

Seeds of New Chinese Party Struggle Seen

First Signs of Impending Fight Following Marshall Statement Appear in Comments

Peiping, Jan. 9.—(P)—General Marshall's statement on the China situation may have sown the seeds of a new struggle within the Kuomintang (government party)—between extreme rightists and the "splendid liberals" he said were the nation's only salvation.

First signs of an impending party fight appeared in today's Chih Shih Jih Pao, published by Chiang Kai Shek's Peiping headquarters. Its comments on the Marshall statement were regarded as liberal support for the generalissimo.

The paper recalled "we opposed in the past uncompromising elements in the Kuomintang. We hope liberal elements will come out bravely recognizing the generalissimo's determined liberalism and exert power and strength to the end that the road to life will be found in the midst of death."

"Like Stone On Hearts"

It said the Marshall's critical statement "seems like a 1,000 catty (1,333 pound) stone had been placed on our hearts."

"Both the Reds and the government continued under cover of peace talks to show an concern for the people's suffering. They were only interested in maintaining sovereign powers. Both sides still hold tenaciously to old grudges of 20 years standing. Factions in power on both sides have no strong determination to cancel old hates with a stroke of the pen."

Appointment Welcomed

The paper welcomed Marshall's appointment as mediator of the state.

Most Americans here are of the opinion that General Marshall's strong statement on China will lead to the abolition of Executive (trust) headquarters (government withdrawal of the U. S. Marines from the country).

A highly placed American, after reading the statement in which Marshall blamed extremists of both the Kuomintang (government party) and the communists for China's troubles, was asked if it natural followed that the headquarters would be abolished.

He did not say that directly, but since U. S. representative work with both government and Communist commissioners in the headquarters, summed it up this way:

"The United States cannot permit the Chinese to conduct a civil war under the auspices of Executive headquarters."

"We will have to make the first move toward closing down this organization. Neither the government nor the Communists will take the responsibility of assuming the stigma attached to dissolving this last peace organization."

Chinese American officials in Nanking also speculated that the Peiping headquarters would be closed.

Actually, the headquarters has been bipartite instead of tripartite ever since government-Communist negotiations broke down in Nanking.

'Outside' Date Set to Start On Labor Bills

Senate and House Leaders Pick Jan. 20 as Deadline; Idea to Discourage Walkouts

Washington, Jan. 9.—(P)—Rep. Francis Case (R-S.D.) today introduced legislation authorizing the government to enforce labor unions from strikes that endanger the public welfare and making workers liable to unfair labor charges. Case, author of a labor bill that passed Congress last year only to meet a presidential veto, said his new measure is intended to let labor and management "live together" in peace.

The bill is expected to be introduced in the House today and in the Senate tomorrow.

The Labor committee of one or the other chamber may go into action before then. But there is a chance they may launch together—a week from Monday—one of the biggest double features billed on Capitol Hill in many a year.

The idea, at both ends of the Capitol is the same—to turn out some kind of a bill that will tighten the screws a bit on labor unions and discourage strikes that paralyze business.

Case to Outline New Measure

Dozens of labor bills already have been introduced by individual lawmakers. Representative Case (R., S. D.) planned to outline a new strike control measure today.

Representative Hoffman (R., Mich.), a Labor committee member, has still another on tap for tomorrow.

The new Case bill is expected to be fully as far reaching, and perhaps more restrictive, than the one he backed last year. It was killed by a presidential veto.

In the Senate, Senator Ball (R., Minn.) put forward a new measure to outlaw the closed shop. It would make illegal all provisions in any present or future contract requiring a person to be a union member to get or hold a job.

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Marshall Vote Unity Notice

Senate Unanimity Solidifies Unbroken Foreign Policy Accord

Washington, Jan. 9.—(P)—The dominantly Republican Congress put the world on notice today that American foreign policy has the same united backing in peace as it had in war.

The chorus of Senate unanimity with which Gen. George C. Marshall won his senatorial confirmation as successor to Secretary of State James F. Byrnes demonstrated not only congressional confidence in his ability, but also solidified bipartisan agreement on the necessity for an unbroken foreign policy.

Support Rests on Twin Bases

The support for Marshall, bridging party differences, apparently rested on twin bases: (1) His record during and since the war, and (2) the conviction that he not only will pursue the "patient but firm" policies of Byrnes but will carry on his predecessor's practice of working closely with Congress.

This was reflected in a growing legislative demand for Marshall to address a joint congressional session before he leaves for the March 10 meeting of the Foreign Ministers' council in Moscow and the task of seeking big-four agreements on Germany and Austria.

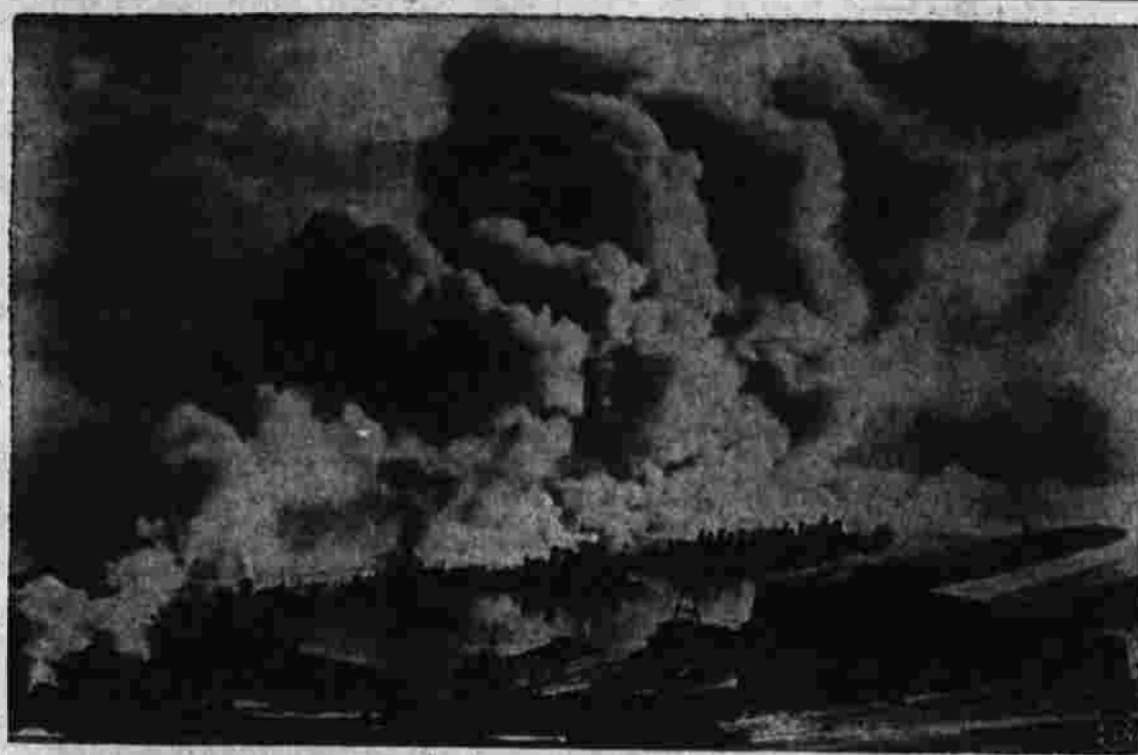
It raised, too, the likelihood that Marshall will seek to have Senators Vandenberg, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations committee, and Connally, its ranking Democratic member, at his side that meeting.

Church Must Erase Racial Segregation

Buck Hill Falls, Pa., Jan. 9.—(P)—In a self-styled "revolutionary" report, a special committee of Protestant churchmen insisted today the Christian church must erase all racial segregation and discrimination if it wants to remain champion of "human rights."

The committee made its report at the annual meeting of the Home Missions Council of North America here, which represents 23 major Protestant denominations. The group is in the third day of a four-day session.

Old Age Pensioners Get Jackpot Today

Denver, Jan. 9.—(P)—Colorado gave each of its old age pensioners a \$230.80 "jackpot" payment today in addition to their \$45 monthly pensions.

The Welfare Director Earl M. Kouns said the payment was the highest ever paid to pensioners in the United States in any month "so far as I know." The pension payment and jackpot went to 42,350 persons.

The huge "jackpot" payment resulted from a provision in Colorado's law that all money in the pension fund must be divided each January among the persons on the pension rolls. Increased sales and liquor tax receipts are largely responsible for the record-breaking payment.

Franklin Descendant Beneficiary of Fund

New York, Jan. 9.—(P)—Franklin Bache Huntington, 71, great-great-grandson of Benjamin Franklin, lay ill today in a dreary, cluttered apartment pondering his grand-sire's precepts.

Huntington, whose ancestors made American history, needs funds for a season in the sun of Florida to recoup his health, physicians say.

Launches Fund-Raising Drive

When a friend described his need, Printing News, a weekly devoted to the graphic arts, launched a fund-raising campaign to aid the descendant of America's most renowned early printer—Benjamin Franklin.

Charles C. Green, treasurer of the International Benjamin Franklin society, was named treasurer of the fund and today reported that \$500 has been contributed.

The plan was launched, friends said, after Huntington, a lieutenant commander in the Naval Reserve, was denied admission to the Brooklyn-Naval hospital—designed, incidentally, by his grandfather, Rear Admiral Benjamin Franklin Bache—directed at various times by two uncles and the place where his mother was born.

Technological Revolution Promises Better Living

New York, Jan. 9.—(P)—Murray Shields, economist and vice president of the Bank of Manhattan company, said today the nation is in the midst of great technological revolution which promises to raise the standard of living to undreamed-of levels.

In an address prepared for delivery before the marketing conference of the American Management association, Shields declared that "many of the barriers to

business expansion, which kept American industry in the doldrums for over a decade, have recently been removed." He stated that:

"The deflation which accompanied the depression is behind us, the war has been fought and won, the new Congress reflects the desire of the people to have done with the reforms which he said had stifled business initiative, and prospects are for successive and substantial tax reductions,

Think Food Prices Will Go Lower

Brokers on Commodity Exchange Markets Not Bidding So High On 'Futures' Contracts

Chicago, Jan. 9.—(P)—The men who are among the best informed about food prices, the brokers on the country's commodity exchange markets, think prices will go lower.

Many new year predictions have been made recently by banks, economists and business men concerning future prices. But the forecasts on exchanges are the composite opinions of brokers dealing in the commodities.

Butter Drop Forecast

Butter prices are high, but you can buy some butter today on the Chicago mercantile exchange for delivery in June at about 53 cents a pound. That's around 22 cents under present wholesale prices.

For the average person who just wants some butter to spread on bread that wouldn't be practical—you'd have to take 19,200 pounds, which is the amount represented by a "futures" contract. To save yourself from being drowned in butter you'd better sell before delivery day.

Significance of that 53 cent price, however, is that it is today's best guess of the butter and egg

Defense Costs Stands Differ

Taber Demanding Outlays Be Cut While Taft Counsels Otherwise

Washington, Jan. 9.—(P)—Congressional Republicans are at odds among themselves today over national defense costs.

Representative Taber (NY) is demanding that Army-Navy outlays be cut drastically while Senator Taft (Ohio) is counseling against such a course.

Taber, who heads the new House Appropriations committee, told a reporter he is convinced the military services can get along with \$2,000,000,000 between them in the budget year beginning next July 1.

Furthermore, he said that if President Truman recommends a larger amount in the budget message to Congress tomorrow, steps will be taken to trim the proposed expenditures.

Taft, chairman of the Senate G.O.P. Steering committee, told a newsmen he thinks Senate Republicans want to find budget reductions elsewhere and not make them at the expense of national defense.

Will Insist on Savings

Senator Bridges (R., N. H.) who heads the Senate Appropriations committee, shares this overall view. He said, however, he and others will insist that savings be effected where military operations can be combined.

Bridges said he thinks a number of Army camps, now being maintained in the country with skeleton staffs, could be closed and some reductions made that way.

Taber contended that about \$2,500,000,000 can be lopped off military expenditures for items and services that were necessary in the past, but no longer needed.

Bombay, Jan. 9.—(P)—Riotous clashes broke out today between Hindus and the scheduled castes (untouchables), causing casualties estimated to total 50.

Police announced an all night curfew for the affected northern area of Bombay. The new outbreak complicated the serious communal troubles between Hindus and Moslems.

Officers fired repeatedly to break up fights, principally by workers. Tension was acute as darkness approached.

Denies Charge Husband Slain

Pathologist Asserts Victim Struck Over His Head With Toy Boat

Bristol, Eng., Jan. 9.—(P)—The prosecution charged today that Mrs. Rosina Ann Cornock, 34, bludgeoned her husband with a toy boat and drowned him in a bathtub after she fell in love with a crippled clerk.

"That is not true!" she exclaimed at her murder trial. In a pre-trial statement she had said her husband, Cecil, was a sexual pervert "and used to get violent at times." She is the mother of a boy, 10.

Mrs. Cornock was pale and nervous as the clerk, 30 years her junior, entered the courtroom on two cases and described a scene in the Cornocks' breakfast room. The witness, Gilbert K. Bedford, said he saw Cornock, dressed in a woman's clothes, gagged and tied to a water heater while his wife beat him across the back with a stick.

Afterward, he said, he told Mrs. Cornock "it was wicked that she should have to do such a thing" and she replied:

"He makes me do worse than that."

Evidence Association Knows

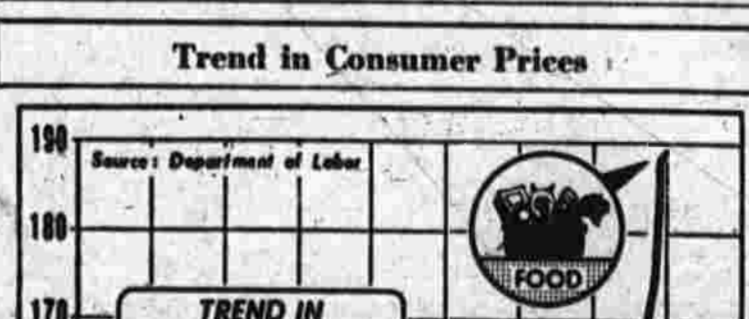
There was evidence, the prosecutor told the court, that Cornock knew of his wife's association with Bedford. Cornock was a technical adviser for the Ministry of Supply.

Bedford was in the Cornock house the night of the alleged murder when Mrs. Cornock told police she had found her husband dead in the bath.

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United States Asks Poles Honor Pledge For Free Elections



Warsaw, Poland, Jan. 9.—(P)—The United States called on Poland today to honor her pledge to hold free and unfettered elections. The Polish foreign minister charged the provisional Polish regime with continued "suppression, coercion and intimidation" of the opposition, violating the letter and spirit of the Yalta and Potsdam agreements.

Constitution in 43 Districts

The general election is scheduled for Jan. 18. Vice Premier Stanislaw Mikolajczyk announced last night the Polish peasant party, bulwark of the opposition to the Russian-backed regime, would contest the government coalition in 43 of the 52 electoral districts despite its charges of intimidation, political arrests and irregularities.

Mikolajczyk told a news conference, however, that his party might yet boycott the elections if at the last minute it appeared that free voting was impossible. He said the party Executive committee was empowered to reverse its decision of last night, should abuses continue.

The United States note, one of the last drafted under auspices of Secretary of State Byrnes, expressed concern over "repressive measures which the government has seen fit to employ against democratic elements not aligned with the pro-government bloc."

The note said that if repressive activities "do not cease immediately, there is little likelihood that a free and unfettered election" can be held.

Ernest Notes Unanswered

The government has not yet answered American notes of Aug. 19 and Nov. 22. The new communication said Poland was a party to the Potsdam agreement of the United States, Russia and Great Britain, and emphasized that the 44-year old former Army colonel in seeing that the Polish people had a chance to express their true will in the election.

The cabinet had had international issues, including Palestine, under review for two weeks and was reported to have decided that peace with Germany

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Bandits Break Open 2 Safes

12 Roomers Held Prisoner Nearly Two Hours As Landlord Robbed

Chicago, Jan. 9.—(P)—A gang of bandits, carrying revolvers and shotguns, routed 12 persons from a three-story West side rooming house last night and while several gunmen held their companions prisoner nearly two hours their companions broke open two safes owned by John McKenzie, the landlord. Money and other possessions of the roomers were ignored by the gunmen.

McKenzie, 64, was not at home at the time, but early today he told Des Plaines police he had \$11,000, jewelry and "lots of mortgages" in the safes. Police said McKenzie had lived in the old mansion all his life and owned considerable property on the West Side.

Men's Hands Tied

The roomers herded from their apartments by the bandits included four women, one an invalid, a 13 year old boy, and seven men.

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Chinese Reds Halt Traffic Guerrillas Threaten Tientsin-Pukow Railroad Despite Reverses

Peiping, Jan. 9.—(P)—The Chinese press today reported Communist guerrillas had interrupted motor traffic on the Peiping-Tientsin highway despite repeated reversals and that they threatened the Tientsin-Pukow railroad.

Government reinforcements were rushed to Hsianggho, 26 miles east of Peiping, one of several towns and villages where fighting was reported along the highway.

Attacking Two Towns

Other Communist troops were attacking two towns five and 11 miles south and southeast of Peiping.

The Tientsin-Pukow railroad was threatened by fighting at Tsunghsien, 60 miles southeast of Tientsin.

At Nanking, a Communist news dispatch said Communists won a three day battle southwest of Linyi in southern Shantung province. The dispatch said the Communists recovered Lanlin, southwest of Linyi, and seized Peishien nearby.

The committee also acted unanimously in approving the appointment of Ernest S. Warner Austin of Vermont as United States representative on the United Nations Security Council, with the rank of ambassador.

Refuses to Answer Questions

Frankfurt, Germany, Jan. 9.—(P)—(AP)—David F. Watson of Berkeley, Calif., refused today to answer a series of prosecution questions when he was called to testify against his former superior officer accused in the \$1,500,000 Kronsberg castle jewel thefts. Watson recently received a three-year sentence for conspiracy in the thefts. He asserted answers to the questions "would incriminate" him as he sat poker-faced before the court martial trying Col. Jack W. Durant of Chicago.

Cold Causes 22 Deaths

Frankfurt, Germany, Jan. 9.—(P)—The Hamburg Town council announced today that 22 Germans had died because of cold in the last three days and 27 had been hospitalized. At Heidenbergen 100 Germans died in a vain attempt to obtain coal for unheated homes. The current cold wave is Germany's worst in 18 years.
