Studies Possible Protest

He made his statement as Greece studied a possible protest to Marshal Tito over the Greek military plane forced down in Yugoslavia by anti-aircraft fire.

The official Yugoslav news agency Tanjug said anti-aircraft fire downed the Greek plane, and repeled two other Greek aircraft government and Chinese Communications. The Chinese government's Air Force "all along has been a thorn in the side" of Executive headquarters, the source said.

"Theoretically, the Air Force should obey agreements made by tripartite headquarters, but actually it never has." Tripartite head-quarters comprises U. S., Chinese government and Chinese Communications.
