Larger Grain Crop Is Goal
(Continued from Page One)
seeks a crop of at least that much in 1948. Tentative plans call for a corn planting goal of 92,000,000 acres, or about 6.3 per cent more than the 86,400,000 acres planted this year.

The prospective goal for the principal feed grains—corn, oats, barley and grain sorghums—is 160,000,000 acres. That is about 9,300,000 acres more than was planted to those crops this year and about 3,800,000 acres more than the prewar average.

The department already recommended a 1948 wheat goal of 75,000,000 acres. While this is about 5,000,000 acres more than the 1947 goal, it is about 2,000,000 less than was actually planted for harvest this year.

These grain goals are larger than the department would prefer to recommend, officials said, because they will require a sacrifice of good crop rotation and soil conservation practices. Officials are the continuing urgent demand for big shipments overseas plus the need for building up reserve stocks at home.

The corn acreage may go considerably above the tentative goal because in some sections of the Midwest fall plantings of wheat have not been made because of dry weather. Hence some of this land may be put to corn or other feed grains next spring.

De Gasperi's Problem Trying to Keep Seat

Italian Premier Does Not Have Much Time To Think Where He Is Going Now

 Rome, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Like a man trying to ride a bucking bronco while two fellows yank at him from either side, Premier Alcide de Gasperi's biggest problem just now is keeping his seat. He doesn't have much time to think about where he's going. Five months ago the 66-year-old Catholic premier tired of constant wrangling with the Communist and Socialist ministers in his third successive Italian cabinet. When President Enrico de Nicola handed the premiership back to him, he decided to try it along with his middle-of-the-road Christian Democrats.

Busy Grappling With Foes
 Since then, he has been busy grappling with foes to the right and left who want to pull him out of the saddle. Now, however, it looks like de Gasperi has a breathing spell to consider the political direction and political future of the Christian Democrats. Italy's biggest single party, with 207 seats in the 534-man Constituent Assembly which is drafting a republican constitution for Italy's new national charter.

A close, hard-won victory in the Assembly early in October gave de Gasperi the breath. His Communist-Socialist opposition moved a vote of non-confidence in the cabinet. With some help from the far right, de Gasperi just squeaked by.

Christian Democracy's future probably will be decided at the party's national convention at Naples this week. If de Gasperi has his way, it will elect to steer just left of center, with an alert eye on the Scylla of Communism on the left and the Charybdis of Fascism on the right.

State Policemen Charles W. Pritchard and Walter Schwann identified the driver of the car as Emory J. Tanguay, 51, of New Britain. They said no arrest was made pending further examination.

 Groton, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Four young men from Pawtucket, R. I., were being held at the Groton state police barracks today on a charge of the theft of an automobile in Central Falls, R. I., last night. Identified by state police as Norman H. Giguere, 19, Ernest J. Doucher, 20, Charles W. Taylor, 24, and Norman E. Bennett, 17, they were arrested last night at the Groton end of the New London-Groton bridge by State Policemen Paul J. Hickey and Harry Meyers. A short time after a message telling of the theft of the car was received at the Groton barracks.

Left Pretty Cocky
 As for the Christian Democrats, their recent Constituent Assembly victory and their good showing in the Nov. 12 home municipal election have left them pretty cocky. Helping their confidence is the fact that soaring food prices—some of the left's most biting points of criticism—have come down somewhat, while the Italian currency's depreciation has been at least

temporarily checked. The talk that de Gasperi may try to bolster his cabinet with some moderate leftists is subsiding.

That the Christian Democrats intend to contest vigorously next Spring's tentatively scheduled national elections was evidenced when, on one recent Sunday, they sent 100 speakers to the hearings (Tomorrow—The Socialist Role)

Moreover the Communist-dominated "People's Bloc" has added several splinter groups of deputies to the solid 166 who vote the way the Communist Chief Palmiro Togliatti and Socialist Pietro Nenni order; and, with moderate left parties coy, de Gasperi may have to look again to the right for Assembly votes to stay in power.

That, in the opinion of many observers, is potentially tragic, since it reinforces the drift to extremism which has marked recent Italian political history.

Their hope is that the once strong, now schism-ridden Socialist party will find the way back to unity and counter-balance the pull of the far right.

Lists Articles Most Needed By Needy European People

The Manchester Thanksgiving Basket to Europe committee today released for the benefit of participating organizations and individuals, a summary of the varied needs of the people of Europe, as set forth in the requests to the Committee from various established European aid agencies.

The archives of both Manchester fire districts are to be receiving deposits for gifts of clothing and other materials to be made during the "Thanksgiving Basket Week" from Nov. 20 to Nov. 27.

In its guidance for giving, the Thanksgiving Basket Committee finds that "serviceable clothing of all kinds is needed," and also that "giving it is not only clothing is clean and in good condition. It also adds that, if possible, clothing be separated into bundles and labeled as men's, women's, children's, or infants'.

The shoes together with high heeled shoes or evening slippers, are also needed, and also socks. Manchester's last clothing drive, when many hours were spent trying to get all the shoes given properly mated, the committee reports, are "in great need of materials for aid agencies."

Household linen, including handkerchiefs, pillow cases, towels, and wash cloths, is also needed.

Articles in Demand

Among the miscellaneous items which are all in demand by needy people serving Europe are both of cloth, medical supplies, cleaned-up, vegetable seeds, plastic cups, garden implements, knitting yarn and needles, heavy cotton socks, canteen short handled brooms and cany in tin boxes.

For organizations or classes interested in making up layettes, or a special clothing bundle for children, or a box for school children in Europe, the Chamber of Commerce has suggested lists of items which will be made available to any one interested.

Novel Experience For Both

In the days preceding American and Russian agreement on the details of the partition of Palestine, one could see clearly enough the temptation open to the world's two greatest powers. It was the temptation to win through a previous agreement on general principle by an endless and final quarrel over details. That has, of late, been the mode and style of the relationship between Russia and America, on more important things, and on less important things.

For either nation to hold to its usual mode of behavior would have meant failure of the plan for Palestine. All they had to do was behave as they have been behaving in the past, and Palestine would become just another world deadlock, to be prolonged endlessly to the tune of more international name calling.

One could notice the gingerly behavior of each nation as they paused at the edge of the area of compromise agreement so zealously established by the efforts of Canada, which assumed the role of mediator between the two giants. Russia, we suppose, could not help thinking what a fine opportunity for trouble-making lay in a quarrel over Palestine. For the United States is trying to play two policies in the Near East, one of obtaining unlimited oil concessions from the Arabs, and the other one of favoring justice for the Zionists. So the more responsible we might have to assume for the partition of Palestine, the more trouble we might expect from the Arabs.

This inviting opportunity to shak in troubled waters the Russians somehow managed to reject.

As for us, our gingerly attitude was reflected in the news stories which told how a good many of our delegates objected to the original Canadian compromise proposal on the ground that it yielded some points to the Russian point of view. We have, in other words, grown so accustomed to opposing anything Russian just because it is Russian that our diplomacy is sometimes guided by hysteria rather than by facts or by reason.

Yet, in the end, we somehow managed to accept a compromise proposal which was actually authored and introduced by the Russians themselves.

So both of us finally resisted the new temptation to play exactly the same kind of game we have been playing against each other for many months past. Both of us finally decided that the solution of at least this one particular problem was more important than the continuation and new amplification of our quarrel.

What this one lonely instance of Russian and American compromise and agreement and cooperation did for the other nations of the world was evident enough at Lake Success. The discouraged and cynical delegates acted as if they had been given some sudden tonic. Some of them even went so far as to draw the conclusion, from this one happening, that there was some life in the United Nations after all.

We don't know whether any of this spirit communicated itself to the men who run Russia and the men who fashion American policy. But it seems to us that it might and should. Why not try the same business—an abandonment of extreme aims on either side and then a common sense compromise on what reasonable differences are left—again?
