Berlin, Feb. 6.—(AP)—The United States and Britain, ignoring Russian demands for dissolution of Bizstap, proclaimed today a stronger economic administration for the two zones with a high court to enforce decisions.

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Simple Trust Not Enough

Seymour Asserts Some Showing 'Ignorance' in Regard to Russia

New Haven, Feb. 6.—President Charles Seymour of Yale said today that an "ignorance of history" in Great Britain and the United States helped Hitler, and that some persons were showing the same "ignorance" in regard to Russia.

In an address prepared for commencement exercises where 350 students received degrees, the university president said it was important for the United States to seek and acquire a sense of historical perspective in facing both its domestic and foreign problems.

In England and the United States, after World War I, the damage done by the ignorance of the distortion of history was incalculable," Seymour said.

The Yale president, himself an historian of great note, said that the "journalistic revisionist" who "set forth the blamelessness of Germany in regard to the war" and the "historians of the First World War" mentioned, too, sentimental investigations "meant to prove that American intervention in World War I was a mistake" and the intrigues of bankers and armament makers.

"The effect upon opinion of such a caricature of history," said Seymour, "clears the path to appeasement in Great Britain and to isolationism in America. They save a free hand to Hitler."

He asserted he was "concerned with the ignorance of history implicit in the attitude of certain political figures who tell us that if we will honestly trust Russia, all will be well."

Saying that this showed "a naive faith in the reading of a political history, if it had been read at all," Seymour told the graduating class.

"Whatever the sincerity of this nation or that, a great deal more than simple trust is necessary to the wise conduct of international affairs. The doctrine of simple trust proves a wealth of ignorance relating to the history of Russia herself, where, since the time of Ivan the Terrible and Peter the Great, the history has been characterized by the course of politics, whether domestic or foreign."

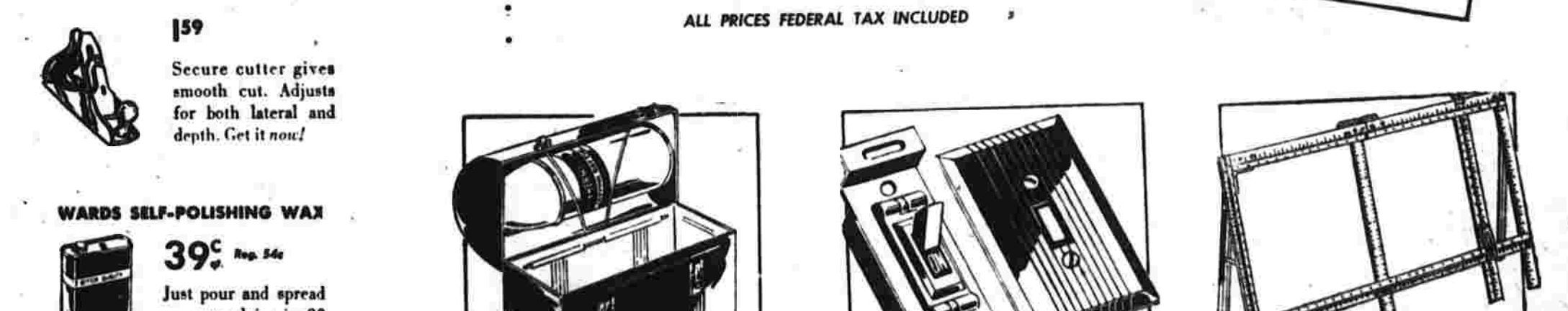
