The War Records Committee of Manchester, which was authorized on February 4, 1944, by the Board of Selectmen, officially closed its books last night in a final meeting of the Executive Committee.

In the past 16 months the committee has assembled a large amount of war records from various local sources, set apart in the Whittem Memorial Library and has collected to date one-half of the necessary and Naval records of Manchester's men and women entering the services.

In report to the committee, Mrs. John Willcott, War Records Liaison Officer, presented a summary of the work done during the past year.
