Husband-Wife Filing Not Simple Problem

Must Decide Whether To File Single or Joint Returns; Both Ways Should Be Tried

(Editor's Note: This is the fourth of 12 stories explaining who must do what about filing his income tax returns.)

Washington, March 6.—Here are points to remember about husband-wife filing of 1946 income tax returns by March 15. A husband gets a \$500 exemption for himself and he can claim another \$500 exemption for his wife if she had no income. If she had \$500 or more income, she must file either separately or jointly with her husband. In such a case, if she files separately, she claims her own \$500 exemption and the husband claims only his \$500 exemption. If they file jointly, they claim a total exemption of \$1,000.

Her husband can't claim the usual \$500 exemption for her and, of course, she can't claim her own \$500 exemption. Keep Two Things In Mind: 1. Treasury experts say that where a wife has income less than \$500—and she and her husband are going to file a return—they'll save money by making a joint return.

2. Where husband and wife can file jointly on Form W-2, the withholding statement, they should do so. It will save them time and effort, and for this reason: The collector, by law, goes over their returns and must figure out which is cheaper for them, a single or joint return. He gives them the benefit of the cheaper way. If you're not in those two groups above, try both ways—single and joint returns—before deciding which you'll give the collector as your 1946 return. Fears Canadian Freighter Lost

Boston, March 6.—Coast Guard stations and lightships in New England waters were alerted today to be on the lookout for the 2,377-ton Canadian freighter Nevada, missing since Sunday night when seas were reported pounding over her deck.

As the Coast Guard withdrew sea and aircraft from the hunt, Lt. Comdr. George V. Stephano, captain of the cutter Albatross, expressed fear that the ship was in the hands of all hands.

The ship, on route from Digby county, N. S., to New York with a cargo of gypsum, carried a crew of 25.

Despite Stephano's fears, a spokesman for the Peterson Steamship Line, of port Wilton, N. H., said there was still a faint hope that the ship is afloat.

Negro Maid Tells Story of Slavery

Los Angeles, March 6.—Miss Doris L. Jones, 57-year-old Negro house maid, appeared yesterday before a Federal grand jury investigating government allegations that she was kept in slavery for 30 years.

Presumably she told the tribunal the story of her life, with Mr. and Mrs. Alfred W. Ingalls of Corona, Calif., against whom U. S. Attorney James M. Carter said he will seek an indictment charging violation of the anti-slavery amendment to the constitution.

Ingalls, 64, a retired Boston lawyer, and his wife, Elizabeth, 62, are at liberty under \$2,000 bond each following their arrest Feb. 16 on a complaint charging they had kept Miss Jones in involuntary servitude. They have called the charges "ridiculous."

William Rital, assistant prosecutor, said Mr. and Mrs. Ingalls had been given an opportunity to deny the charges. They refused to do so, but had not yet appeared.
