Very interesting good sense lay behind the mood in which both the Republican state organization and the so-called Charter Oaker Republicans entered this special session. The danger was, so far as the organization was concerned, that the Charter Oakers might possibly seize at least partial control of the session. They happened to be the individuals who had been conspicuously right during the 1947 session. They stood in a position where they might possibly receive wide support from those legislators who had afterwards resented the machine tactics by which the 1947 session had been run.

The danger was, so far as the Charter Oakers were concerned, that they might put their strength to some premature test, or fall into some mistaken strategy of opposing the state organization just for the fun of it.

For the result which did eventually occur, it was necessary for two things to be realized. First, it was necessary for the Charter Oakers themselves to realize that they were not the majority in the legislature, and that they were not in the popularity of the possible personal animosity of any of the members of the House.

Second, it was necessary for the Charter Oakers to realize that the real strength of the Charter Oakers was in the area which represented the only arena where their challenge could be successfully met.

Now obviously the state organization might discover what they actually stand for on the issue of peace, and there are a few Republicans who make it imperative, if they have any regard for their own welfare, that they find their own souls.

There isn't the slightest question that the great issue of our time is exactly the issue Mr. Wallace has taken up. The issue of peace, it is to be noted, is the issue that has two old parties here, the Wallace threat should be, if they take it as they should take it, a healthy tonic for their own political life.

If the two old parties here to the Wallace challenge with that soul-searching and that effort to determine constructive policies for themselves which would be perhaps long needed, they will emerge from this period of challenge stronger and healthier. If they fail to do this, they can measure how much strength they may be yielding to Wallace.

Kaiser-Frazer To Cut Operations
 Detroit, Feb. 25.—(AP)—The Kaiser-Frazer Corp. announced today a "temporary" cutback of operations, including elimination of the night shift at its Willow Run plant and the laying off of 2,000 workers.

The move will mean an "appreciable" lowering of the plant's auto production over the next few weeks. Edgar F. Kaiser, vice president and general manager, said the cutback resulted from "an economy drive in the face of mounting costs that have forced several auto manufacturers recently to raise prices."

The new one-shift operations are scheduled to start March 5. During the first four days of March the company will suspend production while adjusting to the new schedule, according to Kaiser.

Victim of Clubbing Is Given Chance
 Portland, Ore., Feb. 25.—(AP)—A five-year-old victim of a playmate's brutal clubbing was given a fair chance today to live.

The Doernbecher hospital reported the youngster, Larry Matott, underwent an operation last night as physicians worked to save his life. He had suffered a punctured abdomen, believed from a stab by a sharp stick.

Deputy Sheriff Ronald Calhoun said a 13-year-old playmate of the Matott child was held in a juvenile detention home. Police said they have yet to learn what prompted the attack. The older boy was not named.

The Logical Solution
 The chances that this nation shall find a way to satisfy its own ideas about possession of trained military personnel without adopting the totalitarian, straitjacketing evil of conscription seem to be on the increase.

In the first place, although the members of the House of Representatives have, since Feb. 5th, had an opportunity to vote out conscription bill from this session, only 14 members of the House have signed the petition put on the House clerk's desk for that purpose.

The petition, which has 218 signatures to succeed in its purpose, that of bringing the bill up for discussion, is a healthy sign that Congress has not lost its head of sense which involves a fundamental and permanent change in the American system of living.

Perhaps a good many of those who refuse to sign this petition are suffering from election year jitters, and want to avoid facing such an issue with an election coming up.

But that is not the whole explanation is demonstrated by another and more constructive movement in the House—a movement born in the ranks of the 74 World War II veterans who are members of the House.

These war veteran Congressmen, looking at the problem both from the point of view of their own military experience and their own legislative responsibility, have concluded from the military point of view that the proposed system of conscription would be of little real military value for modern war.

They believe, instead, that this country should maintain sizeable reserves of men being periodically trained and retained in the specialist tasks which would be most important in any new war.

They have formulated a program under which they think this goal can be met. It calls for enlargement of the Reserve Officers Training Corps for youths in college, expansion of the National Guard for non-college youth, and extension of the regular army reserves in all military branches, with summer training with pay for all.

Such a system, at a cost perhaps one tenth of that of conscription, could satisfy this nation's need for a continually trained manpower, and do so on a voluntary rather than a compulsory basis. It would be more efficient as real preparation for war than conscription could ever be. It is the answer which has already been logical. It is good news that the war veteran members of Congress, at least, have come to it openly.

Five or Six Civilians and Policemen Killed in New Outbreaks

Seoul, Feb. 25.—The U. S. Army reported today five or six Korean civilians and a policeman were killed in a new outbreak of communist-inspired agitation against the United Nations. Thirteen Koreans were injured, some seriously.

Attack Police Boxes

The moister Army report said groups of from 50 to 1,000 attacked police boxes last night at widely scattered points in southern Korea.

The incidents were similar to those of Feb. 7 in which 18 persons were killed. Riots at that time carried placards demanding the withdrawal of the UN commission for Korea. The commission was threatened by Russians in its attempt to plan nationwide elections leading to Korean self-government.

Chinese Cross Into Mongolia

Tax Dispatch Reports Two Raids by Troops Late in January

Moscow, Feb. 25.—The Soviet press today carried a "Tax dispatch" which said Chinese troops made two raids into the Mongolian Peoples republic in late January.

According to the Soviet news agency dispatch, which was prominently displayed in Moscow papers, the Chinese raiders captured a Mongolian border guard on one occasion, and killed two guards on the other.

Tax quoted the Mongolian newspaper "Times" as saying the raid occurred Jan. 22 and Jan. 25. "The Mongolian government demanded punishment of the guilty persons," it said. "The captured guard is being returned," it said. "The Mongolian government reserves the right to demand compensation for damage done. It has demanded that property stolen from Mongolian territory be returned."

The Tax account said Chinese cavalrymen penetrated the Mongolian frontier for 75 miles on their first occasion, and that 120 Mongolian residents were attacked. It said the Chinese force stayed in Mongolia for two days "robbing and murdering peaceful aborigines."

During the second attack, Tax counted, Chinese soldiers went 10 miles into Mongol territory attacking frontier guards, returning to China after killing two guards. "Taking with them cattle, arms and personal belongings of the border guards."

The Soviet papers had no editorial comment on the Tax story. The U.S.R. has a mutual assistance pact with Mongolia.
