On-the-job training is one of th many benefits afforded veterans of World war II by the GI bill of rights. It provides for a govern men subsistence allowance payable to any veteran who participates in job-training situation. Training For Better Job

The only stipulation is that the job the veteran takes can lead within a reasonable time to a bet-ter job. In other words, the veteran is "in training" for a better job. But employers who conduct jobtraining programs do not have t guarantee the veteran a better job Almost any company or individ-ual employer can be approved to give on-the-job-training. The approval is not given by the Veter-ans administration, but by the state in which the company is lo-cated. Usually the State Depart-ment of Education is the agency

having jurisdiction. The subsistence allowance pa by the government amounts to \$65 or \$90 a month, depending upon whether the veteran has a dependent or dependents. The allowance is payable for maximum of four years and is de-signed to supplement low entry-

wage salaries. When the veteran finishes his training and starts drawing the pay of a fully-trained worker, the allowance is cut off.

Subsistence Allowance Cut At no point during training may the veteran's salary plus the sub-sistence allowance exceed the pay of a fully-trained worker. As the veteran's salary increases, the subsistence allowance is cut down to keep the total about equal to the play of the fully-trained worker. General Bradley said in a speech last week that the on-the-job train ing program "threatened to become a national scandal."

Here's why. Some unscrupulous employers get themselves approv-ed to give job-training. Then they hire veterans under the job-training program and deliberately cut entry wages so that the total of plus subsistence allowance quals what non-veterans are ge ting for doing the same type

They cut wages, in other word and let the subsistence allowance make up the difference. Employers doing this save themselves \$65 or \$90 a month for each veteran they hire under the program. About 13, 000,000 veterans are eligible for training on the job, so this hiring of "cheap labor" might cost taxof "cheap labor" might cost tax-payers a huge sum if all employers were as dishonest as these few. State approval agencies are not supposed to give the nod to any outfit seeking approval unless it can show that a workable training rogram has been set up. The train ing program should prepare the veteran for the job he's aiming at. But actually many so-called "training programs" are neither programs nor do they give training. One veteran trailing to be an auto mechanic, spent months cleaning up around the auto shop, washing windows and doing similar odd jobs. He never got near an automobile, much less a motor. Another veteran was signed up on a two-year program-to lear how to take nickels out of a juke

Officials of the Briggs Manufac turing Co. announced that about 3,000 employes of the Meldrum avenue plant will return to work Wednesday, contingent upon re-sumption of production at Packard Packard closed Aug. 6 in what the management called a walkout but which officials of Local 190, UAW-CIO, termed a "lockout." The dispute began over plant re-pair work. Terms of the settlement were not announced but George T. Christopher, Packard president, said eight grievances were discussed with the union. The Briggs plant, which supplies bodies for Packard, laid its employes off soon after Packard

Sudol Dies Of Lockjaw

First Fatal Case Town Employees Under Compensation

John Sudol, 57, of 34 Union street, who died yesterday at the Manchester Memorial Hospital of lockiaw, is the first fatal case to come under compensation among town employees. He contracted tetanus from an infection on his right hand caused by a cut inflict-ed while at work. The compensation law was en-acted in 1912 and with the exception of the first three months from January to March the town has always carried its own compensa-tion. This they have been able to

do by authority of the insurance commissioners. A fund has not been built up to mest any emergency and each case where a comgency and each case where a com-pensation claim has developed has been charged against the depart-ment budget. Although Mr. Sudol was also a member of the Man-chester Pension Fund his family will not be able to collect from this fund as providen is made this fund as provision is made that where compensation is paid, money from the pension fund cannot be also collected.

Mr. Sudol was born in Poland and has been a resident of Manthester for 30 years and has been employed by the town most of that time. He is a veteran of World War I having served in the French Foreign Legion. He spoke five lan-


