**Passage of Price Curb Bill Assured By House Action**

Orders Immediate Consideration Under Procedure Restricting Amendment and Limiting Debate; Action Expected by Nightfall

Bulletin! Washington, Dec. 18.—(AP)—The House action on the price curbing bill was virtually assured today when the House ordered it considered immediately under procedure restricting amendments and limiting debate.

House approval is expected to head the legislation toward President Truman's desk by nightfall as the Senate passed the bill yesterday by a 77 to 10 vote.

Only one hour of debate was permitted by the House under procedure which Democrats condemned as "speedy." The only amendments allowed will be those backed by the Banking committee, which has no amendments to offer.

Democrats were given the opportunity of trying to alter the bill through a motion to recommit.

**Ten Arabs Die During Galilee Village Strife**

Jerusalem, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Ten Arabs, including five children, were reported killed and five others were injured by bombs and gunfire last night in a Jewish attack on the village of Khiasa, in upper Galilee.

An official report said two cars were destroyed in the village. The darkness, threw a number of bombs and opened fire. Two houses were destroyed.

A police patrol found seven bodies in the ruins of one of the houses and three in the other.

Two Syrians and two Lebanese Arabs were listed among the casualties.

Village Used As Hideout Jewish sources said Hagana, the Jewish underground militia, made the attack because the village was being used as a hideout for infiltrating volunteers of Fawzi Kanjara Arab "Save Palestine" Army. Arab sources have said this force was moving 2,000 guerrilla fighters to join Palestine Arab forces near Nablus.

**Premier Seen Desiring Vote Of Confidence**

De Gasperi Galled by Barrage of Criticism From Far Left as Labor Strife Continues

Rome, Dec. 18.—(AP)—Galled by a continuous barrage of criticism from the far left, Premier Alcide De Gasperi was expected today to ask the Constituent Assembly for a new vote of confidence as a swelling wave of labor strife convulsed Italy.

Mr. Truman proposed that this vast sum be invested over four and a quarter years as "a major step in our nation's recovery for a just and lasting peace."

As the first installment, he asked for authority to spend \$5,000,000,000 in the first 15 months.

His message outlining the largest spending plan in nation's peacetime history went to Congress in the closing hours of its special session. Mr. Truman urged swift action when the regular session starts in January, so the recovery program could get under way.

He predicted that the "determined opposition" already announced by European communists will result in further increments to strike while the iron is hot. He urged the passage of legislation which would allow for a "determined" American security and aid program.

### Insurance Man Is Vindicated

#### Local Man Completely Absolved of Charges Made by Woman

Robert J. McKinney, local insurance representative, was completely vindicated in Common Pleas court yesterday afternoon by Judge John C. Fitzgerald of charges brought by Mrs. Lorraine Kennedy of this town, in a suit for \$2,500 damages. Mrs. Kennedy had charged that Mr. McKinney had made amorous advances when making an insurance collection. Mr. McKinney denied her charges and the judge's finding yesterday completely absolved him of any guilt. Judge Fitzgerald remarked after hearing Mrs. Kennedy's charges that it was the "weird case" that had come to his attention while on the bench.

Mr. McKinney, who is a well known and highly respected resident of this town, was represented in his defense by William S. Hyde. The complainant was represented by Attorney Wesley C. Gryn.

Judge Fitzgerald, noting that Mrs. Kennedy's mother was in an adjoining room when the alleged incident occurred and that the contents in the suit had known each other for 10 years, said:

"Never before had the 48-year-old defendant attempted any liberties with the 26-year-old plaintiff. On the facts as determined the court will not saddle the defendant with a judgment for damages. To arrive at a different conclusion on the facts found would produce a chaotic result, legally and socially speaking."

fear of selfish totalitarian aggression."

Along with this message, the president forwarded to Congress a bill to authorize the \$17,000,000,000 expenditure to set up the machinery for carrying out the long-range recovery program. He sent along, too, a 241-page analysis prepared by experts from dozens of Federal agencies.

**To Manage Program**

To manage the program, Mr. Truman wants to appoint a \$20,000 a year administrator with broad powers. There would be a deputy drawing \$17,500. And to run the European end of the show, there would be a roving ambassador making \$25,000 a year.

In addition, the administrator would have as his top assistants 10 men making up to \$15,000 and 30 more making as much as \$10,000.

However, instead of one-man control of the program, a special House Committee on Foreign Aid already has proposed an eight-man board, so the Truman proposal may be in for trouble on that score.

Congressional shuddering was in prospect, too, over the size of the bill.

But the president said that big as the cost will be, it is only 5 per cent of the cost of the war and less than 3 per cent of our national income during the life of the program.

**"Investment Toward Peace"**

"As an investment toward the peace and security of the world and toward the realization of hope and confidence in a better way of life for the future," he declared, "this cost is small indeed."

Mr. Truman said he was recommending the program to Congress "in full confidence of its wisdom and necessity as a major step in our nation's quest for a just and lasting peace."

As a joint undertaking of the United States and a group of European countries, he said, the program "is proof that free men can effectively join together to defend their free institutions against totalitarian pressures, and to promote better standards of life for all their peoples."

**Much in Form of Gifts**

As outlined in the documents sent to Congress, "many" of the aid would be in the form of gifts, some would be in loans.

There was no breakdown on how the \$17,000,000,000 would be split among the various countries. There was no estimate either of how much the United States might get back.

Deals are supposed to be worked out for getting from the receiving countries supplies of scarce, strategic materials to store up in the United States. But for these, this country would pay cash.

The \$17,000,000,000 is a round number.

Depending chiefly on whether prices go up or down, government experts estimate the actual cost to this country might dip as low as \$15,111,900,000 or climb as high as \$17,758,000,000, not including \$222,000,000 for western Germany which the administration is asking separately for 15 months.

Help from the International Bank, private financing, other western hemisphere nations and additional nations might up the total of outside assistance to between \$20,024,900,000 and \$22,485,000,000.

The most 16 nations on the receiving end asked was \$22,440,000,000 for an even four years.

These nations, which would guarantee to help themselves and each other in order to get a hand from Uncle Sam, are: Austria, Belgium, Britain, Denmark, Elre, France, Greece, Iceland, Italy, Luxembourg, Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, Sweden, Switzerland and Turkey.

cent, coal 10 per cent and oil 20 per cent.

In its own estimates, the government used two assumptions: First, the "high" assumption that prices will stay about where they are for the next four years; and second, the "low" assumption that prices will not vary much through June, 1949, and then will drop 7 1/2 per cent in each of the three following years.

Using these and other variable factors, the government arrived at a high estimate for the Marshall plan of \$17,800,000,000 and a low estimate of \$15,100,000,000.

**Closer to High Figure**

But in announcing his "best estimate" of \$17,000,000,000, as the basis for congressional action, Mr. Truman hewed much closer to the high figure than the low one.

Secretaries at home are the major reason why U. S. shipments will be smaller than those estimated by the Paris conference, the report said. On the other hand, it foresaw a "considerable increase" in supplies available from other western hemisphere nations.

The U. S. is expected to supply goods valued at \$19,300,000,000, instead of the \$20,000,000,000 projected at Paris, while other hemisphere countries will supply about \$15,600,000,000 worth instead of \$15,000,000,000.

The 35,900,000,000 in shipments from the western hemisphere makes up the bulk of some \$58,500,000,000 in imports from outside countries during the recovery period. The report notes that "Europeans will be able to pay for two-thirds of their imports during the next four years through their own efforts; that is, without dollar help."

**Can Meet Some Requests**

The report said that in the case of cotton, dried fruit, canned or dried milk, sugar, and tobacco the Paris requests can be approximately met or exceeded.

But the next crop year will send only 22,000,000 metric tons of grain to Europe from all sources, the report predicted, as against a request for 29,300,000 tons.

That gloomy outlook may be reviewed somewhat in the light of last night's forecast of a possible billion-bushel U. S. wheat crop in 1948.

The fourth in history.

The Marshall plan report was drafted before the Agriculture department issued its forecast, which gave a far more favorable outlook for fall-sown winter wheat than had been expected a few weeks ago. This crop year yield, 838,705,000 bushels, the department said, and officials guess that spring wheat might add 275,000,000 bushels to the total.

In the local and crop year ending June 30, 1949, Europe can expect to import only 1,100,000 metric tons of fats and oils, instead of 1,900,000; 1,800,000 metric tons of meat instead of 2,300,000; 180,000 metric tons of nitrogen instead of 220,000 tons, the document said.

And as for farm machinery, the government figured the United States and Canada could spare only \$637,500,000 worth in four years, as against the Paris estimate of \$1,200,000,000.
