A flat 12 cents per hour wage increase to all on the weekly payroll with a raise in the plant minimum wage from 90 cents per hour to one dollar per hour was announced here today by Cheney Brothers and officials of the I.W.A. Local 63. At the same time it was announced that the wage for the six weeks "starter" rating has been lifted from 80 to 85 cents per hour.

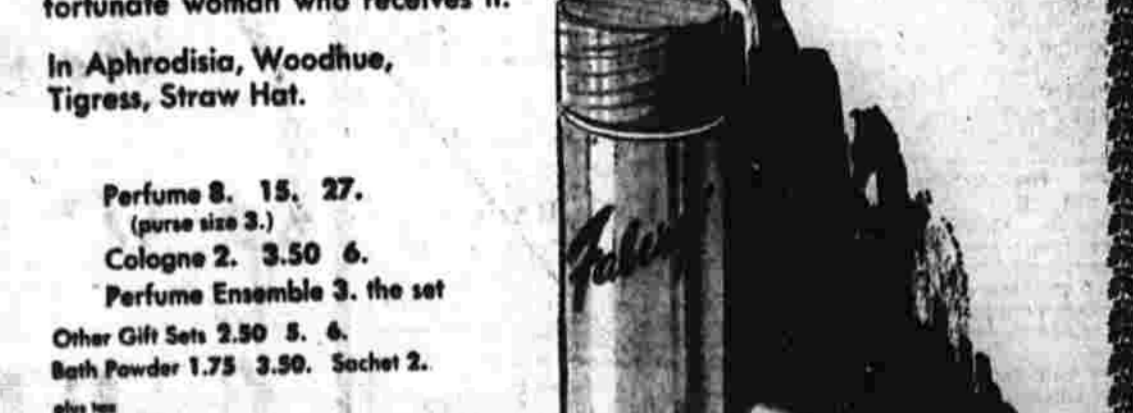

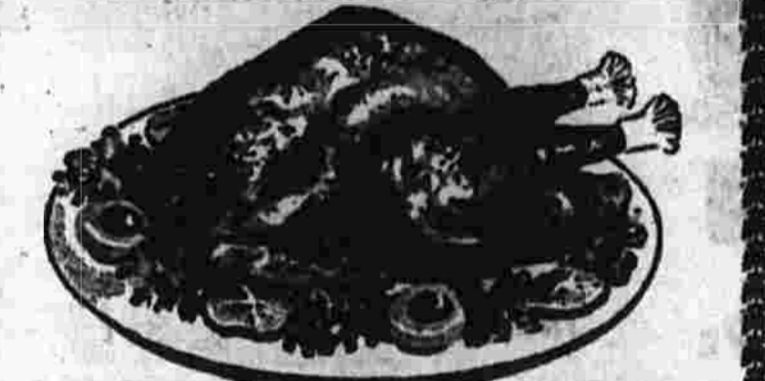
