Governor Raymond E. Baldwin spoke with optimism regarding international affairs in his address before the Religious Forum on World Affairs at South Methodist church last evening. Speaking in the final session of a two-day program, Governor Baldwin outlined the history of the democratic form of government as illustrated both in the State of Connecticut and in the United States. He said "America has made progress for good faith around the world, and if that progress is to be maintained, it is necessary that the nations of the world together as the thirteen original colonies were joined together by the same faith in democracy."

Cambridge, Mass., Oct. 9.—Six Harvard university astronomers rode the sky overnight recording effects of a meteor shower from the Comet Giacobini-Zinner.

The flight was one of a series of scientific observations by which Harvard scientists hope to calculate the number of meteors which appear and their influence upon the atoms of the upper atmosphere. They said that additional experiments may determine the effects of meteors upon such phenomena as radio and static.

### Prices for Some Shoes May Jump

Washington, Oct. 9.—Prices for some shoes may jump soon as a result of a move to increase production, an OPA official said today.

### Tailors Seek Higher Wage

Walk Off Jobs in 15 Hartford Stores to Enforce Demands

Hartford, Oct. 9.—Journeyman tailors yesterday walked off their jobs in 15 men's clothing stores here to enforce demands for an 8 1/2-cent wage increase. While a spokesman for the store owners called the walkout "unauthorized and illegal," Busop Cawdell, international representative of the CIO Clothing Workers union, asserted that the action was "a unanimous work stoppage" and that if the firms do not negotiate further a strike will be called. He said journeyman tailors, now receiving \$27 cents an hour, had asked for \$42 a week, had asked for \$48 when the owners offered \$45 a week, had asked for \$54 when the owners offered \$51 a week, and had asked for \$60 when the owners offered \$57 a week.
