and for the first time since the 17th century faces the sprawling subcontinent's 400,000,000 people confronting their political destinies and economic resources.

The question arises why India and Pakistan are assuming in by no means permanent. Each has taken up its own constituent Assembly and each will choose its own constitution, with the ultimate option of becoming sovereign nations totally independent of the British commonwealth.

Britons still hope that both new countries will choose to enjoy their independence inside, rather than outside, the commonwealth.

However, the general expectation in London is that India will declare herself a sovereign republic and quit the commonwealth, while Pakistan will remain a dominion.

If both countries decide to leave the empire, the consequences for Britain will be incalculable.

Will Heaps To Complete

Economically, it will mean she will have to compete for the vast international trade market on equal terms with the rest of the world's producer countries.

Even if she were able to maintain her present most-favored-nation trade links with both states, Britain would certainly find it more difficult to reap the advantages of the monopolistic two-way traffic in goods and raw materials which have accrued to her over the past 300 years.

Both India and Pakistan were deemed likely to continue the tendency of building up their own national industries which, clearly would have first claim on all the raw material resources of the country.

If this process were accompanied by a policy of protectionism through increased tariffs, Britain would suffer more than most other countries because she has always had unrestricted access to India raw material supplies.

India in the past has been Britain's principal supplier for jute, jute manufacturers, cotton, tea.

Town To Pay More In County Taxes

The County tax that Manchester will have to include in its budget for the coming fiscal year may be much larger than the sum paid this year, it was indicated today by Town Treasurer George W. Wadell.

No figures are yet available. Mr. Wadell said, as of the new county tax, but since it is laid on the various towns' tax income a basis and it now seems that Manchester's tax income for the coming year will have to be substantially increased, the county tax too will go up.

This past year the amount bid over to Hartford County was \$18,026.80, Mr. Wadell said.

Predicts Bright Future For People of Turkey

Miss Naomi Foster, at home after 3 years in that country, gives her impressions.

Resident in a troubled area of the world for three years, Miss Naomi Foster, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Laurin M. Foster of 37 Academy street, has returned home spending her next summer months as a leader of mathematics and astronomy working under direction of the American Board of Foreign Missions. Miss Foster has been during her period abroad instructor at the American College in Istanbul, Turkey.

"I certainly enjoyed the experience," Miss Foster said today when interviewed at her home. "I may return, I have no very definite plans just now."

Leaving for the Near East while war dangers still dogged the Mediterranean coast, Miss Foster and others of the party went first to Lisbon, Portugal, and then to the city of London, England, where she completed her period abroad. After the war, she returned to the United States, where she was employed as a teacher at the American College in Istanbul, Turkey.

She related that one of her pupils, daughter of a rich landowner had told her, "you have to be careful with these people. They have to be treated carefully."

Religion, not only Muslim but all other faiths, has been practically banished from public life since Turkey began to rebuild. But now, Miss Foster says, there is some talk of permitting religious education again. Some school subjects like Turkish history, economics, must be taught in Turkish in the Turkish language, evidently to prevent any possible distortions, Miss Foster says.

American Popular Americans take very highly in Turkey, she says, but it is curious to hear American reaction on Turkey. Some businessmen traveling there are far from impressed, possibly because they expect too much from a new nation. But in their contact with the people, Miss Foster says she found the people delightful.

The city of Istanbul, destroyed and burned during the war with Greece, after the first World War, has been rebuilt, she says, and it is, in itself, one of the most interesting sights in the world.

Everywhere, Miss Foster finds, there is an equal distance from the sea to a next-door neighbor. But in nearby Syria and Lebanon she found an equal distance from the sea to a next-door neighbor. The people in general, chiefly the Greeks who rule the southern part of Turkey.

Peace and Independence. The conclusion one may reach, she says, is that the Near East people wish to be at peace and independent of all foreign rulers.

Miss Foster recalled the recent visit to Istanbul of United States naval vessels. She says that, although there were reports of "southern" when the boys were in Istanbul, they appeared to behave quite excellently in Istanbul, where a party was given for them and they met the local population.

The teaching methods used in the school where she was stationed, Miss Foster says, closely follow those of the French lycées rather than American type of grading and instruction. Being acquainted with several languages, Miss Foster has had little trouble on that score, and much of the pupils' recitations are in English as they are trying to learn that language.

Miss Foster finds that Turkey and Armenia still divide each other, but there is no apparent determination on this account.

New Turkey, Miss Foster finds, is well worth the help that it is receiving from us, and the aid is appreciated although Turkey rarely gives up any of their sovereignty

because of the making of grants or gifts.

The industrialization of Turkey progresses slowly because of lack of transportation and modern machinery, but there are many natural resources that in time can be developed, Miss Foster reports.

Turkey has extreme range of temperature in its various parts, and occasionally heavy earthquakes are recorded.

Get Home-Overlook

Miss Foster says that the opportunity to travel and to get a point of view, gained only by looking at her own country from overseas, and in the light of other people's eyes, is worth a great deal.

"We can realize then," she says, "that we are not necessarily eternally right," and that other nations have their reasons, many of them just, for actions that seem to us as either stupid or unworthy.

Miss Foster, a graduate of Mount Holyoke College, taught a number of years in North Carolina and at Holyoke Institute in Hartford. She gained a degree of Master of Sacred Theology from Hartford Theological Seminary. For a year she was assistant in the biblical

department at Wesleyan College, and taught Hebrew at Hartford Theological Seminary. Previously she had been active in local youth work.
