Maritime Strikes Most Scrambled Labor Row

Washington, June 7.—Here's an ABC explanation of the threatened maritime strikes, if most scrambled labor dispute of the year.
The strikes would involve about 1,100 American ships on all three coasts, Atlantic, Pacific, Gulf.
Seven unions numbering perhaps 278,000 men, are threatening strikes if their demands for higher pay, shorter hours, are not settled. Right here the scramble starts. Five of the seven unions—four CIO and one independent, all of which eventually plan to merge into one big union—have set June 15 as their strike deadline.
The other two—AFU unions have jumped into the picture and are operating entirely apart from the other five—still are vague as to date of their threatened walkout.

Aviation Group To Adopt Reports
Montreal, June 7.—The Provisional International Civil Aviation Organization, two of its most controversial questions settled, assembled today to adopt the reports of its five major committees before adjourning.
The world aviation organization, composed of 46 member countries and 10 non-voting observers, agreed last night to retain Montreal as its permanent headquarters and gave Ireland a seat on the inner council as a reward for past efforts for commercial flying. These controversial items disposed of by secret ballot after a day-long fight, by opponents of both issues, the assembly prepared to wind up its work today and adjourn.

Dr. Klingberg Dies Suddenly
Hartford, June 7.—Dr. Rev. Dr. John E. Klingberg of New Britain, founder and superintendent of "the home that praver built," died here yesterday at the age of 78.
Dr. Klingberg had come to Hartford, presumably on business of the Klingberg Children's Home at New Britain, about which his life had centered for the past 42 years, and was walking along Asylum street in the center of the city when he collapsed and died.
"The home that praver built" was the name given the institution by Thomas E. Murphy of the Hartford Courant in a magazine article which gained world-wide attention a few years ago and his well-known hymn "The Home that Praver Built" had become so popular that it was used as the theme song of the home's children.
He started the home in 1903 in a rented house, with three underprivileged waifs as the first charge. Sixteen of them went into the world, 10 of them through the good offices of voluntary contributions, the home grew to a modern brick structure accommodating about 90 homeless children, and has sent at least 1,000 of them out into the world. Sixteen of them served in the armed forces in World War II.
One of the many human interest stories connected with the institution followed in the wake of Murphy's magazine article which came to the attention of a wide-eyed Army sergeant, father of two small children in India. He wrote Dr. Klingberg asking if his youngsters could be placed in the home. And, receiving an affirmative reply, arranged with the Red Cross to transport the children from India to New Britain.
The children were welcomed at the home in March, 1945, but they are back with their father now. He fell in love and married the woman.

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Milk Prices Rise Today


Hartford, June 7.—Connecticut milk consumers will pay a cent a quart more for some of their milk starting today, a spokesman for the Connecticut Milk Producers association announced last night. The increase, said Ken E. Geyer, association general director, was authorized as of June 1 in a directive from Stabilization Director Chester Bowles which was dated May 29. The OPA, Geyer said, did not post the directive until Thursday.
Grade A and B milks will go up one cent a quart, Geyer said as he listed these other increases: Chocolate milk, buttermilk and skim milk, one-half cent a quart; light and heavy cream, one cent per half-pint or four cents a quart. Price to the producer will be increased seven-eighths of a cent a quart, he said.

It may not be faded at all... probably just soiled. Place several layers of paper under the rug to catch the dye. Then use some type of good soapless cleaner (about 1 to 16 mixture), proceed to clean about one square foot at a time by sponging the lather with a circular and back-and-forth motion. Never use the brush. Wipe off the soiled lather with a clean sponge. Clean the sponge again and so over the entire rug. If you're sure the remaining lather is clean... you can leave it, for it will evaporate. Soiled lather, however, will set into the rug darning it. Well, it's clean now. All you have to do is wait for it to dry.
Here is a helpful hint or two. When you move a three rug, always roll it up and then roll it back into position again. Never bend it. If the floor is cement, be sure it has been treated with a good cement sealer. The lime in the unsalted cement will bleach the rug colors.
Before laying for the season, is the ideal time to clean your rug more thoroughly. Does it look a little faded?
