

## More Production Seen as Obstacle To 'Police State'

### Bunting Also Calls for Emergency Foreign Relief in Goods, Reductions in Government Spending and Taxes as NAM's Plan

New York, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Earl Bunting, president of the National Association of Manufacturers, today called for increased productivity, emergency foreign relief in goods not dollars, and reductions in government spending and income taxes.

World Unity "Police State" Plan His program, he said, would assure maintenance of the American living standard, and would make possible "generous" foreign aid.

He also asked labor leaders to forego demands for general wage increases without increases in productivity, except in cases of gross inequities.

"All feather-bedding rules should be set aside," he said, as well as "all restrictions on individual productivity not essential to employ safety and health."

His speech was the highlight of the opening of the National Association of Manufacturers' 52nd annual congress of American industry, which brought more than 5,000 industrialists from all over the country to the Waldorf-Astoria for a three-day session.

Speakers Outline "Challenges" Bunting, who also is president of the O'Sullivan Rubber Corporation, Winchester, Va., addressed the congress after morning speakers outlined the "challenges" at home and abroad to American industry.

Allen Walsh Dulles, former chief of the Army O'S in Europe, told the manufacturers earlier that the key to peace is in the hands of American industry, agriculture and labor, as the Soviet Union gambles on the failure of our system.

Bunting attributed the cost of living increase to failure to produce to keep pace with demand in a speech he termed "industry's answer to the police state."

"No one whose wage has gone up to three times what it was before the war is suffering from prices even though they are high."

The committee said the \$500,000,000 aid it recommends for Austria, France, Italy and China "is consistent with this policy."

The committee said the lack of rescuing Europe from Communism "is not a business one" but the pact of Russia on the democratic system of Europe must be halted.

It added: "Russia is fully aware of this danger to her plans for extending Communism over the world in apparent form of the present tactics."

The three escaped from the U. S. Medical center here with two other inmates Monday night. A search party was sent out to find them.

Last night's search party, brandishing a knife and pitchfork, appeared in the house of 70-year-old Will Owen. They tied Owen's hands and feet and spent 45 minutes in the house changing clothes and searching for weapons.

Edna Owen, Owen's granddaughter, said she recognized the men from their pictures in the newspaper as the escapes, William Elmer McClain, 25, Cumberland, Md.; Edward Elsbury, 21, Marquette, Pa.; and Charles J. Maloy, 24, Springfield, Mo.

## Chinese Open Tapih Drive

Nanking, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Minister of Defense Pai Chung-Hsi, top commander in the Yangtze river area, has begun an offensive against 80,000 Chinese Communists in Tapih mountain hideouts in central China.

Pai was named recently to head a new command post at Kiating. His prime target northeast of Hankow is Red Gen. Liu Po-Cheng's last-moving Army, which the government feared might move south across the river to bring the war to a whole new area, a military spokesman said today.

The spokesman, Lt. Gen. Teng Wen-Ti, estimated the strength of regular Communist forces between the Yellow and Yangtze rivers at 210,000 but said the government had "at least three times as many" troops in the area. He admitted that the Communist 10th and 12th Armies under Gen. Chen Yi had moved to effect a junction with Liu's forces, bringing with them "supplies of warm clothing and munitions which are expected to stiffen their resistance."

Teng displayed a war map showing 13 separate Communist concentrations which had developed in a year ago.

### Students in Egypt Denounce America

Cairo, Dec. 3.—(AP)—A crowd of approximately 300 students assembled in front of the United States embassy today, shouting "Down with America" and throwing stones at American photographers who tried to take pictures from the roof of the building.

The students forced their way through reinforced police lines to reach the street before the British and American embassies. After shouting "Down with England" before the British embassy they screamed denunciations of America.

Police Disperse Crowd "Police dispersed the crowd, using clubs for the first time in three days of demonstrations. At one point, a section of the crowd began shouting slogans against Premier Mahmoud Fahmy Nokrashy Pasha.

The demonstration appeared to be a double-barreled protest aimed at the American support of Palestine and the presence of British troops in the West Bank. It was the first since the "revolution" and for evacuation of British troops from the canal zone.

The largest group wound up before the headquarters of the Arab League, crying for weapons and promising to save Palestine "with their own hands."

## Soldiers Seek Missing Plane

Bitche, France, Dec. 3.—(AP)—Weary American soldiers battled blinding mountain snowstorms today in the faint hopes of finding alive some survivors of a U. S. Air Force transport plane missing since Friday with 29 persons aboard.

Blue-uniformed French gendarmes joined U. S. constabulary troops in the hunt for wreckage of a C-47 which is believed to have crashed in this area while on a flight from Paris to Frankfurt, Germany.

Severe weather conditions forced Lester Cole were fired by Metro search teams fought icy roads through the night.

The last radio contact with the missing plane reportedly was effected shortly after noon yesterday by one of several radio trucks scouring the area. Nothing has been heard since.

"We are very apprehensive," said an Air Force officer supervising part of the search operations. "Perhaps the battery went dead; perhaps a lone survivor died of the cold."

## Machine-Guns, Knives, Grenades and Fires Used in No-Man's Land Between Jaffa and Tel Aviv Today in Resumption of Rioting Over Decision to Partition Palestine

Arabs and Jews fought bloody street battles with machine-guns, knives, grenades and fire in the No-Man's Land between Jaffa and Tel Aviv today in a resumption of Holy Land rioting over the decision to partition Palestine.

About 35 were counted dead on both sides, by unofficial estimates, in two days of communal warfare, throughout the country.

Haganah Commander Eytan said about 12 dead and scores wounded since the Arabs called their three-day protest strike here, according to British and American informants, based down on the proposal at least temporarily.

More Being Consumed Than When Meatless Tuesdays Commenced

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This does not necessarily mean, however, that the meatless day campaign is failing to achieve its principal objective—a reduction in the feeding of grain to livestock so that more cereals might be made available for shipment abroad.

This is the season of the year when livestock marketing normally increases and when meat production goes up. It also is the season of the year when appetites for meat tend to grow sharper because of colder weather.

Most production by Federally-inspected slaughterers was running less than 300,000,000 pounds a week when the meatless Tuesday campaign was started. Now it is averaging more than 400,000,000 pounds and probably will go higher before the month is out.

The bulk of the increase is moving directly into consumption. As in the case normally, some of the seasonal increase is going into cold storage for sale later when supplies will be down.

Reflects Earlier Marketing Some of the current season's increase in meat production reflects earlier marketing of livestock, particularly hogs, than has been the case in the past few years. In other words, a lot of hogs which under conditions of the past few years would have been kept on farms for further fattening are coming to market now.

### Major Gatchell Gives Figures for November And Explains Them

November's activity at the Manchester Veterans Service Center showed a total of 432 individual veterans making use of its facilities in a total of 482 subject conferences. These figures compare with 408 visitors in November of 1946 and with a total of 467 contacts for the month of October of this year. Director Nathan B. Gatchell made known these facts in his monthly report released to the press.

Fewer Veterans New in commenting on the figures he pointed out that no substantial decrease has taken place so far as the load carried at the Center is concerned. The time required for each case continues to increase, thus offsetting any slight decrease in total number of visitors. "It must be realized," the Director said, "that we are fewer here now than the Veterans Administration has been forced by Congressional economy moves to curtail the schedule of its contact men."

The leading subjects in the list of November conferences follow: State bonus, apprentice and job training, insurance, education, housing, personal adjustments and medical claims.

To correct figures appearing in the morning press the Director stated the total of visits at the Center since its opening is 12,678. In closing his remarks, Mr. Gatchell reminded the people of Manchester that a Service Center has definite limitations. This means that its scope is primarily in the nature of a clearing house for the veterans' needs, but by and large most of the actual accomplishment of some of the most important and considerable leg work and attention to detail by the veterans and their families.

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### Court Refuses Son Alienation Damages

#### Precedent-Setting Decision Made on Appeal of 18-Year-Old To Supreme Tribunal

Hartford, Dec. 2.—The State Supreme court ruled in a precedent-setting decision today that a minor son cannot recover damages for the alienation of his mother's affections.

The decision was made on the appeal of 18-year-old Donald Taylor, who sued Stanley Keefe for the alienation of the affections of his mother, Mrs. Helen Taylor, divorced wife of his father, Leon Taylor.

Granted Divorce in 1944 Taylor's mother was granted a divorce from Leon Taylor in December, 1944 on the grounds of cruelty. She was given the custody of Donald who lived with her until 1946 when he went to reside with relatives in Hartford.

In his suit he set forth that in 1944 and for many years before that he had lived happily with his mother. In 1945, he claims, Keefe's bad acts, blandishments and seductions destroyed the happiness of his home and in consequence he had suffered great distress of body and mind and had lost the love, affection and society of his mother.

The chief defense argument, the Supreme court in the decision written by Justice Allyn Brown said that the allegations stated admitted on the answer, but that the sole question for determination was whether a minor child could maintain an action for alienation of a mother's affections.

### Meriden Stays In GOP Ranks

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**Show-Down in France**  
 The Communist offensive in France, which might, if successful, throw the world into a new alignment in which war would be completely unavoidable, seems to have been checked. Writing of the situation as this threat opened, two weeks ago, we expressed the opinion that the salvation of the world now depended upon the good common sense of the people of those countries. It is pleasant to read therefore, the comment of a French journalist, on the failure of the climactic Communist move—the attempt to kill a general strike.

This move, the French journalist notes, was made under the most favorable circumstances, from the Communist point of view. If it ever had any chance of succeeding, this was the moment for such success. But it failed, says the French commentator, and its failure was "not due to the Army or the police, but to thousands and thousands of French workers guided by simple common sense."

Despite the failure of their movement for a general strike, the Communists have not been causing trouble enough. But they are causing the kind of trouble, and using such bare-faced tactics, doing it, as to generate new resentment against themselves. They are revealing themselves as bankrupt obstructionists, who wear the cloak of sympathy for the real grievances of French labor, but who are really concerned merely with using French labor as their own destructive tool.

In this situation, the government of Premier Schuman is adopting a strategy of show-downs which is being carried out in a present compromise settlement. After this, as Premier Schuman shrewdly observes, they would claim that they had won a victory, and they would soon be found starting the same kind of threat and pressure all over again. He has, accordingly, projected their offer of a compromise present peace. And while he himself is planning some joint recognition of the wage plight of French labor, he is determined to yield the Communists nothing.

Premier Schuman's object is to hold the Communists locked into the present conflict, which they originated, until they are completely defeated and discredited. He does not intend to let them wriggle away to come back and fight another day. But his firm tactics are rooted in and can only achieve success because of the fact that the majority of the people of his country had too much common sense of their own to follow the pied piper of the Kremlin. He is being helped by the fact that the Communists are, in their own desperation measures, revealing themselves more and more as purely negative destructionists, completely willing to injure the French people in their own quest for power. The Communists have had in France, an unparalleled opportunity to win friends and influence people in the midst of a democracy. If they have failed, it has been because their principles and policies and tactics have been such as to offend the common sense of a free people.

**Russian Opportunity**

Occasionally, in their eagerness, the prophets of doom become involved in mild contradictions of logic. But so long as they wind up at the same destination, their logic with Russia—they have no need to be seriously embarrassed. Anything goes, when the proposition is one of making war inevitable.

The recent course of events in the Russian added with the United States in pushing the partition of France through the United Nations General Assembly had these prophets momentarily baffled. But, as the news from Washington yesterday indicated, they have already adjusted themselves and are back in business.

According to one school of high opinion military thought, the Russians pushed the partition of Palestine so that, in the Holy War they now expect to see, they can offer to the Red Army troops into Palestine to protect the new Jewish State against Arab attacks. Thus, as this Washington school of imagination runs, the Russians will at last have her foothold directly on the Mediterranean. This prospect, therefore, is the basic explanation of why Russia favored partition.

But if one wishes variety, one may take another school of thought, which seems to us equally sound. By this school of thought, Russia favored partition in order to put us in bad with the Arabs, to whom Russia will transfer her own affection, and her own troops as soon as the Holy War breaks out.

In one case, you have Russia getting into Palestine to defend the Jewish State. In the other case, you have Russia taking over the whole Near East as the great ally of the Arab.

So long as the end result in each case is war between the United States and Russia, such passing conflict of logic is of little matter. As we understand it, Russia intends to make doubly sure of that objective by intervening both on the side of the Jews and on that of the Arabs.
