Told to Avoid Job in Films

Marie Ballentine Testis Producer Would Be Embarrassed

Santa Monica, Calif., Jan. 21.—(AP)—The mother of George G. (Buddy) De Sylva's three-year-old son born out of wedlock testified yesterday the film producer urged her not to accept a job in the motion picture industry because it would embarrass him.

Marie Ballentine 33, said in Superior court De Sylva told her: "Don't go into the picture business because that's where my friends are. Go into the oil business instead."

She said he threatened to stop payments for support of Stephen Ballentine if she didn't comply.

Cites Increased Costs

Miss Ballentine testified she signed a contract accepting \$500 a month from 1949 to 1965 for her son's support. She has asked \$1,575 a month, citing increased costs of living. De Sylva would pay to have the amount reduced to \$350 a month.

Miss Ballentine said she met De Sylva in Hollywood in 1937 and became his private secretary two years later.

"Within two or three months we were intimate," she testified. "This intimacy continued for years."

Rules Apprentices Included in Unit

Washington, Jan. 21.—(AP)—The National Labor Relations Board ruled today that apprentices employed by the General Research Laboratory of the Underwood Corporation of Hartford, Conn., should be included in any unit designated for collective bargaining purposes.

The ruling was given in a case brought by the International Brotherhood of Machinery and Machinists.

The company had contended that apprentices should be excluded from the bargaining unit.

The board also ordered an election at the plant to determine whether the workers want the International Association of Machinists as their collective bargaining unit.

Boy Rescued After Creek Ice Breaks

Pittsburgh, Jan. 21.—(AP)—A nine-year-old boy was rescued from Charters creek after his body was carried 100 feet under a broken ice dam.

Matthew (Ike) Cavanaugh was on route home from school when he fell through thin ice along the creek bank and disappeared. Three rangers alerted to the scene ran 100 feet downstream and through the ice to reach the boy's waist, breaking the ice as they went.

A brown tanned cap bobbed to the surface a few moments later and Breakman Frank Abbott lunged for it and came up with Matthew in his arms. The boy is recovering from the ordeal at his home.

Vets' Interest In Insurance

World War I Veterans Learn They May Be Eligible for Renewal

Hartford, Jan. 21.—Wide publicity given National Service Life Insurance, the protection now available to World War I veterans, has renewed interest in World War I veterans in U. S. Government Life Insurance, according to Arthur M. Grayson, insurance officer of the Hartford veterans administration regional office. Grayson pointed out that many veterans on World War I who served in the armed forces between October 6, 1917 and July 2, 1921 may be eligible for USGLI.

"The increased number of queries as to U. S. Government Life Insurance that we have been receiving from older ex-servicemen in this area has caused us to become aware of their USGLI rights and privileges or had forgotten them," Grayson said.

"Of course," he continued, "some of these persons had their policies for cash or paid-up insurance and now cannot replace them. On the other hand, many World War I veterans probably still have their policies but have simply failed to restate them through the years."

Seven types of USGLI are available to eligible World War I veterans: the five-year level premium term, ordinary life, 20-year and 30-payment life, 20-year and 30-payment term, and 20-year and 30-payment term.

Low rates for new insurance are based on present attained age, and the normal medical examination is required.

Any World War I veteran in a route home from the service in the United States is urged to contact Grayson to request a VA Form 10-1 for full description of the program, and to contact his nearest VA office.

Atlantic Fleet Plans Maneuvers

Charleston, S. C., Jan. 21.—(AP)—The Atlantic fleet will hold maneuvers in Atlantic and West Indies waters from February 9 to March 15 with Army units participating and landing operations scheduled on Puerto Rico.

Admiral William H. P. Blandy, fleet commander who stopped here yesterday on a tour of inspection, announced the maneuvers and said they would cover practically every phase of Naval and amphibious operations.

In answer to questions from newspaper men Blandy declared "It is silly to say there is no defense against the atomic bomb. He said the defense measures would include concrete underground structures, utilization of the bomb itself, and 'not being there when the bomb goes off.'"

Kerosene Now Causes Worry

State Fuel Oil Situation No Worse as Result of Cold Wave

Hartford, Jan. 21.—(AP)—The state fuel oil situation, critical for weeks, apparently has not worsened as a result of Monday's cold wave, and is causing officials less concern than a dwindling kerosene supply.

This was the situation as outlined by the State Fuel Advisory committee as Governor McCone's report on any oil or kerosene problem, no substantiated cases of which have been found thus far, according to the state officials.

The Fuel committee's immediate task is to allocate and distribute three million gallons of Diesel oil, said to be usable in home burners, which the Navy loaned to the state.

Actions to Know of Googing

The governor, stating he and the Fuel committee were most anxious to know about any price gouging, said last night "if any profiteering is discovered, I will use every power at my command to stop it."

He said he had no immediate plans to invoke a 25-year-old law giving a state attorney general powers to deal with fuel profiteers or hoarders in an emergency, but "I am well aware that it exists, and am prepared to invoke it should the situation warrant such extreme action."

Judge Shifts Date of Trial

Hicks Takes Under Advisement Plea to Quash Indictments

New Haven, Jan. 21.—(AP)—Federal Judge Carroll C. Hicks today had under advisement a defense plea to quash indictments which charged three suspended top Internal Revenue officials in Connecticut with illegally soliciting funds for the 1946 Democratic campaign.

In the meantime, Judge Hicks had changed the probable trial date for Kenneth W. Kraemer, collector; Thomas J. O'Neil and Ralph A. Piccolo, from Feb. 9 to the first week of April.

Butler, who pressed for the quashing of the indictments, asked the postponement because, he said, he was too ill to properly try the case at the present time.

Butler, former United States attorney for Connecticut, challenged the indictments on two major grounds at a hearing here yesterday.

He won the court's permission to inquire into the political affiliations of the 22 members of the grand jury which brought in the indictments against the three former revenue officials.

15 Registered Republicans

With testimony, Butler brought out that 15 of the grand jurors were registered Republicans, while seven were without registered party affiliations.

Butler also charged Court Clerk Charles Elliott Pickett, with being "discriminatory" in choosing the members of the jury, and the attorney, Adrian W. Maher, objected on the ground that both Pickett and Jury Commissioner Charles G. Morris denied in their testimony that they had used discriminatory practices.

Valentine J. Sacco, O'Neil's counsel, asserting that the jury did not represent "a true cross section" of the community, offered evidence that "political exclusion is just as bad as religious, racial or geographic exclusion."

"We maintain," he stated, "it was essential to have registered Democrats on the jury."



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Peters Quits PCA Position

Yale Professor Assests Group Not Able to Assume Responsibility

New Haven, Jan. 21.—(AP)—Dr. John P. Peters, professor of internal medicine at Yale university, said today that he has resigned as vice chairman of the National Board of Directors of the Progressive Citizens of America, because, he declared, "the PCA is in no position to assume the responsibility for a national third party ticket in the coming election."

Disclosing that he had also yielded his position as honorary vice chairman of the Connecticut PCA chapter, Peters said his resignation had been submitted to C. R. Baldwin of New York, PCA national executive vice chairman.

"Great Respect for Wallace"

Declaring he has "great respect for (Henry A.) Wallace," Peters said that "the PCA has been an educational organization and has not as far as I know, in any state a true political organization on which it may rely. Certainly this is not the case of Connecticut."

"Without such an organization," the Yale professor continued, "an attempt to launch a third party at this moment will prove not only futile but disastrous. A protest movement may be advantageous at times but, unless it is very strong, can never be highly effective and at a critical moment like this can be highly dangerous. Surely there is no hope of success in the 1948 campaign and without such hope we are only lending strength to reaction."

"Liberalism Not Dead"

Expressing the belief that "it is possible to overcome... and possibly to alter" ideological differences between northern and southern Democrats, Peters declared that "the results of the 1947 elections suggest that liberalism is not dead, but it needs stimulation and that even political opportunists in the Democratic party will force modification of the reactionary trend."

"It was worthwhile to attempt to influence the coming (Democratic) convention," Peters said. "Our opportunity to do this if we launch a third party with Wallace is entirely gone. Already labor and other liberal organizations have expressed their opposition to this move."

"In view of these sentiments," he concluded, "I have no alternative but to submit my resignation in protest against the third party movement."

Peters said that Mrs. Peters had resigned as a member of the Connecticut PCA Board of Directors and as co-chairman of the Third Congressional district (New Haven) division.


