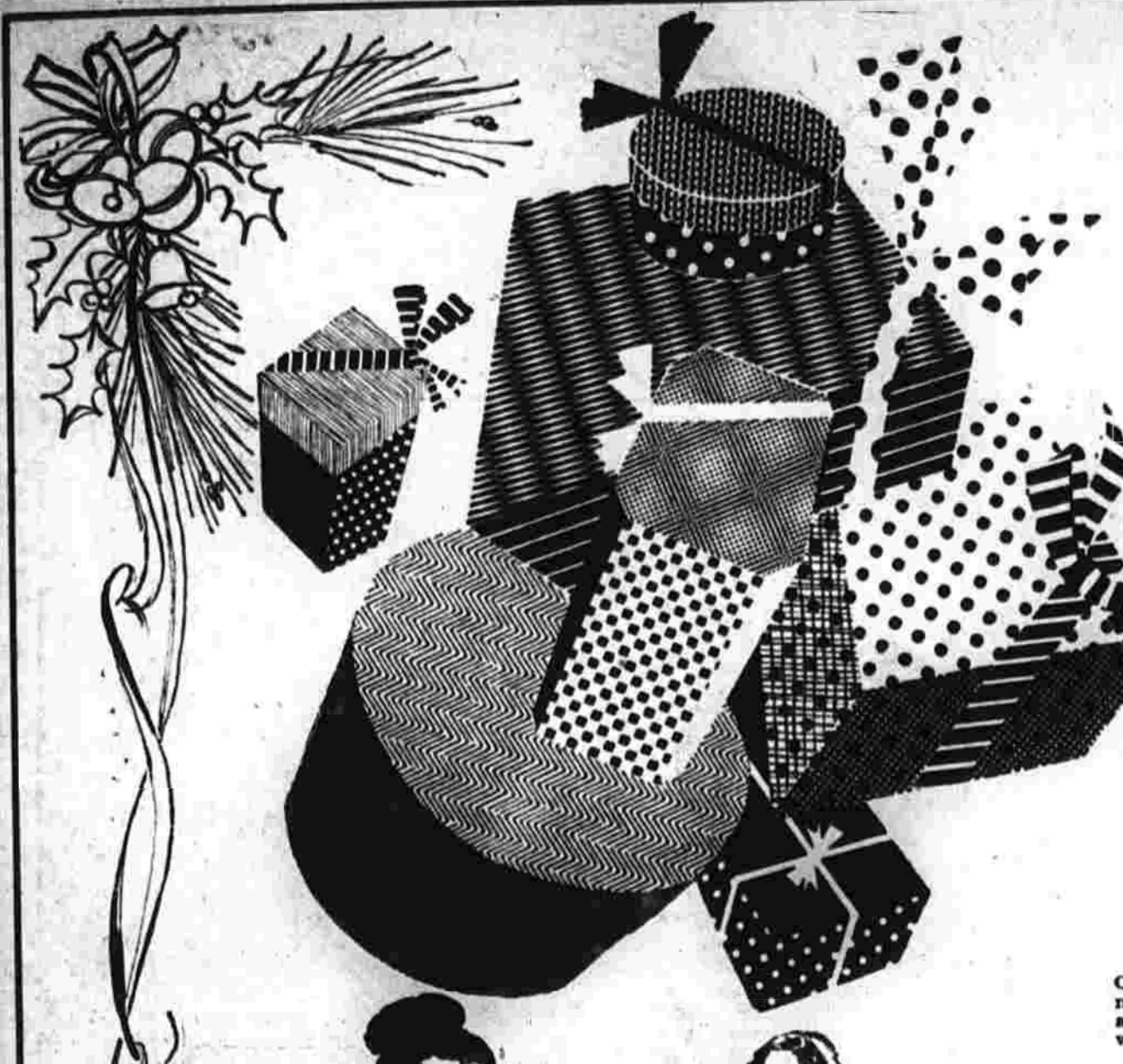

Kraemer to Fight Charges Campaign Collections Made

New Haven, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Frank W. Kraemer, Federal collector of internal revenue for Connecticut, served notice today that he would combat charges that he unlawfully collected Democratic campaign funds from his subordinates, and blamed "disgruntled employees" for the investigation resulting in indictment by Grand Jury.

Kraemer, indicted here with two of his top aides yesterday on charges they violated the Penderact act, a part of the Federal corrupt practices law, during the 1946 campaign, declined comment on the case except to say that the Grand jury probe into his department was precipitated "upon the complaint of disgruntled employees."

Asked whether he intended to plead innocent, he replied forcefully: "Oh, definitely!" His co-defendants, Thomas J. O'Neil of Canaan, chief of the income tax division, and Ralph Piccolo, deputy collector in charge of the Bridgeport office, would withhold statements until they had consulted their lawyers. Kraemer has retained as his counsel Robert F. Butler, former U. S. attorney for Connecticut, and O'Neil will be represented by Valentine Sacco, former assistant U. S. attorney.

A Federal grand jury accused the three men of having illegally collected and collected about \$2,000 from 27 internal revenue employees "for the purpose of furthering the aims of the Democratic party" in the 1946 general election. The jury, in a five weeks' investigation, longest in the history of the U. S. District court here, had taken testimony from about 600 witnesses, most of them former workers in the internal revenue bureau's Connecticut office.

U. S. Attorney Adrian W. Maher, a former Democratic state legislator, said a conviction on any count in the multiple-count indictment would result in a fine of \$5,000 from the Federal service, plus a fine of \$5,000 or three years imprisonment or both.

No arraignment date has been set. Kraemer, a one-time close political ally of Gov. Borden Thayer, was indicted in 1946.

21 Enter Plea Of Innocence Nationwide Strike Again Faces Italy

Rome, Dec. 20.—(AP)—A nationwide strike began in Italy's food industries and violence broke out over a Christmas day among Naples' jobless today, as Pope Pius XII issued a Holy week message that class hatred threatened the very foundations of national unity.

Another American tribunal, hearing the war-crime case against the Krupp armaments trust, rejected yesterday a plea for acquittal by the defendant, Alfred Krupp, that he be given the right to have an American attorney. The ruling opened the way for a challenge of the tribunal's legality.

The motion led heavy stress on a U. S. constitutional guarantee that every accused has the right to counsel of his own choice. The prosecution maintained it would be a violation of the constitution to allow the defendant to have an American attorney.

Vatican City, Dec. 20.—(AP)—The pope today declared in a broadcast that he would not operate a military rule to concentrate forces. Many of the settlements, however, are well fortified and strategically placed for defense.

Rough Going Looms For Marshall Plan; Attacks Are Begun

Washington, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Sharp attacks from both Republican and Democratic ranks today forecast rough going for the four-year, \$17,000,000,000 Marshall plan when Congress comes back to work Jan. 6. Republican leaders — excluding Senator Vandenberg — are lining up behind a proposal by Senator Taft (R., Ohio), that any formal pledge of European aid be limited to one year. Taft wants Congress to review the program annually and decide whether it should be continued.

Lord Beaverbrook's Daily Express, however, devoted nearly a column to explaining why it thought "Britain should not become a beneficiary of the (Marshall) plan bearing his name."

The Express listed as reasons: "One: Because with determination and industry this country can do without Marshall aid." "Two: Because the British are at their best when brought hard up against reality." "Three: Because the plan is presented as an example of Communist duplicity."

To List Names Solons Sought

Anderson to 'Let Chips Fall Where They May' in Speculators Listing

Washington, Dec. 20.—Secretary of Agriculture Anderson today prepared to make public on "let the chips fall where they may" basis a list of some 14,000 speculators in such commodities as wheat, corn and butter.

Backed by a congressional resolution, Anderson said he would be able to give them out within the next week.

He already had made it plain that the list will include the names of congressmen, if any, as well as officials in the government executive departments. If any, they will be named in the list.

Washington interest was whetted by the fact that Anderson himself, during a speech Oct. 9 in Chicago denouncing speculators, said he could "name names" and "name these names" to the public.

This was followed by Republican demands that he hand over to Congress the names of any government officials who might have attended their bank accounts by large-scale gambling in commodities during the year in the cost of living.

After an unsuccessful attempt by the Senate Appropriations Committee to get the list by subpoenaing Anderson Thursday, the Senate passed the resolution.

The House followed suit yesterday and President Truman promptly signed it.

Anderson said identifications on the speculator list will be checked closely to avoid mistakes in listing persons with similar names who are not in the market.

The information will be handed to the Senate Appropriations Committee as well as to the House special committee set up under the chairmanship of Representative August H. Anderson (R., Minn.) to explore the whole field of commodity gambling.

During the early stages of his investigation the Senate group turned up Edwin W. Pauley, friend of the President and special assistant to Secretary of the Army.

Pauley is reported to have been named in the list. He had since disposed of nine-tenths of his holdings and that he had been named to avoid even being exposed to any information about his holdings.

Typhoid Fever Proves Fatal

Research Micro - Biologist Victim; Source Of Infection Sought

Hartford, Dec. 20.—(AP)—Dr. Kenneth M. Wheeler, research micro-biologist who founded Connecticut's first laboratory for the study of virus diseases, died late yesterday of typhoid fever at isolation hospital.

An inquiry was under way today to determine how the 37-year-old internationally known scientist contracted the disease.

Dr. Friend D. Mickles, director of the state Bureau of Laboratories, called Dr. Wheeler's death "unusual, particularly because we do not have many deaths from typhoid in Connecticut."

Health department officials said that although there are about 200 known typhoid carriers in Connecticut there were no known secondary cases of the disease. They said they will seek to learn if he had contact with any of the carriers.

Surviving are his mother, Mrs. Alma Wheeler, his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Steiner Wheeler and two children, Kenneth, four and Marjorie, one, all of Bloomfield. Funeral arrangements are incomplete.

The Doctor Says:

Seventy cases of diabetes were found in a special survey made in the city of Oxford, Mass. This total included 30 persons who did not know that they had the disease. Hugh L. C. Wilkerson, M.D., and Leo E. Kravitz, M.D., United States Health Service, who report their experience in the Journal of the American Medical Association, predict, on the basis of the survey, that diabetes is more common than has been realized.

Oxford has a population density roughly the same as that of the country as a whole. The first step in the survey was to set up centers in the town hall and the fire station. People were asked to come after their noon or evening meal, so that a specimen of blood or urine could be taken about one hour after eating.

Blood and urine examinations were made in special laboratories on the spot. A test to learn how effectively certain foods contain sugar, was done. After an overnight fast suspects were given a quarter of a pound of bread by mouth, following which blood and urine specimens were taken. If the blood sugar was high, a second test was given until the blood had returned to normal.

Although diabetes is thought to be much more common in women than in men, in the survey men and women were equally represented. They were being tested for 10 years of age, and over one-third of them were under 40 years old.

Symptoms Present

The majority of new diabetes discovered by the survey had symptoms suggestive of diabetes, although they had not realized they had the disease. Warning signs of diabetes are increased appetite and thirst, increased urination, heaviness of the skin, weight loss, and crampy pains in the legs. All persons past the age of 50 should have an annual health examination, even though they feel well. In the interval between examinations, if the person develops signs of diabetes, they should be referred to a doctor at once.

QUESTION: My 25-year-old son becomes severely itchy when he takes a bath. What is the cause, and what can be done about it?

ANSWER: Excessive dryness and itches result from removal of too much oil in bathing. Condition can be relieved by application of a baby oil preparation.
