Weeks, for one story bungalow on rear of house at 48 South street; Stanley Dubois Trust of the American Legion for addition to house at 114 West street; George D. and Eda McDonald for home 24 x 28 at 7 East street; Thomas and Ruth Blaney for a home 34 x 28 at 9 East street. **Proposal to Be Submitted to Central Vermont Management**

Hartford, Dec. 4—(SP)—A spokesman for the State Board of Mediation and arbitration said last night that a "proposal for settlement" of the strike of approximately 150 stewards for the Central Vermont railroad at New London had been reached.

The stewards, employees of the William Spencer & Son Corp., stewarding agency for the railroad, have been on strike since Nov. 1. They are members of Local 1411, International Longshoremen's association (AFL).

Wage Controversy Involved

The spokesman said the issues involved a wage controversy and the negotiation of a contract. Details of the settlement proposal were not revealed by the spokesman who said the proposal now would be submitted to the management of the railroad which operates a freight steamship line between New London and New York in addition to its freight and passenger rail service from New London to Vermont points.

Perley M. Hovey, state mediator, presided at yesterday's meeting which also was attended by G. C. Wenzel, vice president, representing the corporation; Rapt T. W. Prior of the railroad and Attorney L. G. Sobel and the negotiating committee representing the union local.

Prior, attending a conference with Mayor Fred Benvenuti and members of the Common Council last night at New London to discuss reports current in that city that the Central Vermont intended to remove its railroad and steamship lines from the city if the strike continued, said that first he had heard of such reports was at the mediation meeting here.

The road official said the Central Vermont had no intention of moving from New London.

Buddie Prior and Benvenuti, others attending the meeting included Councilmen James A. May, Frank Kelly and Richard Morgan and J. Emmett Cade, chairman of the industrial committee of the New London Chamber of Commerce.

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### France Would Follow Reds' Foreign Policy

Most Impartial Observers Agree Gradual Alignment Would Be Result Under Reds

(Last of three articles) By Robert C. Wilson

Paris, Dec. 4.—(AP)—A gradual alignment of France's foreign policy with that of Russia would result if the Communists take over the leadership of the fourth republic, according to most impartial observers here.

Whether or not—as most Frenchmen believe—the French Communist party is directly advised from Moscow, available evidence indicates that Communists would work a change in France's relations with the east and west.

Maurice Thorez, party secretary and Communist candidate for the premiership—vigorously asserts that his party would follow an independent foreign policy.

Hill Anglo-American Policy

However, both he and his co-chair of the party, Jacques Duclos, have been frequent critics of Anglo-American foreign policy, and are authors of the phrase—"atomic democracy"—to describe the American and the British.

And the official party organ, "L'Humanité," almost daily finds fault with British and American policy but never lifts its voice in criticism of Russian policy.

The Communist party line has consistently been more anti-American than anti-British. The Communists were bitterly critical of the American loan to France, and they have been bitterly critical of the American position in the Paris Peace conference and the Foreign Ministers council.

Nothing Said About Russia

Not a word was said about Russia.

The Communists have not yet taken it to announce whether they would take the foreign affairs portfolio if they succeed in forming a government, but certainly they would establish the policy to matter if the post were held by the M.R.P.'s Georges Bidault, Radical-Socialist Bernard Hérold, or a Communist.

The Communist reply to those who charge them with being pro-Russian down the line in foreign policy is to point to the conflict between their position and that of Moscow on Germany.

The Communists have supported first General de Gaulle and then Georges Bidault in the French demand for internationalization of the Ruhr and economic absorption of the Saar into France's economic system, whereas the Russians apparently prefer less drastic measures for the Ruhr and have not yet acceded to the request.

### Embargo Hits County Plants

Manufacturers Greet Impending Action With Varied Reactions

Hartford, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Hartford county manufacturers have greeted the impending freight embargo ordered effective at 12:01 a.m. on Friday by the Interstate Commerce commission with varied reactions.

Richard L. White, president of Anderson, Frey and Clark of New Britain, said last night his plant "probably" would have to close a week after the ban became effective.

F. A. Washter, secretary of the Gray Manufacturing company, said he would not "feel the effect" before the month or six weeks.

A Connecticut dress manufacturer who declines to permit identification, said the embargo would mean the "immediate lay-off" of his 200 employees.

Unable to Predict Result

Many other plant executives said they were unable to predict the result of the embargo, adding their companies would keep going as long as it was "humanly possible."

James M. Taylor, president of the Hartford County Manufacturers' association, predicted that many of the area's smaller industries would be unable to continue operations, "indefinitely" because their materials and their markets were within truck range.

He said, however, that industries whose finished products are transported to railroads would be unable to produce any longer as they would lose their means of storage space at railroads, he said, would be used up shortly after the embargo began.

### Weapon Found On Lake's Bed

Box of Ammunition Also Recovered; To Be Examined by Experts

Meriden, Dec. 4.—(AP)—Detective Capt. Walter L. Kuroon has just announced the recovery of a revolver and a box of ammunition from the bed of Mirror lake but has declined to say whether there was any connection between the weapon and the slaying on Nov. 8 of James A. Leach, a department store assistant manager.

Kuroon said Monday when police started to drain the pond, however, that they hoped to find the weapon with which Leach was slain.

Found in Separate Packages

The weapon and the box of ammunition, Kuroon said, were found Tuesday in separate packages about 20 feet from the east shore of the pond. The two packages were retrieved by Detective John Pomeroy and James Conlin of the State Police Special Services division and Sgt. Lawrence DeRose and David Doberty who after donning boots, raised the muddy bottom.

### 'Auto-Plane' Decision Given

Hadden Answers Questions Propounded by McCarthy on Vehicle

Hartford, Dec. 4.—(AP)—When an automobile is a connecting link between highways and an automobile, says William L. Hadden, the state's attorney general.

The "auto-plane," such as was tested recently at Danbury, had State Motor Vehicle Commissioner John T. McCarthy up in the air until Hadden answered yesterday several questions which the commissioner had propounded.

McCarthy wanted to know whether it was lawful for such a thing to run on the highways, whether the inspection laws applying to automobiles also applied to it and whether he had the authority to make regulations governing the use of such a contraption.

His queries were inspired by a recent incident in which an "auto-plane" landed on a highway in Groton and, driven by its propeller, crossed the Thames river bridge between Groton and New London.

No Longer Aircraft

"Due to the metamorphosis which occurs (the folding of the wings against the fuselage) before the machine is operated on the highway," Hadden ruled, "it is, for that period of operation, no longer aircraft. It is then a vehicle propelled or drawn by power other than muscular. The peculiarity of the shape of the body as compared to the standard type of motor vehicle seen on highways, and the exposed whirling propeller do not
