Give Advice On Insurance

Veterans' Policies Convertible to Three Kinds Of Endowment Plans

(Editor's Note: This is the third of a series of articles by Thomas J. Sweeney, Jr., Connecticut Representative in charge of the Manchester Office of the Veterans Administration, designed to acquaint the Manchester veteran with the benefits offered by National Service Life Insurance and to show how he can use it to help attain his own financial objectives.)

National Service Life Insurance term policies may be converted to three kinds of endowment policies: 20-year endowment, endowment at age 60, and endowment at age 65. Endowments mature for the face amount of the insurance at the maturity date. For example, an endowment at age 60 for \$10,000 provides that in the event of your death prior to age 60, the \$10,000 is paid in one lump sum or in monthly installments to whomever you may designate as beneficiary. If however, you are still living at 60, then the \$10,000 will be paid to you in cash (or in deferred payments, if you desire).

Thus you have in an endowment an investment plan in which you may make regular periodic savings and investments during the whole of your working lifetime, so that you may have the necessities of life when you can no longer work. On endowments you may discontinue your plan at any time after one year and receive a proportionately reduced estate.

The advantage of saving your money in an endowment is that in the event you do not live long enough to complete your payments, the balance of the payments are cancelled and your family gets nothing.
