Baruch Maintains His Stand Against Veto Power Right

American Delegate on United Nations Atomic Commission Supported by Truman's Reaffirmation of Policy on Subject

New York, June 21.—(AP)—Backed up by President Truman's reaffirmation of American policy, Bernard M. Baruch and his advisers in the United Nations Atomic Commission maintained a firm stand today against Russia's move to retain the veto power in relation to world control of atomic energy.

Re-Empowered Pronouncement The president's statement in Washington yesterday re-empowered Baruch's pronouncement to the council last week that the United States would not yield atomic secrets to a world pool or dispose of her bombs under treaty provisions unless the veto is discarded on atomic control matters.

Approach for Immediate Release—Modest Shertzer, an authority on political doctrine of the Jewish agency, appealed today for the immediate release of five kidnapped British officers, believed to have been abducted by a Jewish underground unit which has cost 20 lives in the turbulent Holy Land in the past week.

Shertzer said the abduction of the British officers was "unjustified" and that they were being held by a Jewish underground movement, as hostages for two members of that organization who were held in the custody of the British.

Two other members of the organization were sentenced yesterday to a seven-year prison term by a Jerusalem military court which convicted them of illegal possession of arms and a bomb attack at a railway station in southern Palestine last April.

Major Shertzer said that British officers kidnapped early in the week were held in the custody of the Jewish underground, but that the Russian substitute would have no say in the matter.

QUESTION: I'm thinking of buying a new lamp for my living room. Can you give me any advice that might help me in choosing the best lamp for my room?—Mrs. C.

ANSWER: I'm very glad to see that you are considering the lamp as a part of the room, but I'm afraid you've neglected to consider the most important phase of lighting, that is, its effect on you. When you consider the fact that about 80% of our impressions are received through the sense of sight, and our eyes cannot see without light, lighting seems to be of much greater consequence. Housing's \$600,000,000 Question

By S. Burton Heath, NEA Staff Correspondent. Washington—Government agencies contend that nothing but \$600,000,000 in subsidies can enable the building industry to produce the lumber, brick, plumbing and heating supplies, and the other materials that will be required to construct some two and a half million new homes in less than two years.

A Turning Point?

The hope and theory that the American proposal for the control of atomic energy, presented by Bernard Baruch last Friday, may prove a turning point in world psychology and world opinion is echoed by Anna O'Hare McCormick, one of our most distinguished journalists, writing in the New York Times.

"The Baruch report," writes Mrs. McCormick, "is of transcendent importance in itself. The more its intent and implications are studied, the more space-making it appears as an instrument of world disarmament. For if it is finally accepted, and all nations agree to outlaw the atom bomb and to vest in an international authority complete control over the materials which it made, the way is made to the inspection of every source and development of atomic energy. It is hard to believe that the agreement will not extend to the deadliest weapons as they are invented. Still less can it be imagined that with such a control established we will all spend our substance in a complete race to excel in the production of lesser weapons."

"Meantime the proposal has the merit of directing attention from the quarrels that sound like war to a means of insuring peace. If it is discussed in public meetings, and the discussions are headlined and played up like debates on such minor matters as Iran and Spain, it could turn the minds of people and governments from the negative to the positive approach to security and from old and outworn ideas of strategic frontiers to national components and spheres of power to conceptions more in keeping with the nature of the world we live in."

"This would be no mean by-product of putting the American plan before the United Nations. It international negotiations are at a stalemate, it is the same story. It is the same story, that is, the main, all nations, and not alone Russia, have an almost incurable instinct to try to snipe the future in the out-moded trapping of the past. It is in the world of the atom bomb, the plane, the radio, that Russia is trying to make an atom curtain and create security by the formation of a protective zone some 200 or 300 miles deep. It is in the same world that the United States proposes a huge, and probably anarchistic way, an imperialistic system of bases, and permanent pacifistic conception. It is in the same world that the nations together squabble over who shall have "influence" in five or ten square miles of territory. This is the case. Tripartite peace is trying to apply merely all the old formulas of the past to the problems of the future, the nations have indeed demonstrated that their thinking is stale and lacking in realism. For actually, in the kind of world in which we live, not one of these things being squabbled about is worth the effort involved in asking for it. The American proposal for the

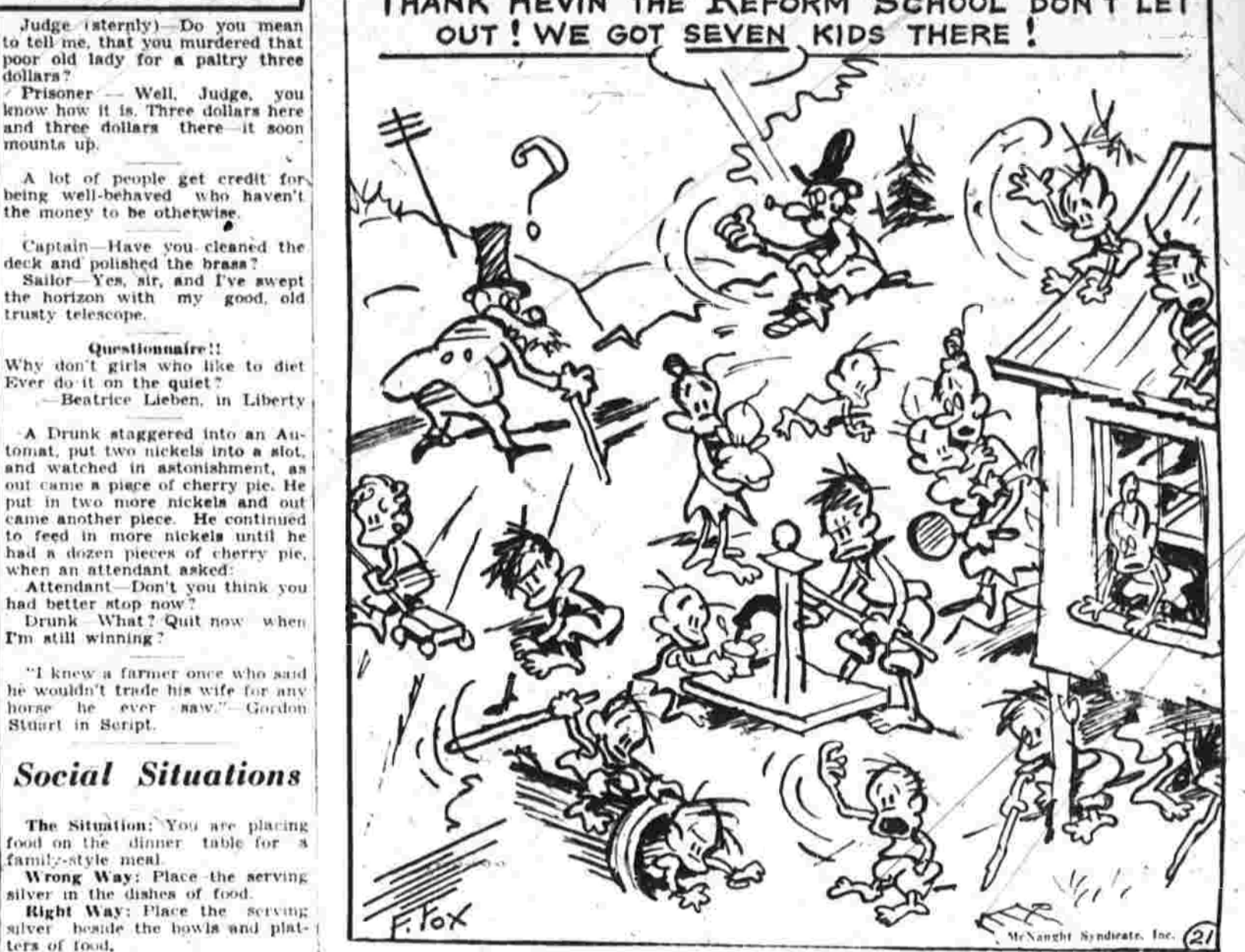
