Bilbo Inquiry Held Wide Open; Public Hearing Recessed

Clashing testimony is heard about \$1,500 payment in narcotics case; Senator denies repeatedly any knowledge of payments.

Washington, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Clashing testimony about payment of \$1,500 in a narcotics case held the Bilbo investigation wide open today as the stormy public hearings recessed for the Christmas holiday.

Senator Theodore S. Bilbo (D., Miss.), told the Senate Judiciary Committee yesterday as he denied repeatedly any knowledge of payments reported to have been made to him by a doctor for being get a narcotic permit for a patient, Miss. man.

Offer to Open Private Files Bilbo also offered to open his private files to investigators seeking information on the narcotics allegation, or "anything else that has come up in these hearings."

Admits Receiving Money Bilbo, after nearly a full day of testimony dealt with bitter denunciations, finally acknowledged to the senators investigating his financial dealings with Miami, Fla., contractor, that he had received some money from Dr. A. J. Podesta, a Viennese, Miami, who had requested the narcotics permit.

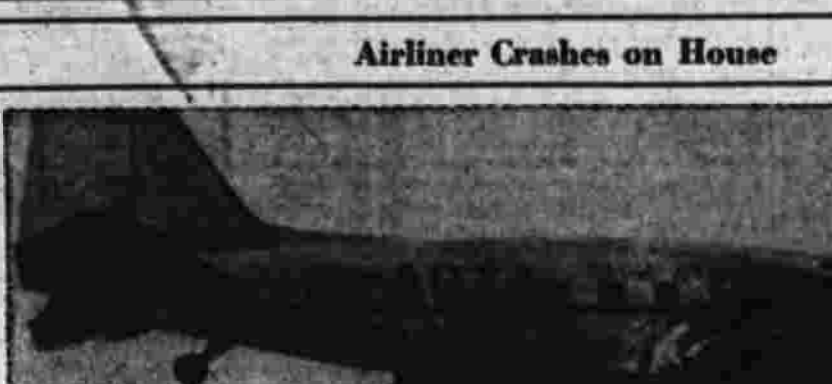

Mary Cheney Library has been presented with a memorial book by the members of the Manchester Green school.

Winter Brings Many Hazards

Dangerous Driving Period Starts Sunday According to Calendar

Winter starts officially Sunday, according to the calendar, and on that day driving rules should be observed, according to a safety bulletin issued by the Highway Safety Commission. If motor vehicle use during the annual hazardous winter season is to be reasonably accident free, the bulletin calls attention to the many accidents, mostly of skidding variety, involving drivers during the sudden freeze that weeks which grade road surfaces almost unusable for vehicles not equipped with non-skid equipment.

"For the next eight to ten weeks," states the Highway Safety Commission bulletin, "motorists will face the well known hazards which accompany New England winters. Vehicles should be winterized to ensure efficient mechanical operation. Winter equipment should be provided and checked to ensure availability in the emergency bound to occur.

"Adherence to these precautions will provide an added margin of safety. It is possible to develop, assuming the operator is awake to his responsibilities and obeys the rules of the road, a safe winter driving record. Here are the ten rules of winter driving:

1. Speed. Slow down on slippery surfaces. Use second gear in traffic. Frequently check rear view mirror. Be cautious in turning or stopping. Use brakes with care, applying pressure intermittently. Never Jan brakes. Wheels may lock and throw car into dangerous skid.
2. Windshield. Ample vision is essential to safe driving. Keep windshield wiper in effective operating condition. Check frequently to ensure means of clearing sleet from glass. Remove snow from windshield and all windows before entering trafficways.
3. Chains. Use chains for efficient traction when surface conditions require. Full attention before starting trip to avoid extra work involved in stopping on roads, on publicways and being exposed to hazards of passing vehicles. Remove chains as soon as slippery surface conditions justify. Chains should have good tread and be in good condition.
4. Pedestrians. Be watchful for pedestrians, especially during twilight hours when so much foot traffic is abroad. Pedestrians are difficult to see, especially when street surfaces are wet and reflect lights. In urban districts, watch movement during dark hours, particularly when workers are home, ward homes should be slow and careful.
5. Darkness. Twilight comes early in winter. As stated in rule four, the twilight hours are the worst for traffic accidents involving pedestrians. Also for side-swiping of other cars. Do not drink in cities and when meeting other cars. It is the state's duty to provide adequate lighting.
6. Signals. Remember that winter weather does not repeal laws requiring signals of driving intentions. Remember the driver behind must be warned of any sudden change in your driving plans or a collision will result from his inability to stop quickly on winter road surfaces.
7. Hills. Respect grades, especially where signs warn of steepness. Shift into second gear descending hills.
8. Headlights. If your car is old and headlights have not been replaced it is well to anticipate light failure by having new units installed. Use low beam when weather demands. High beam reflects back. Keep lenses clean for maximum efficiency. Light is a "must" in winter.
9. Soft shoulders. Watch out for shoulders in turning off the paved highway. Keep out of mud, icy ruts, etc. Stay on cleared main roads.
10. Stated. When car is mind or blocked in snow, take it easy. Rock the car back and forth. Don't spin wheels, you'll only dig in deeper and make the task of getting out more difficult. Carry a small shovel and sand in the luggage compartment. Shovel around wheels to provide traction.

Gives Report On GI Loans

Only 17 Farm Loans Advanced of 6,009 in Hartford Area

Of the 6,009 GI loans guaranteed by the Hartford Regional Office of the Veterans Administration, only 17 were for farming purposes, Edward W. O'Meara, VA loan guaranty officer, announced today.

"Mostly per cent of the loans we have guaranteed thus far for Connecticut veterans have been for the purchase or construction of homes," O'Meara said, "and 539 veterans have received GI loans for business purposes."

O'Meara pointed out that the banks and lending agencies actually lend the money to the veterans, but the Veterans Administration, "The VA," O'Meara said, "merely guarantees a certain portion of the loan made by a lending agency to a qualified veteran. A veteran desiring to obtain a GI loan for a home, business or farm, contacts a bank or lending agency and makes all arrangements with that institution."

According to O'Meara, Connecticut banks and lending agencies have loaned a total of \$38,000,037

Traffic Safety Survey Urged

Special Attention to Children's School Crossings Is Advised

School and police officials in communities in this area were urged today by Charles Beach, of the Safety Committee of the Automobile Club of Hartford to re-examine traffic safety conditions at corners where large numbers of children cross to and from school, with a view to re-routing to the most protected crossings.

"As the demand for police enforcement in traffic work grows," Mr.

Beach said, "the need of providing officer-protection at certain crossings used by school children, is being increasingly examined as police officials are best with the need to reassign their men."

"Before police are withdrawn there should be a careful survey made with attention to such important matters as traffic volumes, speeds, roadway widths, sight distances, accident experience, and so whether, by re-routing school child traffic, the crossing can be eliminated."

"In some places, where the withdrawal of the police becomes mandatory, and the traffic situation is too dangerous for the School Safety Patrol to handle, satisfactory protection might be afforded by the use of civilian crossing guards, or the installation of pedestrian-actuated signals, or pedestrian walk signals, supplemented by Safety Patrols. In other places,

where the main hazard is an unimproved wide roadway, pedestrian islands of refuge can be constructed which, with efficient patrol operation, will be satisfactory. A

School safety stop by motorist usually is warranted, with the sign turned away; except where children are using the crossing," he concluded.

Memorial Field Plans Outlined

Inquiry Reveals Work Done by Committee And Future Program

In connection with the \$3,000 appropriation which will be requested at tonight's Town Meeting in the High School Hall, which appropriation is for detailed working plans and specifications for the development of Memorial Field, an inquiry has brought to light the work of the Memorial Field Committee up to this time and the immediate future plans regarding the actual development of the field.

Appointed by the Board of Selectmen in February of last year, the Committee organized on March 12, and has since held numerous meetings, several of which were held at the site of Memorial Field. Conferences with landscape architects park superintendents, municipal superintendents have been held, in order to get the best advice possible, so that the area would be planned for use in the most practical manner. The first step in this plan, required a topographical survey, and on April 2, Hayden Griswold, local civil engineer, was engaged to make this survey. Work in this connection proceeded as rapidly as possible and while Mr. Griswold was completing his survey, the Committee on April 24, engaged the services of James Klar and Associates to make the General Development of Site Plan. Working in close cooperation with the Memorial Field Committee, Mr. Klar prepared a preliminary plan and on May 28, met with the Committee and the plan was inspected carefully. Several changes were suggested by Committee members and Mr. Klar was instructed to further study the plan, having in mind the changes suggested.

One of the most important meetings was held on July 1, when George H. Hollister, superintendent of the parks for Hartford, met with the Committee to go over the grounds, and also to inspect the proposed layout, as prepared by Mr. Klar. Mr. Hollister advised the Committee regarding projects of this type and made some very fine suggestions, which were further studied by the committee and Mr. Klar incorporated them in a new plan, which was presented at the next meeting on July 17. Mr. Hollister also appeared at this meeting, to pass his opinion on the plan and was outspoken in his enthusiasm for the plan, declaring it to be very workable. Mr. Klar was then instructed to prepare this as the final plan and in September the final plan was delivered to the

Committee, which in turn presented it to the Town Planning Commission and the Board of Selectmen for their approval and acceptance. Accordingly both boards concurred in the approval and acceptance of the General Development Plan for Memorial Field.

Next Step in Plan
The next step in the plans of the Committee is to have prepared by the Town Engineer and Park Superintendent, working in collaboration with a landscape architect as a consultant, detailed working plans and specifications, covering the projects most likely to receive priority in actual development next spring. In this regard, it has been stated that the committee is not including plans for any buildings at this time, but propose to have prepared, working plans for the grounds, baseball field and bleachers, football field, track, multi-purpose paved area, which will include courts for tennis, volley ball, badminton etc., softball field.

Memorial Field Committee hopes to be able to have at least one or more of these facilities in operation during the summer of 1947. Every effort has been made by the committee to progress as rapidly as possible, having in mind at the same time the necessity of careful and practical planning. In this respect, the plan has been so prepared, that areas have been left for proposed school facilities, and regardless of whether these facilities are planned for the southern or East Center street end, or the Middle Turnpike street end, no major recreation facility as proposed in the plan will have to be changed or moved. The Memorial Field Plan has been favorably accepted and the people of Manchester await with interest, the actual development of the field, as a memorial to the men and women of Manchester who served their country in World War II.

level of other friends of field and forest here is how Stephen takes them: "Elephants, 600 degrees; tigers and lions, about the same as a cat; just about like the dog-101. And applies vary with the temperature of their surroundings."

Their latest effort failed this week when "Bono," one-pound offspring of the Cincinnati zoo's Polar bear, "North Star," died of malnutrition three days after birth. "Bono" (rhyme) he was destined there is only one way to solve the problem of bottle-feeding infant polar bears.

"We're just going to have to milk an adult female Polar bear under ideal conditions. Then we can break down and analyze the milk and duplicate it."

Milking a full-grown lady Polar bear, however, is to men what being a cat is to mice. It is to men what being a dog is to a dog. Polar bears without regard to sex are mean-tempered, vicious and can bite with extra power.

"I could just knock out the mother with a drug like I use on lions and tigers," said Stephen. "Then I could get a sample of her milk."

"But you're fooling with a \$500 animal, and it's a major operation to give one an anesthetic."

He believes Polar bear milk is rich in fat proteins but little "Bono" couldn't make the grade as a substitute diet of homogenized cow's milk, cod liver oil and sugar.

"I thought Bono would make it. He had the will to live. He squawked like a couple of kittens. I fed him off my fingers. He took it but it might as well have been water. He couldn't digest it. I pumped him up a little on the third day with some weak whiskey, corn syrup and orange juice, but he died in six hours."

Taken Linn Hard

Stephen took the loss hard—the family has tried 40 times to save polar bear cubs—but his 80-year-old grandfather, Sol A. Stephen, who has been treating zoo animals for 42 years, looked at him with twinkling eyes and said:

"Well, son, just keep trying."

The Stephens have tried several incubators and immovable heaters, and they get letters from all parts of the nation suggesting new types of feeding.

"But we have two strikes on us before we start," said the youngest. "If the father bear is around at the time of birth, he just snatches over and pokes up the cubs. And the mother is usually so nervous and clumsy that she trips or steps on the cubs, killing or injuring them before we can get them away from her."

Female polar bears are very sensitive mothers. The Milwaukee zoo is the only one that has been able to build a deep retreating den adjoining to these sniffling mammas of the frigid north. It also is the only zoo that has been able to persuade the mother to retire into a den and bring up the cubs she gave up in captivity.

Stephen right now is considerably annoyed at all Polar bears.

"Very little is really known about them," he said. "No one, for example, really knows the normal body temperature of a Polar. I'd give \$500 to find out. They're so darn mean they break every thermometer you bring near them and anyway they get excited and that about up the temperature."

Little "Bono" registered 100 degrees, but he was hardly a normal Polar bear.

Chickens and ostriches have the highest body temperatures—106—and in case you've spent sleepless nights worrying about the heat

Tax Evasion Cases Costing Millions

Boston, Dec. 20.—National wide tax evasions, costing the government millions of dollars, were reported by David V. Cahill, Internal Revenue bureau regional commissioner, upon his arrival here yesterday to advise on trial procedure in New England cases.

Cahill told newsmen that important groups were involved in the national evasions and that many instances of tax dodging "on a large scale" had been uncovered in the northeast states.

The first New England case probably will be called early in the new year, sources close to Internal Revenue officials said.

New Haven, Dec. 20.—The Yale University library today was in possession of what it termed one of the most complete files in existence of The New York World-Journal, a colonial paper edited by John Peter Zenger. Chief of Frank Atascoti, former chairman of the Yale Library Association, the collection includes Numbers one through 154 of the paper, covering the period from Nov. 5, 1733, to Oct. 18, 1738.

Resort Homes Control Free

Will Be Exempt from Control During Normal Summer Season

Further details of a move to increase the number of available dwelling accommodations were announced yesterday by James Thomas Sullivan, Area West Director. Under the plan, recently announced, landlords owning resort properties suitable for year-round occupancy, are assured that even if these properties are rented now, they will be exempt from Rent Control during the normal resort season between June first and September 30, next summer.

There are a good many such accommodations, Mr. Sullivan explained. In some instances, these cottages haven't been available for winter occupancy because landlords didn't wish to be held to Maximum Legal Rents, which would apply during the winter months.

As a rule of thumb, Mr. Sullivan suggested that if a resort cottage was exempt from Rent Control last summer, it will be exempt next summer, irrespective of the rate at which it may rent between now and the first of next June. Resort cottages were defined, for purposes of this commitment to landlords as cottages located at resort areas . . . above, lake or mountains . . . and customarily rented on a seasonal basis only.

If these are rented during the winter months, they must be registered and will be subject to a maximum legal rent during the winter and spring months. However, on the first of June, neither
