Important Decision Being Made on OPA

Will Die Automatically June 30 Unless Congress Votes to Extend Life; Form Big Issue

By James Marlow Washington, June 13-(AP)-One of the important decisions of our time-how to continue OPA-is eing made in Congress. OPA, with all its price and rent controls, will die automatically June 30 unless Congress votes to keep it going after that date.

There's no doubt Congress will extend its life, perhaps for a year. That's taken for granted. But the big question is this: n what form will OPA be continued? As a strong agency, with plenty of controls and able to drop them when it thinks right?

Or will it be turned into a weak agency, stripped of some of the most important controls, and therefore only a shell of itself?
