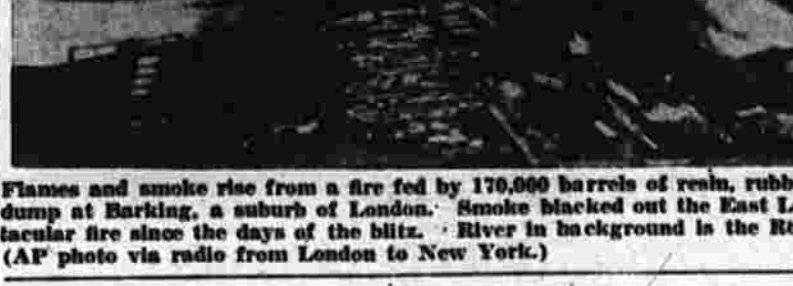

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**P.W. to Build Jet Engines**

**Turbine Type Production to Be Expanded at East Hartford Plant**

East Hartford, Oct. 28—Pratt & Whitney Aircraft is preparing to add production workers and departments for the expanded manufacture of turbine-type and jet engines. It was announced here today by W. P. Gavin, general manager of Pratt & Whitney Aircraft Division of United Aircraft Corporation. The company's turbine-type engines have reached an advanced stage of development, with full scale prototypes undergoing test operations. Gavin said, "While many parts of the new engine will be manufactured in existing plant departments, other components will be produced in new departments. Many of the production workers needed on turbine and engine projects will require skills not heretofore possessed by large numbers of employees in the manufacture of aircraft engines. Mr. Gavin said, "New skills will include sheet metal work and welding, as well as additional grinding, polishing and milling machine operations. "Our development and manufacturing requires men with such varied qualifications as process planners, draftsmen, detailers and tool makers, engine and turbine lathe operators and all around machinists." Mr. Gavin said, "Pratt & Whitney Aircraft is still developing and producing piston-type engines for both military and commercial customers. There is every reason to believe there will be a market for these engines for many years. We expect to complete preparatory work and set up assembly lines on our new products without any major disturbance of our existing production facilities. Washington, Oct. 28—(AP)—A settlement has been reached which was announced here today by the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen. The settlement was announced after a 24-hour strike called last week. The board had negotiated for two days with railroad and brotherhood representatives. H. H. Perry, assistant vice president, and H. L. New Haven, Oct. 28—(AP)—Dr. Florence A. Browne, employed by the Bureau of Material and Child Hygiene of the State Department of Health, says that experiments with rats and mice have disclosed that the use of mineral oil laxatives constitutes a hazard to good health. Dr. Browne said in an article in the current issue of the Connecticut State Medical Journal that an ounce of mineral oil absorbed 14 times as much Vitamin A as the most adequate diets and also interfered with the functions of Vitamin D and K.

### Caught Just in Time

The attack on free speech and opinion which is now being carried on by the House Committee on Un-American Activities, by its own tradition the most un-American of all our institutions, is being frustrated by a source discounted in advance. Much more serious, since it involves the whole American people, is the new system of censorship evolved by President Truman's Security Advisory Board, and now already put into effect by one federal agency even though the new censorship system has not yet been formally approved by the President. Under this proposed permanent peace-time code of censorship, it would be the privilege and duty of all governmental officials to withhold from the public information the unauthorized disclosure of which, although not endangering the national security, would be prejudicial to the interests or prestige of the nation, any individual, or would cause administrative embarrassment or difficulty.

### Loses Chance To Be Great

UNESCO Now Can Only Be Good, Dr. Park Tells Educators. New Haven, Oct. 29.—The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization has lost its chance to be great and can only be good, says Dr. Rosemary Park, president of the Connecticut College for Women. Dr. Park, speaking last night at the dinner meeting of the Connecticut Conference of Junior Colleges, said that the UNESCO offered no blueprint for educators and no answer to the questions for which we fought the war. Other speakers of the day-long program were Dr. L. Craig Long of the University of Connecticut, who discussed vocational guidance, and Dr. Pascal Fox of Holy Junior College, who spoke on college grading systems.

### Exchange Club Hears Tax Expert

Members and guests of the Manchester Exchange Club held their monthly meeting last night at Howard Murphy's restaurant. Stuart Hegar announced that members of the Board of Control are to meet at his home on November 10 at 7:30 p. m. He also read a letter from John Fainola, a member of the Hartford Exchange Club, in which he suggested that the Manchester club should form a bowling club. A vote of approval was passed. The guest speaker, Everett D. Dow, was introduced by President Hegar. Mr. Dow was in public relations director for the State tax department, outlined the advantages of a State Sales Tax especially to tax-burdened property owners and also criticized many of the public misunderstandings. The president of the Manchester club was pleased by the large attendance and expressed his wish that more of the members share in bringing guests.

### Three Courses Facing Nation

Johns - Manville Official Urges - Morgan Marshall Aid Plan as Best. Hartford, Oct. 29.—The United States has only three courses to pursue in Western Europe, says Board Chairman Lewis H. Brown of the Johns-Manville Chemical Corp., in a speech before the Hartford Exchange Club last night. He said the United States could be determined to live and let live, backing up its policy with force, if necessary. "Purely Political Investment," he said, are tired of pouring money, food and goods into Europe. However, he advised, "we must look upon some of our assistance to Europe as a purely political investment." Most of the investment, he said, should be considered a business investment that can be repaid if the United States makes it possible for Europe to repay in physical goods. Doubting that Britain, controlled by the industrialist and the Communist element to sweep over the rest of the world, while war with Russia would "cost infinitely more than would the firm backing of the Marshall plan and our foreign policy."

### Prison Term For Saucier

Sentenced to 15 to 20 Years; Bieu Brothers Plead Innocent Today. Brattleboro, Vt., Oct. 29.—Norman W. Saucier, 32, of Hartford, Conn., was sentenced today to 15 to 20 years in state prison after being convicted of being an accessory in the holdup of a diner during which a policeman was wounded by gunfire. He was given a concurrent 3 to 10 year sentence for robbery. Ordered Held for Trial. Two brothers, Robert, 22, and Earl Bieu, 24, pleaded innocent to being involved in the attack and were ordered held for trial by the Windham County court. They were named as accessories by Saucier in a statement read in court by State's Attorney Ernest F. Barry. Saucier's statement also admitted a diner stop in Northampton, Mass., and a filling station break in Hartford. The slum is a biological relative of the weasel and mink.

### A Few British Statistics

A few statistics seem in order for those who profess to love Britain but who bemoan the fact that the British people are not helping themselves out of their post-war economic situation. British coal production has, in the first eight months of 1947, shown an increase in production of 4,844,100 tons over the similar period in 1946. That brings present annual production close to the production rate of years like 1935 and 1936, but still leaves it some 30,000,000 tons a year below the immediate pre-war production record. If there is any one great key to the difficulty Britain is having in staging its coal production up to a new all-time high of 749,000,000 tons a year, it is that the antiquated and long-outdated machinery and mining methods hitherto tolerated in Britain have finally reached the end of their road. One reason why Britain needs more coal than ever is that Britain is producing and using more electricity than ever. Production of electricity in Britain last January, for instance, was 230 per cent ahead of the pre-war years. In September of this year, British steel production reached 1,135,416 tons, the highest September output ever achieved in Britain's history, and a rate 42 per cent ahead of the pre-war rate of 1938. Merchant shipping construction, designed to replace the great merchant fleet sunk during the war, is 87 per cent ahead of pre-war figures. In agriculture, production of cereals is 50 per cent above pre-war, potato crops are up 122 per cent, and milk output has gone up 20 per cent. Before the war, Britain produced only one-third of her own food. Today she is producing one-half. Production in one phase of agriculture shows an inevitable drop. This is in livestock for food, and is explained quite simply by the fact that Britain was forced, during the war, to eat its livestock up to an extent which can only be repaired by the orderly but time-consuming processes of nature itself. In another of its major industries, the textile industry, Britain is currently lagging far behind pre-war production in both cotton and wool, a lag principally due to the fact that the textile industry was largely sacrificed and converted to war needs. In one textile division, however, that of rayon and nylon, British production has been able to make strides, and is now 45 per cent ahead of pre-war records. With the exception of coal, where the gap is steadily being closed, cotton and wool, and domestic meat, Britain's current production has been brought substantially above pre-war levels. In other words, in many classifications, British production is now at an all-time high. There is, nevertheless, a British emergency. It arises not because Britain is producing less, but because Britain, after having thrown herself so completely and sacrificially into the war, has a tremendous climb to make. Britain needs help not because Britain has become some lazy, but because Britain is making an heroic effort at a comeback against tremendous odds. Britain made this bid because her situation is hopeless, but because there is a vital gap between the knockout she took during the war and the time when the results of her present efforts will begin to come in. In this situation, to criticize for lack of more production which is achiev-
