German Question Declared
 Some returned travelers from
 Europe are reaching the conclusion
 that Russia and Communism
 are in a process of retrenchment,
 and that the "cold war" has al-
 ready been won by the West.

And there are, if one factor
 could be ignored or solved, some
 signs, realistic though not
 ways beyond the "cold war",
 that a new era of peace and
 stability is coming into existence.

One hopeful sign is that Com-
 munist strength in countries like
 Italy and France seems to be re-
 ceding. This lessens the chance
 that Communism will do any fur-
 ther expanding on our side of
 the two-world dividing line which
 cuts through Europe.

Another realistic but unpleas-
 ing sign is that Russia itself is
 proceeding to mark out a more
 or less permanent boundary line
 for her own influence. This is
 to be seen in the aggressive
 measures by which Russia and
 her Communist stooges are con-
 solidating their political grip on
 those countries already within
 their orbit. These tactics tighten
 Russia's grip on what Russia re-
 gards as her sphere of influence.

It is concerned with the possi-
 bility that this process may make
 a mistake in too great a degree
 innocent man. So long as the evi-
 dence against an individual is not
 disclosed so that he himself can
 defend himself, the process is
 unjust. We like to see young men
 who are trying to make good find

 ciated. Unfortunately they are
 frequently liable to take bumps

 two world powers.
