Road Oiling Started Here

Work Begun in Southwest Part of Town
The oiling of roads in Manchester got under way yesterday with work starting in the southwest part of the town. There were 4,000 gallons of oil applied yesterday on Hilltop road, Woodside street, and part of Keyway street. Hand takers from the town and on Love Lane were used for covering the oil. There were 125 tons of sand used.
The town is saving about \$100 a day by using sand from its own pit this year. The sand for this purpose has been hauled from different dealers at 70 cents a ton.
The oil used on the roads is purchased from a dealer in Portland, Me., and is delivered in Manchester at 70 cents. This makes possible getting the oil to the roads when it can be properly applied.

241 Are Made Voters Here

112 Register Republican, 55 Democrat and 74 Neither Party
After a slow start yesterday morning and with but a small number during the afternoon, the real rush at the Town Clerk's office to make voters got under way at 6 o'clock last night and resulted in a busy session for the next two hours. A total of 241 voters were made. Of this number 112 registered Republican and 55 as Democrats, while 74 failed to register with either party.
This is the last opportunity to be made a voter before the primaries in September, and it was also the last opportunity to register in order to take part in the primaries. The Manchester primaries are held on the second Tuesday in September, which this year comes September 9.
The next session to make voters is specified by law, and provides for the date for the next session to be held on the first Tuesday after the first of August. This means that the next session to make voters will not be held until Saturday, September 13.

Coventry Boy Hitch-Hikes Way to the Pacific Coast

John E. Kingsbury, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. John E. Kingsbury of North Coventry, who was well known here, having graduated from Manchester High School, since when time has interposed, his father in his milk business in this area, is attending the Christian Endeavor International convention in San Francisco this week, having hitch-hiked practice. Kingsbury Junior left for the West Coast three weeks ago today with the aid of his "thumb" he traveled through New York state and Pennsylvania, averaging about 300 miles a day. After lengthy stops at Cleveland, Ohio, and Des Moines, Iowa, where he visited friends and relatives, he proceeded to Salt Lake City where he visited the Mormon Temple and from that point took a bus to San Francisco, arriving in time for the opening of the convention. Adding to his expense for traveling only, he found it foolish to spend money on a hotel. He is now in San Francisco, where he is attending the convention. He is expected to return to Manchester on the first of August.

Higher Pensions Measure Signed

Hartford, July 8.—(AP)— Bills increasing maximum old age pension from \$40 to \$45 a month and abolishing the \$3 old age assistance tax have been signed by Gov. James L. McCaughey.
The measure, signed yesterday, was part of the governor's legislative program in the recent General Assembly session. The State and Federal government will share the cost of increasing the old age pension, which in the future will be financed from the state's general fund, largely through receipts from the new sales and use tax.
The abolition of the \$3 old age assistance tax was part of the administration's tax program and was intended to somewhat offset the impact of the 3 per cent sales tax.
Order New Forms For the Primary
Town Clerk Samuel J. Turkington yesterday ordered new forms to be used in nominating officers in September. Under the new rules governing nominations under the new charter, a person must have a petition signed by 15 voters registered in the party for which he wishes to become a candidate.
In the past all that was necessary was to secure the names of 10 endorsees and one person to propose the name. Although there have been no applications as yet for these forms, Mr. Turkington decided yesterday to get the forms printed at once and to have them ready when the demand starts.
Stafford Springs Doctor Dies
Dr. Harry H. Moore, 78, a practicing physician in this town for 20 years, died yesterday in a Hartford hospital following a long illness. A graduate of the University of Vermont Medical school, Dr. Moore practiced for 20 years in Warren, Mass., before coming here in 1918.
Article Accepted After Long Wait
Norman, Okla. (AP)—After seven years of waiting, Dr. A. C. Rhoad, associate professor of chemistry at the University of Oklahoma, has had an article accepted by a magazine. Friends thought the article might have had something to do with the long consideration given the piece. It was "Microscintillation of Cupric and Perchlorate Ions as Cupric Pyridine Perchlorate." Dr. Rhoad is now in the physics department at the University of Oklahoma.

Police Court

Constable Highberger of Wilton, Conn., was fined \$15 for violation of the rules of the road after pleading guilty to speeding. He was arrested last week by Constable G. Gordon who had observed him exceeding the speed limit in the Manchester Green district.
The charge of breach of the peace against James W. Huggan, which was presented a week ago and continued for investigation by the Probation Officer, was continued from day to day on recommendation of Probation Officer James Duffy. The case was the result of domestic difficulties. The original arrest was made by Patrolman George Huggan.
Charles Rosewell of Wiltonville was sentenced to 30 days in jail on the charge of intoxication by which he played guilty, and asked clemency. Rosewell stated to the court that he had not been arrested for over a year, but a check of his record with the Williamette police revealed that he has spent very little of his time this year out of jail.
Henry Burns, originally of Worcester, Mass., and arrested last evening by Patrolman David Kenton, was sentenced to five days in jail on the charge of vagrancy. A complaint that a man had been playing beneath a tree in Center park all day. When he investigated, Burns stated that he had had water in three days, but was heading for Providence. Judge Bowers stated that the jail term was for his own good, so that he might recover his strength.
William A. Cooke, Jr., of 275 Collins street, Hartford, pleaded guilty to reckless driving. Benedict Holden, Jr., of Hartford, he was fined \$25. At the request of Attorney Holden a \$25 bond for appeal was set.
Cooke was involved in a collision with Sunday evening on West Center street with a car driven by Donald E. Veach of West Brookville. The Cooke car was on the wrong side of the road and struck the Veach car after it had been driven off the road by the high speed of the Cooke car. 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Phone Rates Boost Rapped

State Federation of Labor Official Urges Register Objections

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"Officials in the larger cities," Bourke said, "such as Bridgeport, Hartford and New Haven, should be especially interested in protecting themselves against their communities. Although an impression has been given that telephone rates would be raised by a small fraction, we found by the company's own exhibits that it is proposed to increase the Bridgeport individual line residence rate 20 per cent and the business rate 31 per cent, and the Hartford and New Haven rates 19 per cent for residence service and 35 per cent for business service.

"Bourke sought 'Too High' Referring to the rate of return on the net investment capital that the company sought of 4.8 per cent, Bourke declared that this was "much too high."

"I appreciate that the Southern New England Telephone Co. is entitled to earnings that will attract necessary capital to finance its proposed construction program," said C. F. L. of E. official, "but its capital requirements could be financed through 50 per cent of bonds and 50 per cent of common stock or equity capital. The bond part would not require more than 2 per cent and the equity capital part, 3 per cent. An overall average, therefore, the percentage requirement on the additional capital funds would come down to 16 per cent, and not 6.6 per cent as the company has urged upon the Public Utilities commission."
