Army Hints Molten Jet In Defense

antiaircraft defense is going to require a bit of doing, however.

The first hint of the molten jet was dropped in a dully reported War department announcement which reported that post-war research of the Ordnance arm is gradually accumulating many standard weapons used in the World War of a year ago.

Col. Gen. Everett S. Hughes, chief of ordnance, is of the opinion that high explosive projectiles that fighter pilots dumped into enemy aircraft probably will be replaced in a few years by the new high speed metallic jet traveling at an initial velocity of 20,000 feet a second.

Couldn't Be Deflected

This molten metallic jet—comparable in a way to what jumped out of a tooth paste tube when squeezed, a patient Dr. Williams explained—would travel at such a high speed that it could be deflected only if it would go right through the armor plate of a plane flying an atomic rocket right at the nose.

If the jet strikes a plane it would be possible to inject a stream of molten metal which will melt a V-2, for it travels at only 5,000 feet a second. A burst of 1,000 feet a second, around a disc along at 1,200 feet a second.

Hold 87 1/2 Per Cent

In contrast, the top 20 per cent of the nation's families emerged with 87 1/2 per cent of the quick assets, with each family credited with at least \$1,100.

And the bottom 20 per cent of the family segment represented 60 per cent of all such national assets, averaging \$10,000 per family.

A Federal Reserve official said the survey findings pointed to the following conclusions:

In the hands of a small number of families makes them a considerable factor in financing consumer purchases than originally anticipated.

Must Depend on Earnings

The mass of families lacking substantial savings must depend on their current earnings to pay for food, clothing and other ordinary expenses of living.

For the more expensive items, such as housing, automobiles, refrigerators and the like, a major proportion of families therefore will have to resort to borrowing or installment-buying and other forms of credit.

Already the Federal Reserve board said in another report, approved by the board, that the buying is being done with borrowed money or credit, and that the amount of credit is being used as a higher credit income becomes available.

To Contain Credit Controls

The board indicated it would continue its current credit controls to prevent an increase of "inflationary pressure" making for a higher rate of living.

Survey itself pointed to possible inflationary pressure in investment fields—real estate and securities—because of concentration of savings in the hands of a few.

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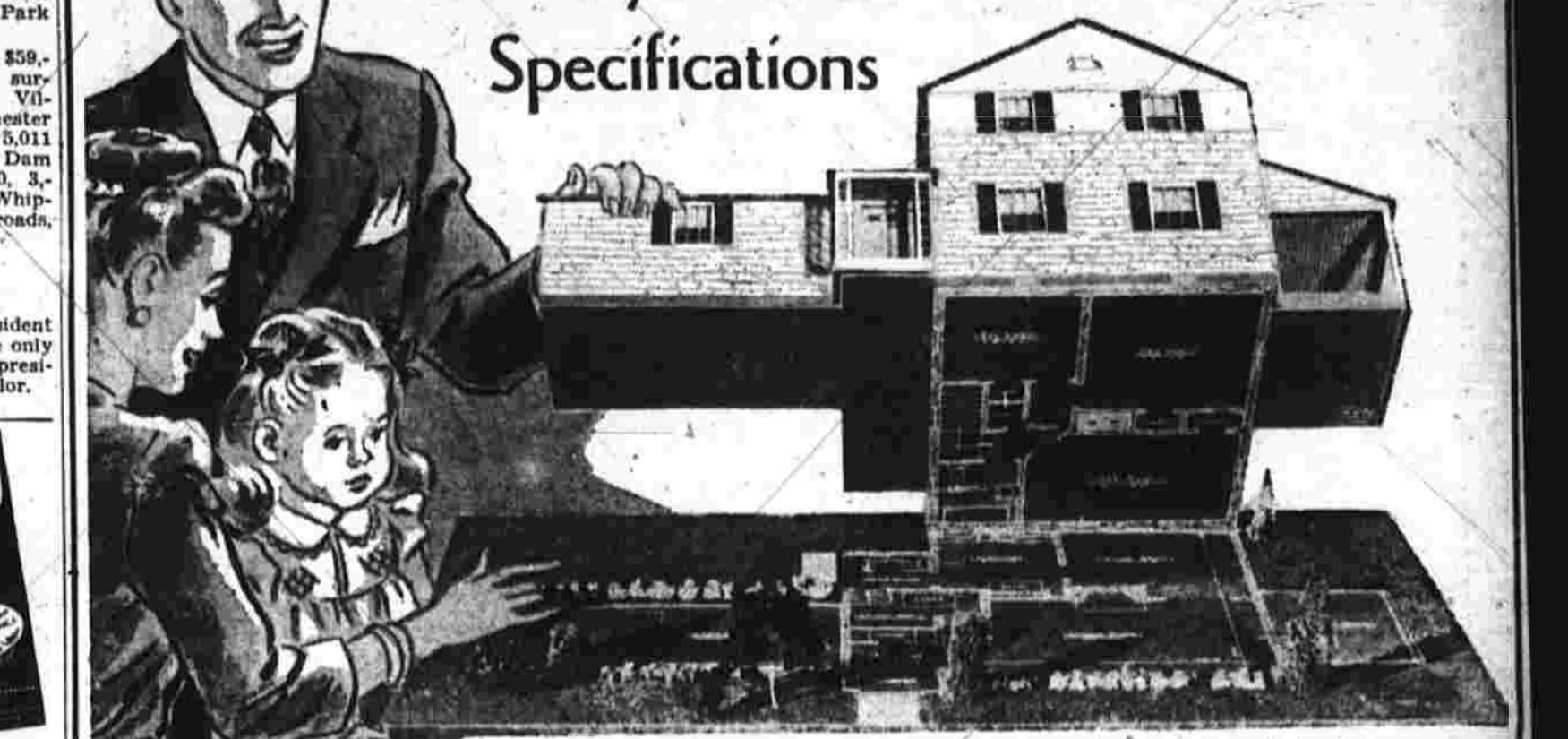
