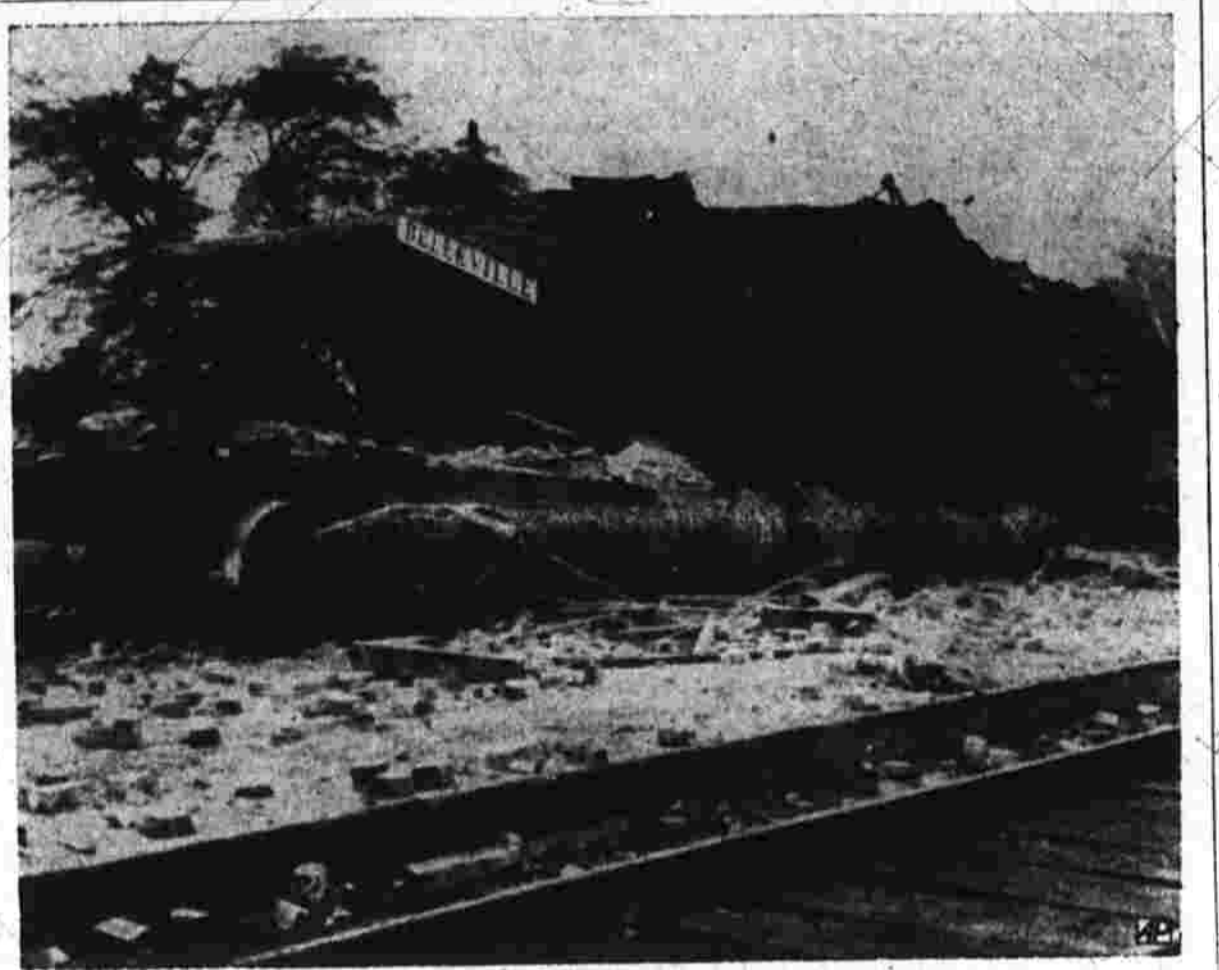

Washington, May 13.—(AP)—With negotiations apparently stalemated over John L. Lewis' welfare fund demand, Recovery Director John W. Snyder said today President Truman will use "every possible action" within his power to prevent a renewal of the soft coal strike.

Snyder's statement, which was not amplified, was contained in an Agriculture department announcement on the effects another strike would have on food production.

"There is," Colonel Gates said, "absolutely no mail inspection of correspondence at the home. Members of the home receive and send mail in the same rights and protection as any civilian."

Unable to Prove Mail Inspection

Colonel Gates said that Mr. Post had called before the committee on similar claims. Post at that time was unable to prove that the mail was being inspected.

"Men at the home," Colonel Gates said, "are assigned to work details according to their physical ability. Before being assigned to work the men are given a physical examination to determine their fitness."

For the next ten week period a box or boxes will be packed and shipped each Tuesday to the relief agency of the church from which it will be shipped overseas. A different committee will be in charge each week of the packing and shipping of the boxes. The persons in charge next week will be Mrs. Edwin Brown and Mrs. Arlyn Fauci.

Persons are invited to leave food or clothing at the church at any time, or to leave it at the home of some member of the committee who will transport it to the church. Also by calling the church it will be possible to arrange for one of the members of the committee to call for any large package of food or clothing which anyone desires to contribute. Any money given for relief purposes to this committee will likewise go directly to the National Methodist committee on overseas relief. The denominational committee shares its work and proceeds with the large international agencies sponsored by the Federal Council and the World Council of Churches.

The first regulations governing relief officers' uniforms were passed by the United States in 1917.

### No. Methodists Study Changes

Proposed Change of Location of Church Is Seen Necessary

The decision of the board of trustees of the North Methodist church to build a new edifice and reconstruct the new building on Henry street, is a radical change. The trustees have secured a good plot of land with a frontage of 300 feet and of sufficient depth to meet all requirements.

The matter of securing a new location for the church has been under advisement for some time. It is a progressive move and one that will doubtless meet with the approval of the great majority of the Methodist people. The present church building was erected more than 80 years ago. The exterior of the church has been but little changed in all those years. The interior has undergone many changes and has been brought up-to-date.

When the present church was built and for some years afterward, the Union Manufacturing Company, manufacturers of gingham, was the leading industry of the north end. This company gave employment to 300 people. In addition there was the Keeney Paper Co., just west of the church and at Buckland there was the Peter Adams Paper company which gave employment to 100 or more heads of families. These concerns have all passed into history.

The population of what used to be called Union Village has increased so rapidly, that in the old days the only people, aside from the American born, were of New and South Irish extraction. In the past 40 years the Polish and Lithuanian population has increased materially in that section of the town.

According to the survey made by the Methodists the new church to be built on Henry street will accommodate a larger proportion of the church membership. Some of the older members of the church, for sentimental reasons, will doubtless feel the loss of the church in its present site.

It is the plan of the board of trustees to utilize some parts of the present edifice in the new structure. Just how far this arrangement can be carried out has not been determined. The matter of building the new church has yet to come before the church membership for approval.

Shades Of Meaning... It is sometimes difficult to gain the exact shade of meaning in English translation. Three separate Greek words denote affection, combined love, and good will.

Standard translations of the Bible have been the King James version, made with the sanction of James I and completed in 1611; and the American Standard published in 1901.

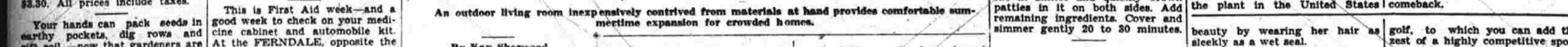
