Of the 231 sentenced, at least 35 already have been finished off. Of that 55, the Army sent 23 to the gallows last May for the death of more than 300,000 persons in the Dachau concentration camp. Another 43—of the 231 sentenc-ed to death—have been condemned for the alaughter of 900 U. S. war prisoners and Belgian civilians in the Battle of the Bulge.
