### Charter Vote Here June 27

Manchester will vote on adoption of its new town charter June 27, an advance of the decision date from the previous plan to hold the referendum in the summer.

The Board of Selectmen which set the time at its meeting last night, made their choice on recommendation of the Charter Revision Committee which filed a report agreed by its chairman, Senator Charles S. House.

The charter, completed after public hearing, legislative approval and signature by Governor McCann, now awaits only a public vote of approval before becoming the governing instrument of the town.

The referendum will be held on the voting machines in the state armory, it was decided.

The question of the voting hours will be investigated and scheduled later, it was said, as no one present seemed certain as to this detail.

Yes or No Vote

The question will be decided by a "yes or no" vote, the wording being "shall the town of Manchester adopt the charter proposed by S. P. Co. General Assembly of 1947."

By provision of the charter, the town will have a council-manager type of government.

Under charter terms, the adoption of it prior to August 1 will mean that the town provisions in it become effective immediately and that officials named in it will be nominated and elected to take office on August 1.

### To Ask Review Of Rent Orders

The local Housing Authority has instructed Harold Eymondson, local manager, to write to the directors of the F.P.W. in Boston requesting that office to ask the Washington office for a review of the order to raise rents in Oxford Village and Silver Lane Homes.

The vote to table action came when Town Treasurer George H. Waddell explained that counsel for Mr. Bantly, Attorney Raymond A. Johnson, had been called suddenly to New York, and had asked an opportunity to be heard in behalf of his client.

Selectmen Set Date For Special Meeting

### Board to Scan School Budget

#### Officials to Meet on Monday to Complete Preliminary Figures

A meeting of the Manchester Board of Education will be held Monday evening in the office of Superintendent Arthur G. Ladd. ### Vets' Center Makes Report

#### For Six Months on May Total 566.90 Less Than Month of April

The monthly report of the Manchester Veterans' Service Center, as released this morning by Major Nathan B. Gatchell, director, shows that the total contacts for May numbered 566. This is 90 less than the contacts made during April. The report of the Center for the month of May compared with the report of the Center for the month of October, 1946. A peak was reached in January this year with over 900 contacts which are attributed to insurance re-insurances.
