Collyer Legend About Finished

Find Body of Langley Amid Filth and Squall of Old Mansion

New York, April 9.—The finding of Langley Collyer's body amid filth and squall in the mansion he had inherited from his father, the late John D. Rockefeller, was the subject of a legend about finished.

There will be an autopsy to determine the cause of death, but police believe the 61-year-old reclusive, whose rat-gnawed body was found late yesterday, had been the victim of one of his own body traps, rigged to tumble heavy junk on an intruder.

Still uncertain was the source of a telephone message to police that led to the finding of the body of Collyer, 60, in the home March 21. Police found the one-time admirer of the front room of the second floor of the three-story brownstone, home near a window. It was the same room in which Langley died, possibly while taking food to the blind brother. Police were inclined to believe a report that Langley had been seen alive the day before his body was found.

130 tons of junk removed from the mansion discovered, 120 tons of junk, fifts and oddities had been removed from the house. Police began the job, which later was taken over by the public administrator's office.

Langley's body was wedged between a wooden dresser and iron bookcase which evidently had supported the heavy debris that had fallen on the body.

"This only bears out what the police thought all along—that Collyer was caught as the victim of one of his own body traps," said Police Commissioner Arthur W. Walander.

A rat described by a detective as "big as a rabbit" was found when the body was only five feet away from the main entrance.

The Collyer brothers were reared in a prosperous, old and cultivated family, the sons of Dr. Herman Livingston Collyer, a gynecologist who died in 1923, and Mrs. Susan Gage Collyer, who died in 1929. About that time the brothers began to squander, never giving any fuller explanation than that they preferred to live alone.

The finding of 14 pianos in the cluttered house indicated that in early years the brothers were not miserly with their fortune, recently valued by the family attorney at \$100,000. Rather they sought only security and safety behind the boarded up windows of the house on upper Fifth avenue.

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Ask Extension Of Labor Bill

Tobacco Planters in This Area Interested in Measure

Tobacco plantations in this area which have, in past years, contracted for foreign summer farm labor, may continue to get the extension of the law which would prohibit the importation of workers from the West Indies, and the extension of such a program is now being argued in Washington.

The Senate passed and sent back to the House late yesterday a six-month extension of the Federal farm labor supply program, which is scheduled to end June 30. Under the program the government pays for moving, housing and medical care for seasonal farm laborers, including thousands from Mexico and Jamaica.

The House, which already has approved the extension, will act on two more Senate amendments.

Senator Kern (R., Mo.) fought virtually a lone-hand battle against the bill during the debate which preceded passage by a voice vote, and which was interrupted by a "bottle competition" for "small farmers" who were invited to attend the program.

But senators from sugar, beet, fruit and vegetable and citrus areas, who fear that the program will be terminated in the last half of the year.

Boom Will Continue Three Months More

Much-Discussed Recession May Come After That; Need Not Lead To Depression

(Editor's Note: Will there be a business boom in the United States? If so, when will it come, how long will it last? The immediate future of business in this country is a subject of interest to all the world. The Associated Press has surveyed the situation and presents the results in a series of three articles. This is the first.)

The foreign situation is uncertain, adding to the risks of management planning. It remains a major impendence factor, a dampening influence on business felt to some degree almost throughout the economy. While business failures are still comparatively low — 65 in the latest records week — they were nearly four times as numerous as last year and probably would mount sharply in any sizable recession. The large number of firms incorporated since 1940 have known only good times. The magazine "Business Week" recently estimated that these complete cuts out of every five business enterprises in the United States, a relatively large number which would be among the most vulnerable to an economic dip. They are listed in bad times.

Aircraft Show Next Sunday

Bradley Field to Be Open to Public; Parley in the Evening

Hartford, April 9.—Flights of military and civilian planes will fill the air over Connecticut next Sunday afternoon, April 12, when the American Legion stages an Air Power Exhibition and draws open a section of Bradley Field for the public to watch flying and to inspect aircraft on the ground. As a climax to the afternoon exhibit in Windsor Locks, the Nation's foremost general, admiral and statesman will fly to Hartford to speak on America's air power during the evening.

The public will be admitted to Bradley Field starting at 2 p. m. Sunday, and grant military and civilian planes will be landing and taking off all afternoon. In addition to Army, Navy and civilian aircraft, the air squadron of the Connecticut National Guard will also be actively flying.

The Connecticut Air Power Conference Sunday evening at Bushnell Memorial, which follows the exhibition at Bradley Field, will reveal the critical condition of America's air strength. "The United States is now a third rate air power, lagging behind both Britain and Russia," says Louis J. Chavelier, state commander of the Legion. "As the nation's foremost aviation experts will fly to this state to tell us the startling truth about our weaknesses."

Highway Department Funds Inquiry Urged

Coax Urges Investigation Of Finances and Revenues Needed for Building New Roads

Hartford, April 9.—(Special)—Highway Commissioner William J. Cox, who last Friday announced he intended to retire July 1, has urged an investigation of his department's finances and the revenues needed for building new roads.

Cox, advocating a gasoline tax increase at a general assembly Finance committee hearing yesterday, said the "fact" of highway financing are "in the books of the state."

The commissioner charged opponents of a proposed bond in the gasoline tax with seeking to "confuse" and "mislead" the people with untrue statements.

On the basis of what he termed "the highway department's own figures," Benedict sought to convince the Legislature's Finance body that \$25,000,000 would be available for road construction within the next two years without tax increase.

Cox reiterated his stand that the state needs a bond issue to finance the highway program. He contended that the cost of administering a minimum wage law would not be justified by the number of workers who might benefit from it.

Most supporters of the measure were heard several weeks ago. At that time the majority contended a two-cent jump to five cents a gallon was necessary to maintain Connecticut's road construction on a pre-war basis.

Benedict asserted that without a new tax the state would have more than \$12,000,000 in the biennium with which to match Federal grants of \$12,000,000 for its road building program.

Talk Much About Economy. In Connecticut we have talked a lot about economy. Benedict declared, "but we have been asked wherever we turn, to do an urgent demand for more money for this and more money for that."

"In considering the proposal to increase the gasoline tax, it seems to me that we have been an excellent opportunity of giving the taxpayers a desirable break without in the least endangering the welfare of the state."

Benedict, during his remarks, stated that published reports of the Highway department indicated a \$7,000,000 surplus in the highway fund.

Prepare More School Room

Joint Committee Is Studying Means to Accommodate Pupils

Members of the joint committee from the Board of Selectmen and Education now studying the emergency and long range school building conditions in Manchester, have a great many considerations to keep in mind as they work on recommendations.

In September five rooms must be made available for the enrollment increase, according to School Superintendent Arthur H. Illing. And the members of the Education and Selectmen boards have joined in agreeing that the town needs new schools at some time in the near future—the sooner the better as long as satisfactory financing is arranged.

The interim period between what is done for this September, and what is done for the future. Even if new schools should be voted by the

town, and money made available for them, officials have estimated that it might be as long as two years, under present conditions, before these schools could be used. If financing of a long term nature such as a sinking fund type is adopted, the new school occupancy would be still farther away.

The committee now investigating therefore has had to think not only of this fall in its emergency planning, but of the needs which may have to be stop-gapped for as much as three or four years more.

While it will not apparently be too hard to find five more rooms for September, next year and the year after may see similar conditions repeating themselves, and the space problem growing more acute.

Charity Costs Are Increased

More Cases, More Persons Helped; Reason Given for the Boost

Charity cases in Manchester last month showed an increase in the number of cases, the number of persons aided, and also in the amount of money spent, according to figures completed this morning by Albert E. Behrend, Assistant Charity Superintendent.

The chief cause, Mr. Behrend said for the increase, was the added cost now paid for hospital care. During March there were 70 cases, representing 129 persons given aid at a cost of \$4,943.68. This compared with February when there were 64 cases, representing 113 persons aided at a total cost of \$4,386.94.

Charity costs in Manchester have also shown an increase this year. Of the \$75,000 appropriated for charity there was expended for April 1 \$44,208.70 against \$37,394 spent in the same period last year, or nearly \$7,000 more.
