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Half Butter Supply Tells of Pact Pledge Given

Former Reich Official Seeks to Disprove Raeder Reamed Navy

Nuernberg, Germany, May 21.—The "Hitler Youth" (Hitlerjugend) took up German history of nearly two decades ago today when a former Reich minister of interior sought to disprove that Grand Admiral Raeder secretly reamed the Navy even under the Weimar republic.

The witness, 70-year-old Karl Sewing, was minister of interior from 1928 to 1930. He was arrested on orders of Hermann Goerring after the Nazis took power. Both Raeder and Goerring are among the 23 ranking Germans on trial for war crimes.

Sewing said Raeder promised when he took over control of the navy in 1928 he would protect the Versailles treaty limitation or attempt secret rearmament.

No Infringement of Agreement. "There was no infringement of that agreement by the Navy during my time of office," the old politician said in his turn on the stand after Raeder stopped Sewing's detailed accounts of the happenings in Germany many years ago exasperated the tribunal. The presiding judge, Lord Justice Lawrence, said once complained that the testimony was "an utter waste of time."
