Most curious, but perhaps a very typical argument, which has leaked out of the Military Staff Committee, comes from Russia. The Russian has adopted the view that the proposed international police force is the peace. There is no peace, they say, and it is premature to discuss a force to preserve it.

A good many Americans will never catch up with the second version of the story. They do not do so because a good many American newspapers did not consider the denial of the story as a national news item. Other American newspapers prize only whatever sensationalism they can find against Russia. Or perhaps they are not interested in having facts printed over their hazy notions.

The late William Allen White, writing as an observer of the Versailles Conference, found that the failure of the nations to agree to give the League of Nations force to back up its own decisions opened the way for the League of Nations itself merely into another field of operations for the power politics of the great nations.

When the United Nations was created, the world was told that the organization was going to be better, because it was going to have force to back up its own decisions. This force was to take the form of an international police force, to be supplied by the various member countries, to be under the command of the Security Council.

On this, the most hopeful effort to avoid the mistakes of the League of Nations, the members of the United Nations have been most backward. Almost before the United Nations was in existence, the various nations showed their refusal to accept the idea of an international police force which would have real power.

Nonetheless, when the United Nations organization came to this country last winter, the great powers felt obligated to try to go through the motions of creating an international police force. Toward this end, a Military Staff Committee of the United Nations began secret meetings in a well-guarded New York hotel suite.

That committee has been meeting regularly ever since. As might be expected, since each big nation has already declared its intention of maintaining its own individual military security, a committee supposed to discuss the creation of a truly international force, to maintain world law and order has got nowhere.

Yet, even if the only proper solution—the creation of a world policeman who has more power than any individual potential lawbreaker—seems lost so far, there have been and will continue to be many situations in which such a world policeman would have at least a symbolic power and prestige, if he were in existence.
