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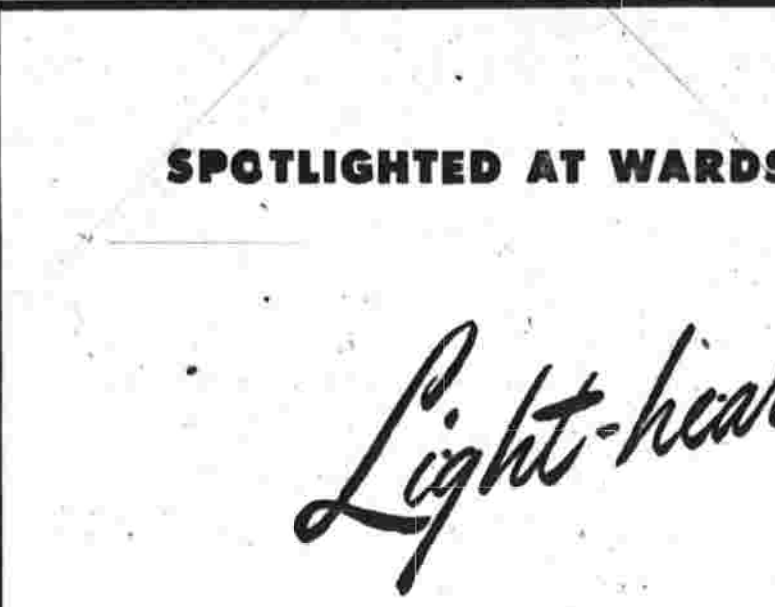

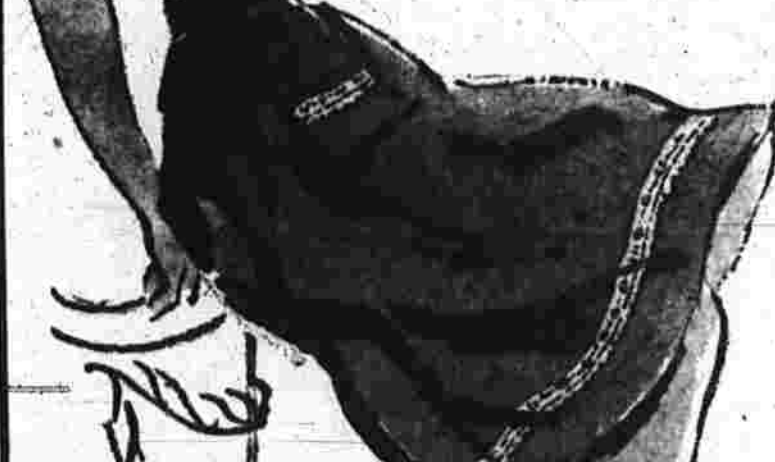

FBI in Charge Of Gathering

Police of Greater Hartford Area Invited to Meeting Tonight

Roger F. Gleason, special agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation for Connecticut, announced that the semi-annual law enforcement conference for local police departments in the greater Hartford area and including departments of New Britain, Bristol and Waterbury will be held in Bushnell Memorial this evening beginning at 7:45 o'clock.

The featured speaker at the conference will be Dr. Leon Greenberg, professor of physiology, Yale University. Professor Greenberg will stress a phase of police work not usually covered, entitled "Alcoholism in Traffic."

With the anticipated increase in volume of traffic in the state, the problem of the alcoholic motorist will be correspondingly increased.

Dr. Greenberg has conducted a series of experiments in the field of alcoholism and has performed many unusual tests in this connection at the university laboratory.

Leading the conference, which will be held in the auditorium of the Yale Memorial building, it is stated that the material gained by the Yale scientist can be utilized in the police work in the everyday work of the policeman.

Defensive Tactics An exhibition of judo and defensive tactics will be presented by special agent Ronald Phillips of the New Haven FBI office. The participants in this exhibition will be police officers from Hartford county police departments.

A colored film showing the manner in which the San Diego, Cal., Boys club organizes to help juvenile delinquency will be shown. Special Agent Gleason will be in charge of the conference.

Donato J. Rocco, 27, of West Hartford, and James Higgins, 25, his brother, John Higgins, 23, and Chester B. Bohar, 21, all of Hartford, pleaded guilty in Superior court yesterday to two counts of assault, one count of breach of the peace and one count of resisting an officer.

Two sentences which Judge Kenneth Wynne imposed on each totaled two years and three months. He ruled that the four must be served consecutively. He agreed, however, to suspend the three months sentence he imposed on the charge of resisting an officer provided the conduct of the prisoners was good while serving the other sentence.

The other defendants charged with taking part in the fracas on April 11, Joseph Charizos, 37, and his brother, Frank 30, were scheduled for arraignment today.

State's Attorney Hugh M. Alcorn, Jr., who declared them guilty of "hoodlumism," told the court he had considered charging the men with conspiracy, a felony punishable by a maximum of 15 years in prison, but finally had decided to proceed on misdemeanor counts, and ask for sentences of at least two years in jail.

The trouble started when a group of youths accosted Colonel Pfeffer and his family as they emerged from a theater here. Lieut. Foran, who came to the Army officer's aid, was beaten so severely in the sidewalk brawl that he lay in critical condition at St. Francis' hospital for weeks.

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Counsel for the four defendants said they had been drinking to excess before the brawl started, and pleaded for leniency on the ground of the men's military records, Bohar being cited as a broken-down from 100 per cent disability and

**After The Veto**

President Truman, in his veto of the Case Bill, has left the country in a state of confusion. A detailed analysis of the bill's provisions, seemingly, he proceeded on the basis that in order to succeed in convincing the must succeed in finding some fault with every provision. Some of the faults he found were perhaps microscopic in some instances but seemed to cross up his own logic. But in veto messages to give his veto some air of respectability the President did point out potential faults in the bill.

This included the point that penalties for violation of mediation procedure are much heavier against the unions than against the employer, the point that the very innocent and entirely sound provision applying the anti-trust steering act against unions should be made clear enough so that no court could proceed to apply that act against the more innocent in some instances but seemed to cross up his own logic. But in veto messages to give his veto some air of respectability the President did point out potential faults in the bill.

In many instances, Mr. Truman professes to agree with the purposes of the Case Bill, but objects that the specific provisions of the bill do not accomplish those purposes.

It is interesting to note that Mr. Truman is sincere in the stands he has taken in the course of his veto message. If there is real sincerity on both sides, in other words, the opportunity is now open for the creation of a bill which could become law.

**Gilmore On Russia**  
 At least one reader called us up to say that the special articles written by Associated Press correspondent Eddy Gilmore on his return to this country after five weeks of service in Russia were a welcome contrast to most of the writing now being done about Russia. Most of that writing is, it seems to us, biased either one way or the other. Either it falls into the category of over-the-top Russian, without knowing a great deal about it. Or it is a complete condemnation of everything Russian, also without knowing a great deal about it. We get too little of the kind of thing Gilmore did in his series of articles, which was to do a little objective, unemotional reporting.

One reason why we get too little of it, of course, is the fact that any Russian matter difficult for any Russia reporter to discuss for Russia, and get the Federal council.
