Other Cooperation... Officers of Commerce of the Spanish Republic, Dominican Republic and the Association of Architects and Engineers have offered their cooperation to the government in saving and reconstructing damaged buildings.

Advices from Haiti, where communications have been established, said that Sunday's quake did little damage to Port au Prince, but caused considerable damage in the smaller towns.

In the northern section of Haiti, near the Dominican republic more than 60 houses were reported badly damaged and several churches were devastated. In the village of Le Borgne, nine houses were wrecked with a loss of approximately \$25,000.

In the Dominican capital, President Raphael Trujillo Medina directed the dispatching of aid to the stricken regions, while officials of the Army, police force, fire department and Red Cross stood by to assist in the relief work.

Another severely hit sector was Santiago, which, with a population of 100,000, is one of the largest cities in the affected area. Reports reaching here said that many buildings were toppled or damaged and one person was killed. Another death was reported in San Francisco de Macoris.

### Insurance Law Aids Veterans

Amendment Liberalizes Original Act; Features Are Outlined

Hartford, Aug. 6.—Insurance benefits to veterans were materially extended and liberalized on August 1 when President Truman signed the Congressional Act amending the National Service Life Insurance Act of 1940.

Features of the new amendments making N.S.L.I. more attractive than ever include:

- 1. Addition of 20-year endowment policies, payment at age 65, and endowment at age 80. As originally issued, permanent policies provided in N.S.L.I. were ordinary life, 20-payments life, and 30-payments life.
- 2. Removal of all restrictions of beneficiaries which were imposed by the original act. Formerly the insured was permitted to designate only beneficiaries who were next of kin, or his own designated person, or his estate.
- 3. A provision under which the insured may elect to have his insurance placed in a single lump sum to beneficiaries. Under the original act, monthly installments to beneficiaries were mandatory.
- 4. Payment of benefits to an insured who is totally disabled for as long as six months. These payments are at the rate of 85 a month for each \$1,000 of face value, and are payable as long as the disability exists.

The new amendments liberalize the original act in many ways, and are payable as long as the disability exists.

Application for insurance which was rejected solely for health reasons between October 1, 1940 and September 2, 1945 are validated by these amendments.
