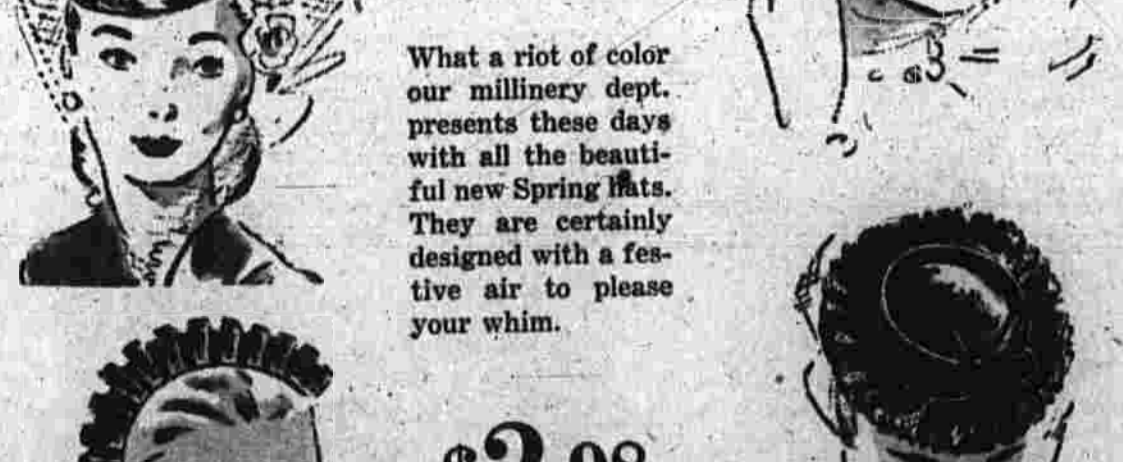

Peace Committee Unable to Settle Manchuria Crisis

Gillem Awaiting Instructions from Marshall as Fact-Finding Mission Halts Short Of Strife-Torn Area Because of Impotency

Peiping, April 13.—(AP)—Lieut. Gen. Alvan C. Gillem, Jr., disclosed today that the Sino-American Peace Committee of three, with substitutes having replaced all original members, is powerless to act in the Manchurian crisis. Gillem said he has acquainted General Marshall, whom he temporarily replaced as the American member, with the seriousness of the Manchurian situation. He is awaiting instructions from Marshall, who employed from Washington yesterday to return as President Truman's special envoy to China.

More Clothes In 3 Months Seen Certain

Conservative Party Carries Most Seats

So-Called Liberal Party Finishes With Slight Plurality Over Social Democrats in Japan

Tokyo, April 13.—(AP)—Virtually final, unofficial results from Japan's general election emphasized tonight that a heavy conservative bloc would dominate the House of Representatives which meets May 10 to consider a new constitution. With only one seat of the 406-member House to be filled, newspaper figures gave the Conservatives 141 seats, a lead of 48 over their nearest rivals, the Progressives, who also are conservatives. The Progressive membership was reduced by tonight's figures to 93.

I guess that's why I like Naples so well. You must know that anywhere except in jail, Naples is Sing Sing without walls.

mitter finally located a decrepit old woman who seemed to fit the bill. The reward being proffered him, he was very indignant.

"You mistake me for a Neapolitan," he roared. "I am a visitor from Padua."

If American eating rich meals while children and grown-ups die of starvation in many countries, American women will someday get the blame.

They are accused of having been careless about wasting food, and of not caring about the starvation in other lands so long as our own families were well-fed.

And yet, it is hard to find an intelligent woman today who doesn't think food rationing should be resumed in America.

A radio commentator recently asked the nation's housewives how they felt about the rationing. "Do you favor a return to rationing in order to save essential foods needed to feed the victims of war in other countries?" He received 4,666 letters from listeners, 3,744 of them favoring a return to rationing.

If that is how we feel, we had better go on record. It isn't enough for us just to say conversationally that we would like to see food rationing again in America for the good of the world as a whole.

**Congressmen Call for Word - by Word Account Before Copy Handed to Record**

Washington, April 13.—(AP)—What a congressman says in Congressional records is often very different from what he says in the Congressional Record. The way he said it.

Some congressmen — perhaps most of them, at one time or another—may one thing on the floor of House or Senate and then—when they call for the stenographer's report by word—word account and change it before it gets printed in the Record.

**Have Different Reasons**

They'll have different reasons for doing this. Some will be grammatical, soften up something, or change the meaning of a word. Some of them don't bother asking for the stenographer's report; they just change it themselves to clean up their grammar.

The late Senator Huey P. Long liked to scramble the language deliberately, making himself sound like a simple country boy.

He did this when he talked on the floor of the House. He didn't want it that way in the Record.

One day a sadly worried stenographer said to Senator Long: "You know, Senator, I always fix up your grammar, but today you made so many mistakes I wonder whether you did it deliberately or not."

"Sure," Long said, "but keep on taking care of my grammar. That's the way I would like it."

**Stenographers' Men**

The House has six official stenographers, and the senate six. All are men, with years of stenography behind them.

They are called reporters and can take 250 to 300 words a minute.

Each reporter works on the floor about 10 minutes of every hour. Then, back in his office, he dictates from his notes into a recording machine. The stenographer's batteries of expert typists—called transcribers—put on their typewriters, and type the reporter's dictated notes. They are called check this over, cleaning up the congressman's grammar when necessary.

If a congressman is concerned about what he said, he sends word to the reporter that he wants a copy of his talk.

**Gets Copy Within Hour**

The system is so fast that the copy—only one copy is made—within an hour of his talk.

He makes what changes he wishes and sends it back to the reporter. His altered copy is what appears in the Congressional Record.

Sometimes congressmen forget to turn in this copy, so that their words do not appear in the Record. Because it is the only copy, they have to be changed all over town, sometimes far into the night, by clerks to get the copy back.

All this copy—sometimes more than 150,000 words a day—starts coming out in public at 6:30 p. m. The deadline is midnight.

In addition to what is said on the floor, The Record carries a section called the appendix. No stenography is needed for this. Into the appendix the congressional stenographers copy poems, speeches, letters, and other material. By morning the public printer has printed the appendix. Every representative and senator has a copy of the appendix delivered to his office. Senators are allowed 100 words of appendix material. Public Can Buy The Record

Many of them send these extra copies to their constituents. The public can buy The Record, \$1.50 a month. The superintendent of documents takes the subscription.

The oldest reporter—in point of service—is James W. Murphy. He has been shortening Senate speeches 49 years. His father, before him was a Senate reporter, starting in 1860 and dying in 1916. Murphy's father's brother, Dennis Murphy, was transferred to the House in 1898. He started there as a reporter in 1898 and continued until his death in 1929.
