Rec Activities To Be Checked

Monthly Reports to Be Made by Director to the General Manager

A monthly report on all town recreational activities is to be submitted by the recreation director to the general manager, George H. Wadell, disclosed today. Wadell said that heretofore there has been a lack of vital information on which exact estimates could be based. The form of report now to be used remedies this, he said.

There has been much argument in the past on amounts spent for recreation. Wadell said, however, that she is not satisfied yet that funds are apportioned correctly for the various activities.

The form is divided for each of the several recreation establishments in town, the athletic fields and community events. Particulars and spectators are to be noted at each, together with the type of attendance such as children, youths and adults.

Various Age Groups

This report will indicate just what is popular with various age groups, and a more intelligent use of funds may be possible as a result, it was said.

The system of reports is being extended where such information aids in planning or allotment of expenditures.

Monthly financial reports now are being handed to the directors, and reports on other municipal activities will be given in detail, either orally or in written form as the occasion warrants.

Finance Group Turns To Income Tax Bills

Even Sponsors View Measures as Doomed From Outset; Proposed as Alternative

Hartford, Feb. 20.—The General Assembly's Finance committee turned today to consideration of income tax bills—measures which even their sponsors viewed as doomed from the outset.

The income tax was proposed in the tax-cutting special session as an alternative to the sales and use tax, which by producing too much revenue brought the legislators back to the Capitol.

Income tax bills went down to overwhelming defeat by the Republican-controlled Legislature in the regular 1947 session. Some legislators said privately that the only reason income tax bills were introduced now was to give administration opponents a talking point in the coming political campaign.

Dress Rehearsal for Chicago

The special session has been a dress rehearsal for the approaching campaign since it started last Tuesday and yesterday's hearing of the Finance committee was no exception.

Its highlight was a verbal slugfest touched off by a Democratic contention that Governor McCoskey's Republican administration had not practiced "real economy."

The exchange pitted Senator Alfred F. Wechsler, Democratic minority leader in the Senate, against Senator Robert E. Parsons (R., Farmington), president pro tempore of that chamber.

Criticism Economy Record

Wechsler started it all by criticizing the administration's economy record. If there was "real economy," he contended, the sales tax could be repealed.

The Democratic leader's statements brought Parsons to his feet with one of the most heated defenses of the administration's fiscal policies since the sales tax was enacted last year.

Accusing Wechsler of having repeatedly "mised the people of Connecticut" with his charge that the administration was not practicing economy, Parsons blurted out that he wanted to tell him "the score."

Parsons listed examples which he said demonstrated that the administration was cutting government costs, then added:

"The charge by anyone that the government of Connecticut is not operated as economically as possible is not substantiated."

Wechsler shot back the charge that the Appropriations committee, of which Parsons is chairman, had "padded the state budget" by \$2,000,000.

The proof of his charge, he said, was the fact that the administration planned to give state employees a cost-of-living bonus from surpluses accumulated during the current biennium.

Parsons replied that the surplus has resulted from operating with fewer employees.

"Let's be honest, Senator, and just tell the people we just over-appropriated \$2,000,000," Wechsler rejoined.

Takes Up Sales Tax Bills

The committee at yesterday's hearing took up bills relating to the sales tax, including measures providing for its repeal and many proposals for its modification.

Republican leaders have said they would like to see the tax reduced to one or one and one-half per cent from its current three per cent rate, and new exemptions added to the present "free list." Such action would cut the tax returns down to the needed level of \$28,000,000 a year, they estimate. At

Judge Studies Milford Case

Decision Reserved on Petition to Define Manager's Authority

New Haven, Feb. 20.—Following a two-hour hearing Judge Edward J. Quinlan in Superior court yesterday reserved decision on the petition of the town of Milford for a definition of the city manager's authority to control the town's police and fire departments.

The action for a declaratory judgment was brought by Town Counsel Richard H. Simons following a controversy over the dismissal of the newly appointed town manager of the veteran's Police Chief Martin B. Fowler. Fowler was reinstated after a protest meeting with the police commissioners and Town Manager Adolph J. Keeney agreeing to let the court settle the matter.

Claims Powers Abolished

Town Counsel Simons contended yesterday that the manager-council act passed by the State Legislature and adopted by referendum in Milford last August, abolished the powers and duties of the Police and Fire Commissioners. Judge Omar W. Platt and Ephraim Sims, arguing against the manager, charged that the court properly had no right to give a declaratory judgment because they said, the law provides that such a judgment be given only when the plaintiff has some interest in the case. Judge Platt asserted that "the town of Milford has no interest in it."

Simons said that he "had no answer" to Judge Platt's remark and that he had heard "all this mumbo-jumbo before." He added that "the people of Milford heard it and threw it out by two to one."

Simons said that when he had nothing to do with the township of the act he believed it was a good act. If the Legislature wishes

Law Students Make Protest

Object Because Fenn Not Promoted to Full Professorship

New Haven, Feb. 20.—A group of Yale law students has protested because Henry Fenn, an associate professor, wasn't promoted to a full professorship.

Fenn was passed by when the board of professors recently met to make faculty promotions.

121 students, a letter protesting their failure to act appeared on the Law School bulletin board. Signed by 121 students, with 40 other signatures being added later, it was addressed to the board.

"We cannot be sure of your reasons," said the letter, "but we think Mr. Fenn has perhaps been guilty of the wrong kind of unselfishness by not making it so grandiose himself as to require to be promoted by 121 students. It has perhaps been his mistake that his work has been devoted to developing the courses he teaches rather than to conducting his personal interests."

Wesley A. Stanger, law school dean, declined to discuss the matter. Fenn also had no comment.

Pact Not Violated By Cruiser's Visit

Trieste, Free Territory, Feb. 19.—A recent visit of the American cruiser Providence to Trieste is not regarded by the Allied Military government here as a violation of the Italian peace treaty.

A spokesman said yesterday the treaty does not prohibit Naval operations in the Adriatic.

Press reports said Yugoslavians protested to Washington against the nine-day visit of the ship.

The spokesman said that the cruiser's presence violated a treaty provision limiting U. S. forces stationed in Trieste to 5,000.

The AMG spokesman said he had no official knowledge of the Yugoslav protest. In addition, he said sailors from a ship temporarily in port do not constitute part of the U. S. personnel regularly stationed here.

Benefit Claims Exceed 24,000

Hartford, Feb. 20.—The State Labor department said today that the number of claims for unemployment benefits last week exceeded 24,000 for the sixth consecutive week.

Placing the number of claims at 24,079, the department's report added they were "almost unchanged" over those made the previous week.

State Labor Commissioner John J. Keen pointed out however that the figure is "more than double" the postwar low of 12,048 reached during the last week of November, 1947.

Rent Increase Report Denied

No Complaints Noted in Hartford Area Because of Control Law

James T. Sullivan, Rent Director, denied today that there exists widespread complaints that landlords in the Hartford Defense Rental Area are giving notices of rent increases to their tenants to terminate the present Federal Rent Control Law.

Sullivan said that reports of this kind have come to the National Rent Office from areas in other states, and the Hartford office has been giving careful attention to whether or not any such activities were present in Connecticut.

The absence of such action on the part of landlords to increase rents here is largely due, Mr. Sullivan believes, to the fact that a State Rent Control Law is on the statute books ready to become effective immediately upon the expiration of the Federal Law. Then, too, he added, the pending action in Congress regarding the extension of the present Federal Law has given a strong indication that Congress is firm in its desire to continue rent control beyond the present expiration date in some form.

To those few tenants who are not under the protection of the law, the local rent office that their landlords have made known that they should continue to offer to pay on the due date the same maximum legal rent as they have paid in the past until they are so notified in writing by the Connecticut State Rent Control Law.

Mr. Sullivan also informed tenants that evictions are controlled under the State Rent Control Act and, generally speaking, a tenant receives the same protection from unlawful evictions as is now granted under the Federal Law.

It is Mars We Poised

It is to be fervently hoped that the conclusion of our scientists that those green spots on Mars may represent plant life is but the opening phase of a speedy demonstration that Mars does have life in every form.

We should prefer to have it discovered that this life on Mars is in a very high stage of scientific efficiency, and on the very brink of discovering and perfecting the problem of successful space transportation to the other planets of the universe.

Our own scientific and military observers would, then, soon reach the conclusion that Mars was preparing an attack upon some other planet, and this world's headlines might read:

MARS PLANS TO ATTACK EARTH IN 1949

That would give us on earth some ten months in which to prepare ourselves.

The first thing that would happen, once we were convinced that such an attack was impending, would be the delivery of two speeches.

One would be from Winston Churchill, who would again say, as he said in June, 1941, that whatever his personal past opinions of Soviet Russia might have been that same Soviet Russia must benefit to be regarded as a great and true ally.

The second speech would be from Premier Stalin, who would probably claim that the threatened planet must henceforth consider itself one world, in which all political and economic creeds must live and let live so that they might cooperate toward their common and mutual safety.

The events that would follow such speeches would be somewhat awe-inspiring. Since it would be obvious that the challenge from Mars could be repelled only by the most efficient use of all this world's resources, it would be obvious that no one could tolerate fratricidal skirmishes in Greece, Palestine, Indonesia, Indochina, China, or Germany.

It would be obviously suicidal to dispense any of our energies in economic or political warfare behind our own front lines.

There would be only one way to organize the military strength of the world for such a supreme test. That would be to organize it into one international force, commanded by one head, internationally selected.

Since it would be obviously impossible for the earth warriors to cooperate with one another if they spoke different tongues, or were unable to understand and appreciate each other's traditions and cultures, there would be great haste toward the creation of one world language, and the historians of all nations would be brought together in the emergency creation of one standard history of the world, in which the various nations would view each other as tolerantly as the individual states of the United States now view each other.

All this, and more, would certainly be decided upon and put into motion well before the ten months of our allotted preparation for the attack from Mars had expired. It would be done because all of us would realize that it represented more practical, common sense. We would be doing it not because we were realistic, but because we were realistic.

That is what those green patches on Mars might do for us, if they should prove, do for us.

State Administration Gets Verbal Drubbing

Three Potential Candidates for Democratic Nomination for Governor Join in Attack

New Haven, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Connecticut's Republican administration took a verbal drubbing here last night from three potential candidates for the Democratic nomination for governor.

Thomas J. Dodd, Chester Bowles and Wilbert Snow, all widely mentioned as possible leaders of the Democratic ticket next fall, joined in a full scale attack upon Gov. James McManis' record of state affairs.

They shared with Senator Brian McMahon (D., Conn.) the speaking platform at the Jefferson-Jackson day dinner which, at 8:30 to 11:00 p. m., brought 700 Connecticut Democrats to this city. Almost every party in the state was in the audience.

"Misguided" Critics Endanger Plan McMahon confined his speech to national affairs, asserting that the Marshall plan was endangered not by Communists but by "misguided" critics in Congress and elsewhere.

"Unable to envision the future," said McMahon, "they are preparing to cut, curtail and slash this program wherever they can."

"If they succeed in their efforts every dollar I need now by this short-sighted parsimony will be secured out a hundredfold later on for military expenditures."

First Tactics to Be Effort to Block Security Council Action

Lake Success, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Arab leaders today are reported planning a campaign for repeal of the Palestine partition project by the United Nations Assembly.

Well qualified sources said the first Arab tactic here would be an effort to block action in the Security Council debate starting Tuesday on the request for international military force to carry out partition.

To Contain Partition Illegal The Arab bloc would be to contain that partition is illegal. Additional to this now would be the argument that the scheme has been proven unworkable by violence in Palestine following the Assembly's vote.

The Arabs this hope for reconsideration of the whole partition plan by the 57-nation Assembly, in special session if necessary. They are reported willing to consider a compromise alternative.

3.—Iraq boycotted the Trusteeship Council.

State Chamber Says Instruments of Production Can Be Exempt

Hartford, Feb. 20.—(AP)—The Connecticut Chamber of Commerce, asking "Why drive Communist manufacturers into southern and western states?" today declared that "instruments of production can be exempt" from the sales and use tax levy.

In a letter to members urging them to express their views to state legislators, now in special session, Wayne C. Dickerson, C. of C. executive vice president, declared:

"The Connecticut Chamber has recommended exemption of low cost metal food premises, furniture and other items. It is asking too much, as we have also recommended to give business consideration by exempting instruments of production."

6 1/2 Per Cent From Business Dickerson pointed out that "reputable research figures show that 6 1/2 per cent of the state taxes in Connecticut are paid by business. Last year the corporation business (income) tax was raised 50 per cent, in addition to the 2 per cent use tax to which industry is subjected under the sales and use tax law."

"Instruments of production can be exempt," Dickerson continued. "Reliable estimates show that enough revenue can be secured without taxing them and lower the rate substantially."

State Administration Gets Verbal Drubbing

Three Potential Candidates for Democratic Nomination for Governor Join in Attack

New Haven, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Connecticut's Republican administration took a verbal drubbing here last night from three potential candidates for the Democratic nomination for governor.

Thomas J. Dodd, Chester Bowles and Wilbert Snow, all widely mentioned as possible leaders of the Democratic ticket next fall, joined in a full scale attack upon the administration of Governor McMahoney.

They shared with Senator Brian McMahon (D, Conn.) the speaking platform at the Jefferson-Jackson Dinner at 8:30 to 11:00 a. m. today at the Connecticut Democratic Club.

Most every speaker in the state was in the audience.

"McMahon criticizes the Marshall plan and the Democratic National Affairs, asserting that the Marshall plan was endangered not by Communists but by 'misguided' criticism in Congress and elsewhere."

"Unable to envision the future," Snow said, "the administration is preparing to cut, curtail and slash this program wherever they can."

"If they succeed in their efforts every dollar I read now by this short-sighted parliament will be poured out a hundred fold later on for military expenditures."

Wallace Supperer hit supporters of Henry A. Wallace's third party share with the criticism of the Democratic State Chairman John McKeilly who asserted that anyone who by supporting Wallace lessened the chances for a Democratic victory was "a traitor to the state."

"No one," said Bowles, "can say that Jim McKeilly is a liberal or a friend of the common rank."

Dodd, a former prosecutor at the Nuremberg war crimes trials, labeled the McMahon administration as "one of the most stupid ever to hold sway" in Connecticut. It had, he contended, "wittily betrayed the public interest."

Urged to Tell Solons Views

State Chamber Says Instruments of Production Can Be Exempt

Hartford, Feb. 20.—(AP)—The Connecticut Chamber of Commerce, asking "Why drive Communism out of Connecticut?" today urged state legislators to exempt instruments of production from the state income tax.

The Chamber of Commerce, in a letter to members urging them to express their views in state legislation, now in special session, Wayne C. Dickerson, C. O. Executive vice president, declared:

"The Connecticut Chamber has recommended exemption of low cost meals, food for premises, funeral expenses. It is asking too much, as we have also recommended, to give business consideration by exempting instruments of production."

841 Per Cent From Business

Dickerson pointed out that "reliable research figures show that 86.1 per cent of the state taxes in Connecticut are paid by business. Last year the corporation business tax (income tax was raised 50 per cent, in addition to the 3 per cent use tax to which industry is subjected under the sales and use tax law."

"Instruments of production can be exempt," Dickerson continued. "Reliable estimates show that enough revenue can be secured without taking them and lower the rate substantially."

Dickerson said that 85 per cent of all products manufactured in Connecticut "are sold outside our state."

Ability to Compete Vital

"This means that ability to compete is vital to Connecticut industry," he asserted, "and to the welfare of every individual in the state."

He pointed out that in one western city 127 new manufacturing plants had been established during 1947, creating 7,280 jobs, and that 506 plants had spent \$27,000,000 in expanding existing facilities.

"We urge you," he stated in his letter to members, "to help maintain Connecticut's industrial leadership and ability, promote its expansion, and thus benefit employment—the basis of a sound economy."

Peace Outlook Seen Brighter

Stassen Says Removal of Reds From Labor Leadership Helpful

Seattle, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Harold G. Stassen told an audience here last night that removal of Communists from labor leadership and from government payrolls "will brighten the prospect of world peace."

He said the foreign policy of Russia has been based on a "miscalculation" of its ability to "successfully infiltrate Communism into the democracies of the world."

He added that the sooner they are proved wrong, "the better will be the chances for a change of Russian policy for the better."
