5. The states should be forbidden to impose either a tax or economic regulation upon air transportation.

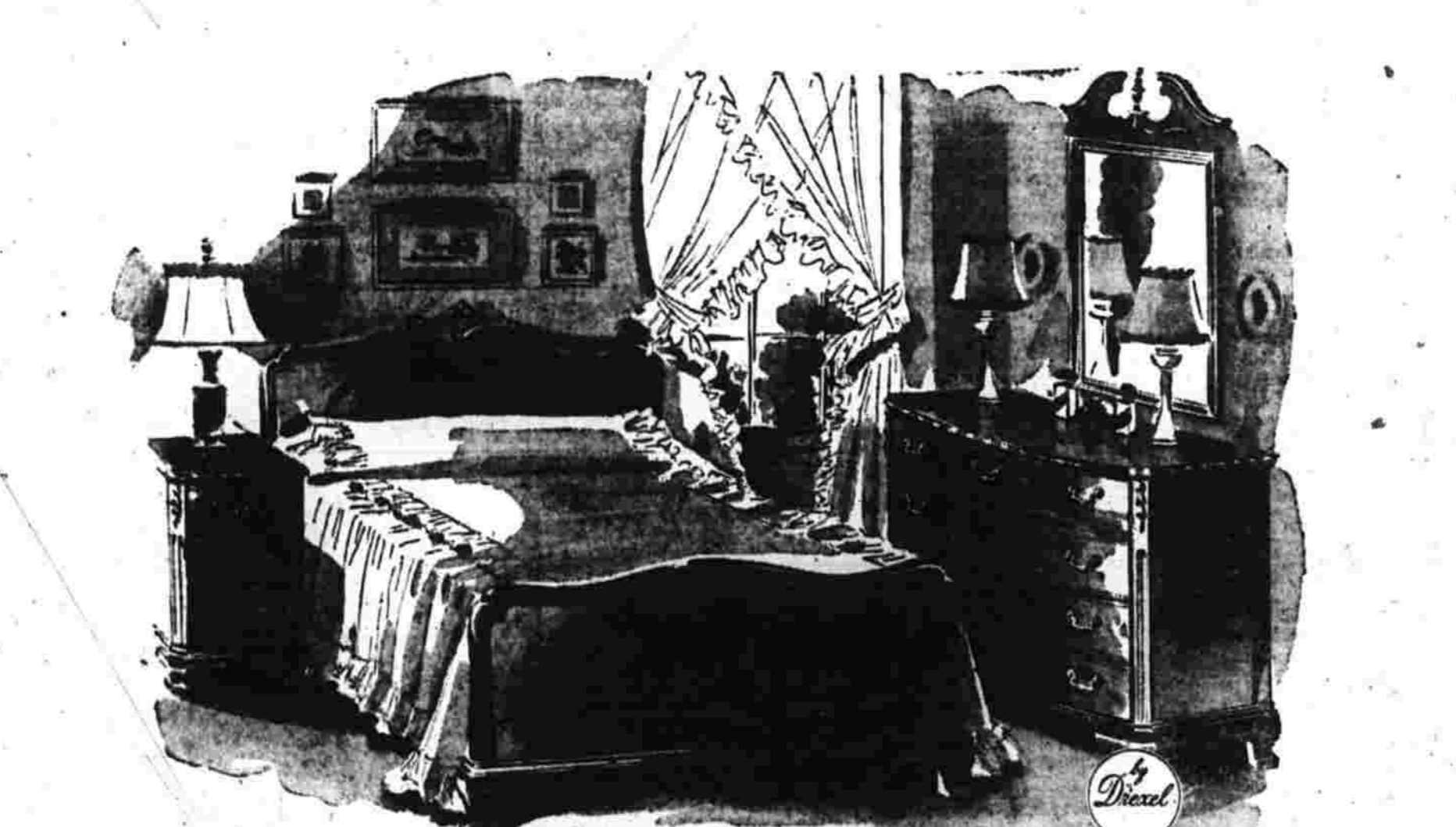
