Board to Act On Petitions

Selection to Meet Tomorrow Evening to Discuss Appropriations

A \$400,000 appropriation will be passed on for future consideration of the voters when, tomorrow night, the Board of Selection meets to act on two petitions, one calling for an expenditure of \$200,000 for the development of Memorial Field according to plan of June, 1947, and the other asking \$200,000 for a second veterans housing project here.

It has been seven days since the Memorial Field petition, properly introduced to the Board. That body must act to call a special meeting on the question within 15 days. The housing petition, submitted a week ago, was not in proper order since the signatures had not then been certified by the town clerk. Thus, tonight will mark the official date of submission of the petition, which might be put over for later action. It is expected, however, that the Board will act on both. There also has been some talk of holding two separate town meetings so that the questions might be argued separately.

According to information supplied to the Board last week, today marks the final date for application for funds on the state aid type of veterans' housing, and it is true, some other type of additional finance will be arranged if the new project is approved and it is intended to have it match, or surpass, the extent of the presently building project. In the event of being built with one-half state aid.

Other current business also will be disposed of at tomorrow night's Board meeting.

Real Estate Lobby Probe Views Differ

Truman's Plea for Congressional Investigation Brings Broadside Of Clashing Reaction

Washington, July 1.—(AP)—President Truman's plea that Congress investigate what he called the "business operations of real estate lobbyists today generated a broadside of clashing reaction with political overtones.

The chief executive made his appeal in an annual report to Congress in which he signed a resolution permitting 15 per cent rent increases and linking nearly all construction contracts.

Senator Bricker (R., Ohio) denounced Mr. Truman's lobby investigation as an attempt to "curb the political democracy." But Senator Taft (R., Ohio) and Ohio colleague and like Bricker, widely mentioned as an aspirant for the Republican presidential nomination, told reporters in a conference that he would support the call for a full investigation.

Arthur W. Binna, head of the National Home and Progress Owners Foundation, said his group would support the investigation. "Nothing would please us more," Binna asserted, "than to see the record and the American people made aware of the reasons for the increase in the cost of housing."

However, Herbert U. Nelson, executive director of the National Association of Real Estate Boards, declared in another statement that it is "not proper to investigate" because of the "confidential nature of our activities, as required by law."

80,000 More Strike At Shipyards Today

Shutdown of Virtually All Major Shipbuilding and Repair Work On East Coast Looms

New York, July 1.—(AP)—A strike of CIO shipyard workers—previously confined to 10 yards in the Atlantic—spread to additional east and gulf coast plants today as a walkout of 80,000 more workers got under way, threatening a shutdown of virtually all major shipbuilding and repair work on the Atlantic coast.

The new walkout—began at 12:01 a. m. and announced in Chicago, N. Y., by an official of Local 1 of the Industrial Union of Marine and Shipbuilding Workers—brought to approximately 120,000 the number of men involved in the strike—some 42,000 having struck Thursday in 10 plants in Maryland and Massachusetts, New Jersey and New York.

The union official, who declined to be identified by name, said shortly after midnight that the strike will affect at least 22 of the 30 shipyards on the east and gulf coasts.

Vermont Starts State Police

Montpelier, Vt., July 1.—(AP)—State police officers are to patrol Vermont today for the first time in history. A 10-year-old five battle highlighted recently by claims that lack of a state force was a factor in the failure to solve the disappearance of Paula Walden.

The new enforcement group, including present motor vehicle inspectors and some of the recently graduated 34 men of a training school, will be in command of Brig. Gen. Merritt A. Edson, head of the new department of Public Safety.

General Edson won fame as leader of the Marine regiment known as "Edson's Raiders" and was decorated with the Congressional Medal of Honor for service on Guadalcanal.

Creation of the state police was recommended by Gov. Ernest W. Wilson and Vermont's need of such a patrol was cited repeatedly during the mystery of the Walden case. Industrial engineers, whose disappearance from the school Dec 1 is still unsolved.
