Veterans' Housing

May Mean Special Assembly Session Governor Back from Washington Suggests This Procedure to Consider Enabling Legislation Required for Federal Program

State Capitol, Hartford, March 23.—(P)—The possibility of a special session of the General Assembly to consider enabling legislation which might be required by a Federal veterans' housing program was suggested today by Gov. James L. McConaughy.

The chief executive, back from Washington where he discussed the bill with the Connecticut congressional delegation, said he felt "optimistic" that a Federal housing program would be worked out.

"We will cross the bridge when we come to it," commented the chief executive.

Will Call Session But he added he would be "willing" to call the Legislature back for a special session, if it should be determined that Connecticut is not doing enough to handle the matter.

The governor said at his press conference that he had discussed his Washington trip with legislative leaders today, and that the Legislature should mark time on housing legislation pending Federal action on the program.

Need More Information Concurrence was voiced by two Connecticut members of the House, William J. Miller and Horace Seelye, both Republicans.

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It is to be hoped that one of these moves is that announcing the establishment of a "central master index" on which the loyalty of federal employees will be charted, providing for investigation of all federal employees by the FBI, and providing that the attorney general shall be charged with designating which organizations in our midst are subversive in character—thus as serious American policy.

If the object of this move on the part of the President was merely to alarm and frighten Americans by a new revival of the perennial scare over "Red" employees in our governmental system, it would still be a worthy tactic.

But if President Truman seriously proposes that this country shall, in effect, adopt the same kind of secret police control over the opinions of its own citizens that featured the regimes in Fascist Italy and Nazi Germany and which still features the present regime in Soviet Russia, then the people of this country had better take time out from their contemplation of dictatorial schemes, and give some attention to what is developing here at home.

**Dark Hours Menace Traffic**  
 Hartford, March 25—Seventy-one per cent of the 243 reported accidents last year met death between the hours of sundown and sunrise, according to the summary of reports during the past week Monday by the Connecticut State Department of Health during the week that measles have been the state's most prevalent disease.

A whopping cough, syphilis gonorrhea and meningococcus meningitis were also on the increase this week. Whooping cough cases jumped from 46 to 54, syphilis cases from 25 to 45, and meningococcus meningitis from 17 to 27. Hartford reported the only case of meningococcus meningitis within the state this week, although one case was reported a week before at New Britain.

The incidence of most other reportable diseases declined during the week just ended. Chickenpox reported dropped from 295 to 208 cases, mumps from 165 to 138 cases, scarlet fever from 38 to 30 cases, and cases of bronchitis pneumonia from 30 to 22. At the same time, laboratory specimens declined from 18 to 15, and those of German measles from 9 to 7. No cases of poliomyelitis occurred during the week.

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**Business Tax Payments Due**  
 Corporation Reports Due by April 1, Commissioner Warns  
 Hartford, March 25—Stat. Tax Commissioner Walter W. Walsh today reminds all corporations doing business in Connecticut of the necessity for filing corporation business tax returns covering operations conducted during the calendar year 1946. If books are closed on December 31, on or before April 1.

Attention is called to the fact that payment of the amount of tax found due must accompany the return and further, all returns must be signed by proper officers of the company and sworn to before a Notary Public or other officer authorized to administer oaths. Failure to file on or before April 1 will result in payment of the statutory penalty of one per cent of the tax on the tax due the rate of six tenths of one per cent per month or fraction thereof from the due date of the return.

A reasonable extension of time will be granted provided there is filed before the due date a tentative return which must be signed and sworn to and accompanied by payment of the estimated tax on the tax due the rate of six tenths of one per cent per month or fraction thereof from the due date of the return.
