Zoning Board Clerk Needed

Recommendation Is Made by Chairman of Planning Board

Included in the budget of the Town Planning Board is the Zoning Board of Appeals to be submitted to the voters at the Town Meeting in October will be an additional appropriation of \$1,500 for a full time clerk.

In submitting this recommendation, Charles W. Holman, chairman of the Town Planning Committee, writes:

"You will note that an amount sufficient to pay a full time clerk in the Building Inspector's office is included. The work has increased so much because of zoning requirements that one clerk is unable to keep the records as they should be kept and attend to the other details of that office. The Board of Appeals is constituted by the applications for variances which adds to the work of the clerk in the office of the Building Inspector.

"It is my thought that an additional clerk be employed who will devote most of her time to planning and zoning details and who will also act as stenographer at all hearings without additional compensation. She could be allowed time off during working hours to compensate for her attendance at evening meetings.

"I do not anticipate any other unusual expense in the Town Planning and Zoning during the coming year. It is quite evident, I think, that zoning has been of great value to the town by preventing the erection of undesirable buildings in various localities and the unsuitable use of existing buildings. The present zoning regulations are in force automatically limit the use of land. It is the exception rather than the rule that comes before either the Board of Appeals or the Board of Zoning.

To Lodge Protest On Greeks' Usage Of UNRRA Trucks

Mission Chief Estimates 400 Used to Transport Persons to Royalist Rally; Thesally Vehicles Taken to Move Army and Police

Athens, Greece, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Buell Maben, chief of the UNRRA mission, said today a protest would be lodged with the Greek government for unauthorized use of UNRRA trucks for both military and political purposes.

Maben said 400 UNRRA trucks were estimated to have been used to transport persons to a royalist rally last night in Constitution square, preparatory to the protest on the fate of the Greek monarchy.

Commented by Authorities He had just returned from the Thessaly region where the Greeks are fighting the Albanian border incidents and was in Thessaly to see the movement of personnel, contrary to the agreement made with the Greek government.

Both these cases will be protested, he said. Maben said the government previously had requested UNRRA trucks for other than relief purposes, but that UNRRA had refused to supply them.

Political violence increased in Greece. The ministry of public order said 21 persons were killed and 32 others kidnaped by Communist bands in the 24 hours.

China Reds' Yankees May Remain Indefinitely in Japan

Purpose to Hold Eastern Anchor of World-Wide American Line Against Communism

Tokyo, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Although the military phase of the Japanese situation is nearly completed, American forces may remain indefinitely in Japan to hold what is regarded here as the eastern anchor of a world-wide American line against the Soviet Union and Communism.

The generalissimo's troops, meanwhile, fled unopposed into Chungking, capital of the province, and by Communist admission captured three important points to the south, but the Communists claimed they had scored a resounding victory.

The Soviet delegate briefly mentioned at present to estimate and increasing propaganda and probably considerable advance to Japanese Communism.

But it is generally felt here that the Soviets would move in immediately upon any complete American military withdrawal, ready to take the road between the generalissimo's guarantee to issue a cease-fire order as an agreement reached on forming a coalition government.
