To Open New Tract Here Needs Considerable Work

Regulation adopted by the Selectmen and the Town Planning Commission concerning subdivision of land in Manchester will necessitate considerable work by the subdivision board before the tract and lots are offered for sale.

The subdivision must first present complete plans to the Planning Board, which after the approval by the Planning Board then is reviewed by the Selectmen. When final approval is given by both sides and maps approved, they are filed with the town clerk for record.

Various Requirements

Seventeen different requirements are essential before subdivisions may be offered as follows:

The proposed subdivision shall conform to the Town Map, to the Zoning Regulation, and to the subdivision regulations.

The width of minor streets shall not be less than 40 feet.

Where provided, trees shall be planted at least five feet inside the property line and not exceed 1500 feet.

Dead-end streets may be permitted but their length and design shall depend on the circumstances of each case.

Where streets shall conform to the terrain, but grade or level shall not be less than 7 per cent are desirable.

All streets must have a pavement curb on either side of six inches of approved gravel or other suitable material.

Carriage and sidewalks must be installed in accordance with the report and prices should be set down to an average of 15 to 20 per cent above former OPA levels.

Communist Asserts Supplies Blocked

Foreign supply of Communist military supplies has been blocked, the Communist spokesman asserted today, that central government military authorities have blocked the shipment of UNRRA supplies into Communist-held areas of north China and Manchuria for political and military reasons.

He said fewer than three per cent of the 107,152 tons of UNRRA supplies transported into the northern provinces up to mid-June had been distributed to Chinese in Communist-dominated areas.

An estimated 60 per cent of the northern provinces is reliably reported in Communist hands.

The spokesman pointed to UNRRA's basic policy that relief should be given regardless of political belief, and noted that Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek had assured UNRRA that supplies were being admitted into all areas of China.

Government and military authorities, the Communist spokesman said, have imposed a tight blockade on Communist areas and through this have been using UNRRA as pressure to gain concessions.

Thousands of Chinese, unable to obtain UNRRA aid, are reported dying for lack of food and medicine.

OPA Violators Pay \$13,120

Hartford, July 10—Settlement of 23 cases involving violations of O. P. A. price and rent regulations in Connecticut prior to July 1 has resulted in payments to the United States Treasury and in refunds to consumers totaling \$13,120.47. It was announced today by Stanley Crute, State O. P. A. Director.

Crute pointed out that the State O. P. A. is continuing investigations of all price and rent violation cases which were uncovered in Connecticut before expiration of the Price Control Act June 30.

The price penalties of our Local Price Control Board are also continuing to hear cases of overcharges which were made under the former law, he said.

Largest single payments for overcharges were made by Superior Mattress Company, Bank Street, Waterbury, which paid \$4,587.23 for overcharges on mattresses sales and repair work; and Capitol Motors, Inc., 368 Main Street, Hartford, which made a settlement of \$3,432.00 for above-charges on automobile repair work. O. P. A. described the Capitol Motors case as "one of the largest of its type" ever discovered by the price agency in Connecticut.

Thirteen payments for "rent overcharges" were made by landlords in this state as a result of a recent survey of rooming houses. The State O. P. A. Chief said. Other violations were discovered in O. P. A. investigations in the food and clothing fields.

Seeking Cause Of Air Crash

Bridgeport, July 10—(AP)—Investigators pursued an inquiry into the cause of a helicopter crash in Seaside park here, the pilot of the crash was expected to be discharged today from St. Vincent's hospital, but at least one of the three others injured was in serious condition.

The 8-51 Sikorsky helicopter was carrying three members of an Argentine government commission besides its pilot, Robert S. Decker of Bridgeport. When an eyewitness said that the rotor blades came off and it fell into the park yesterday from a height of about 40 feet.

Thrown Out of Craft

Comdr. Carlos Gadda, highest ranking officer of the Argentine commission, was thrown out of the craft and the fuselage toppled on him. Boyle's COLUMBIA

(A German workman tells of the problems and hopes of Germany's laboring class today in another of a series of columns written for Hal Boyle by representative Germans.)

Berlin, July 10—(AP)—I don't believe it is possible that Germany will be rebuilt in my lifetime. I have no real hopes for the future for myself. I have no illusions there.

For Germany I hope only that she can get some government and materials to work with. Young men, particularly those with families, want to leave Germany for another country where we could have more of a chance to live.

Half the skilled workers in the Reich would emigrate tomorrow if they were promised decent jobs elsewhere in Canada, the United States or South America.

I am a plumber, married, with a seven-year-old daughter and a five-year-old boy. Before the war I had my own plumbing business. I had a very good income, enough to live very comfortably. I was very content. I still have no political interest. I still have none. I don't know whether democracy would be good or bad for Germany.

Given Job in War Factory

Because I had a heart ailment I was not called as a soldier but given a job in a war factory in South Silesia. While the Russians approached, the factory moved to Berlin. I brought my family along, too, and we lost everything.

I was made a soldier three months before the war ended, and was kept prisoner by the Russians for five months. We were treated kindly, but there was little food. I work for 48 hours a week and must pay 20 marks (seven dollars) and one meal a day. That would be enough wages except that I must pay 20 marks a week in taxes.

That leaves 50 marks. So my wife has to work as a charwoman. She earns 20 marks a week from butter, milk and other foods at prices not substantially above those prevailing under OPA.
