Bread and bakery goods were plentiful, supply in Minneapolis, but in Chicago, N.Y., a few days ago grocers reported the bread supply was down to 25 per cent of normal with breadlines forming.
 Butter No Particular Problem
 Des Moines and Kansas City both reported that butter was no particular problem, but that meat was mighty short despite the number of packing houses in those areas. In Detroit, however, the meat supply was much better although still "inadequate." The reason? Big packers were reported to be slaughtering at 25 per cent of capacity while many independent packers were working 50 per cent of capacity. Detroit is supplied mainly by independents.
 Automobiles? They are still hard to get, but Detroit again reported that buyers in that area were getting a break at least in surplus war trucks and automobiles. Many are stored in that area.
 Denver reported that automobile tires, frequently scarce elsewhere, were a particular problem for vacationists there, in addition to the usual consumer shortages.
 Short 1,000 Items
 In San Francisco one grocer reported he was short 1,000 items. Another said 200,000 items. The usual list of odd shortages likewise existed, others reported.
 Particular shortages of canned tomatoes, popped up from Washington, D. C., Philadelphia and Des Moines, and Kansas City. Canned fruit, canned fruit, seafood, beans, corn and peas were hard to get. Many of these items are in reasonable supply on many eastern store shelves.
 Cooking oils, soybean, apricot, tomato juice, mayonnaise, jellies, and a long list of others were described as short in some of the 15 major cities, while others indicated they could be found with a bit of searching.
 The supply of men's suits appeared to be limited almost everywhere, although woollens were available in many places. Linings were a bottleneck. New Orleans, a warm weather city, stressed a shortage of summer suits, but paradoxically, window shoppers in New York could see them by the scores.

Borrowing From Loan Will Be Done by Banks

Sellers of Goods Want To Be Paid Off in Own Nation's Money; How Loan Will Work
 (Editor's Note: This is the second of three stories on the British loan which Congress may approve next week.)
 By James Marlow
 Washington, June 28.—If Congress approves the \$2,700,000,000 loan for Britain, individual Britons—farmer, businessman, manufacturer—can't walk a bank and ask for a piece of it.
 Individuals can't borrow from the loan. The borrowing will be done by British banks. Something like this:
 When Americans and Britons sell goods to one another, they have to be paid off in their own country's money. Dollars and pounds start with an American bank. So American banks keep a fund of pounds sterling in British banks and British banks keep a fund of dollars in American banks. Hence:
 A Briton wants to buy from an American—say machinery—and he deposits his check for the price of the machinery with his own British bank where he has a checking account.
 (His money in the British bank is in pounds sterling.)
 His British bank then cables an American bank where his bank keeps a supply of American dollars. The British bank tells the American bank:
 "Pay the American machine manufacturer, John Jones, so many dollars out of our dollar fund."
 Jones gets his American dollars and the British buyer gets the machinery. The system works in reverse if Jones wants to buy something from a Briton.
 The British before the war always bought more from us than we bought from them. So they always had on hand a good supply of American dollars in American banks.
 Britons owned lots of American stocks and securities and received interest and dividends on them. These were received in the form of checks for American dollars. But since the British security holders lived in Britain they wanted to be paid in money that could be used in Britain: Pounds sterling. So they turned their checks over to British banks and got credit in pounds sterling.
 The British banks then deposited those checks in American banks. The latter set aside the amount in dollars for the British banks.

Spots, and How to remove them:
GREASE—Remove as much of the excess grease as possible with a dull knife. Then rub the stain with a cleaning fluid such as carbon tetrachloride or benzine. Always rub with circular strokes, starting at the edge. After the ink or iodine has been removed you can clean the greasy mark left by the milk with a cleaning fluid.
CHEWING GUM—Can be removed with carbon tetrachloride, and scraping with a dull knife.
SOOT FROM FIRE-PLACE—Can be covered with dry salt and swept up without smearing.
PEPPY PROBLEMS—Can be solved by patting with a clean cloth and lukewarm soap suds. Then cold water should be applied. To neutralize the acid, apply a mixture of one part ammonia and five parts water. Then rinse again after a minute or two with cold water.

The pier just opened up and we all dropped through.
 "I went clean to the bottom with the pier atop me, tons of timber and metal work piling around me," he related.
 "I was caught fast at the bottom and was losing consciousness when a piece of the staff dropped next to me and loosened whatever was holding me fast.
 Shot to Surface
 Turnbull said he shot to the surface "and found debris swirling all around me with big timbers bearing down on me," adding:
 "To escape them I ducked under the surface. I'm a strong swimmer and so I started to swim toward the point where I thought I would be free of the debris."
 The pier is occupied by Baugh & Sons Co., fertilizer manufacturer, and the Delaware River Chemical Works, a subsidiary of Baugh. It was a double deck timber structure on timber pilings, the street and upper levels each about 50 feet wide. Rail cars were run on the street level and the 100-foot crane was on the upper level for loading and unloading freight cars and cargo ships.

The Law On Fireworks

Judging from the sounds to be heard in Manchester streets for the past week or so, the youngsters of Manchester kids, both young and old in point of years, do not know that it is illegal to shoot off fireworks in Manchester before the hour of 4 a. m. on the Fourth itself.

It is likewise apparent to any casual observer of the present scene times in Manchester, that those who are unaware of the illegality of the time element of their pastime are also ignorant of the fact that Manchester ordinance specifies a place restriction. By the terms of the ordinance, the discharge of fireworks on public property, which means streets, is forbidden. By the terms of the ordinance, it is legal only to discharge fireworks on your own property.

The one provision of which these premature celebrants are aware is that which prohibits the public sale of fireworks within Manchester town limits. They solve that by going over to the town of Lyme-Regis, Bungay, or by juvenile bootlegging.

Of the three provisions of the Manchester ordinance, only that forbidding sales in Manchester seems enforceable. The police would be led a merry chase if they tried to corral all those who are now setting off fireworks at their own pleasure all over town. They would be led a still merrier chase if, now or on the Fourth itself, they should try to confine those shooting off fireworks to their own property.

Our Proposal For Japan

The announcement by the United States of its own formal proposal to Russia, Britain and China for a four-power control commission to succeed the present American occupation of Japan and to supervise the continued disarmament of Japan means that positive American policy is still drifting.

This proposal is, in concrete form, a companion proposal to Mr. Byrnes' plan for a 25 year trusteeship to enforce the demilitarization of Germany. One of the great needs of America's security in wishing to avoid future military based on the atomic bomb is the McMahon Bill for our own atomic control of atomic materials, research and production. The salient point of that bill is that it provides for civilian, rather than military, domestic control of the atom. When it was passed by the Senate, and the world outside, could feel that we were serious in our way to demonstrating our peaceful intentions with the atom.

No sooner has the McMahon Bill reached the House Committee on Atomic Energy, however, than Chairman Andrew May, the same gentleman who determined the draft laws by keeping a colloquial proxy, involved in his own pocket, led a movement to restore military control provisions to the bill. As it looks now, the membership of the House will have to override its own committee if the McMahon Bill is going to come out of its House passed unchanged. The danger is not only that we may place ourselves under a military atomic dictatorship at home, but that we may demonstrate to the world a domestic policy at variance with what we profess our international policy on atomic energy to be.

The second means most particularly before the House is the British loan. The combination of good policy—good for an ally, good for ourselves, above all good for the whole free enterprise world—represented in the British loan proposal has not changed since it was calculated and passed in the Senate. But there is a danger that election-minded members of the House may forsake the merits of the loan, in favor of what they think to be a revival of isolationist sentiment in America.
