Bowles indicated on April 13 that there would be no dairy product price increases before July 1. What happened at that time, he said, depended on what Congress did about subsidies.

He reportedly is convinced now that there will not be sufficient subsidy money available to continue present food payments.

Copenhagen, May 27. — (AP) — Kings in wartime need a military ally. I was in Cairo two months ago he was having trouble finding an apartment.

Labor Expert at Yale Asserts Simple Remedy Does Not Exist

New Haven, May 27.—(AP)—Proposals for "drastic anti-strike legislation" do not usually come from people with experience in industrial relations, says the associate director of Yale's Labor-Management center.

Prof. Lloyd G. Reynolds, who

is a public member of the War Labor Board's special committee, asserted in a radio broadcast yesterday that "such proposals come from people who are in a hurry to find an easy remedy for a complicated problem they do not understand."

Addressing himself directly

to the railroad strike and strike curbs, he said that the people who make such proposals are "in a hurry to find an easy remedy for a complicated problem they do not understand."

Simple Remedy Mirage

"The beginning of wisdom in the field," he concluded, "is to recognize that the simple remedy mirage it does not exist."

Reynolds said that in disolving
