Organized Labor Has Struggled for Power

Feeble Begin-And nings, Many Mistakes And Setbacks at Times

-----(Editor's Note:-This is the second of six stories explain-ing the history of organized labor and how, after a year of strikes, it emerges almost un-touched by restrictive legisla-

By James Marlow Washington, July 9-(P)-The istory of organized labor in this cil man, rancher and philanthro- girls here ountry is one of slow and feeble eginnings, of many mistakes and setbacks, and of collapses when depressions struck. But it has been a history of con

tinued struggle upward to power. Trade unions began to appear after the Revolutionary war, From the beginning their basic aims were better pay, better hours, a strong er hold on a job, and better work

er hold on a job, and better work-ing conditions. But some wandered far afield. Little Restrictive Legislation In all its history congress has passed very little legislation to restrict organized labor. But labor was restricted in other ways. For more than 100 years courts alanced more than 100 years courts slapped unions down. Employers joined forces against labor. The first union, perhaps, was

The first union, perhaps, was that of the Philadelphia shoemak-1790 they got a closed shop -they forced the employers the hire none but union workers. But when they struck in 1805 for higher wages the employers took hem to court where a jury found them guilty of a "combination raise wages." They were fined \$ each and lost their jobs. " Herbert Harris, in his history, "American Labor,' says the shoe-makers were the "first among housands of American unions t e destroyed by adverse court de isions."

Deprived Of Right To Vote After the revolution many states wouldn't let a man vote unless he had property. This deprived a lot of workers of the right to vote. But his was mostly eliminated by the

With a vote, union membe could talk turkey to politicians and thus inch their way further toward the goals they sought. In his "Economics and Prob-lems of Labor," Philip Taft says labor made its first big effort in 1928 when it set up the Workingmen's party, the "first purely labor party in the world." It lasted until

another organization, of the most famous in history was taking form. This was the Noble Order of the Knights of Labor. It started in 1869 as a secret organi-zation of tailors who wanted it unknown to their bosses. Soon it spread, becoming a national organization. It dropped its secrecy in 1878. It was a union for all workers, skilled and un-akilled, manual, clerical, professional, and the small business-

man. The Knights wanted a national 8-hour day, an end to child labor, equal pay for men and women. By 1886 the Knights had over 700, 000 members. They dropped to little more than 70,000 by 1893

Not Enough Organizers The Knights had set out to or-ganize all workers, but didn't have enough organizers. They led some successful strikes and were mixed up in some that hast They mixed up in some that lost. They looked for more than frade union benefits. They looked for other things, too, like reorganization of the banking system.

Also, the Knights were in con-flict with craft unions—unions of skilled workers — since the Knights wanted to absorb all kinds of workers. And-the American Federation of Labor, organized in 1886, was growing in power. Unlike the Knights, the AFL put the empha-

Knights, the AFL put the empha-sis on craft unions, turned away from forming a political party, and thought in terms of benefits for workers, not general reforms. The Knights served a purpose. They bridged the gap between unions which were floundering after the Cvil war and the AFL which nucked up the hell and which picked up the tail and car-ried it half a century. It's still gong strong.
