Jewish Appeal Meeting Set
Conference to Be in Hartford March 14; To Seek Biggest Goal

Hartford, March 5.—The great private fund-raising campaign ever staged by Connecticut Jewish communities is likely to emerge from the March 14th state conference of the United Jewish Appeal to be held at the Hotel Bond in Hartford, it was indicated to-

day by conference chairman George F. Gershal. Mr. Gershal announced that the more than 300 delegates expected at the meeting were advancing proposals for the adoption of a community-wide goal of the UJA's unprecedented \$250,000,000 nationwide goal for refugees, overseas needs and Palestine.

The conference will formulate a detailed program to aid Europe's 1,500,000 distressed Jews, take steps to provide large-scale assistance for the settlement, upbuilding and security of Jewish Palestine, and map materially increased help for displaced persons arriving in the United States.

Prominent among those who will address the conference delegates are Lt. Gov. James Shannon, who

will speak on behalf of Gov. James T. McConaughy; Dr. leader Louis U. B. Representative to the United Nations Economic and Social Council; and Dr. Ruth Gruber, noted foreign correspondent.

Final action on the United Jewish Appeal's three-fold aid program will be taken at the meeting, following presentation of the plan, rehabilitation and resettlement needs of the UJA's three constituent agencies. . . . The Distribution Committee, United Palestine Appeal and United Jewish Appeal.

Mr. Gershal announced also that the delegates will consider special aid to expedite the mass transfer this year of 75,000 displaced persons placed here for the settlement, upbuilding and security of Jewish Palestine, and map materially increased help for displaced persons arriving in the United States.

The conference will begin at 12:30 p. m. and will conclude at 5:30 p. m.

Wigan, England, March 5.—(AP)—The Labor government's unprecedented success in holding its parliamentary margin continued yesterday.

R. W. Williams, Labor union organizer, defeated Conservative Schoolmaster Harold Dowling 28,911 to 17,496 in yesterday's by-election here. Labor's majority was down almost a third from the general election three years ago when they won by 16,736 votes.

In 27 previous by-elections Labor has won only one seat to the Conservatives.

Labor now has 296 seats with none vacant against 198 seats for two vacant for the Conservatives out of 640 common seats.

Old Glass Works History Told At G.A.R. Meeting

Orford Parish Chapter, D.A.R., held its March meeting in the Federal room at Center church yesterday afternoon, with Mrs. Frank Spencer as hostess and Mrs. Raymond Burham, the regular presiding.

Following routine business and reports by chairman of committee on the new structure, the chapter, Mrs. Burham presented Mrs. C. R. Burr as a long, loyal friend and past report of Orford Parish chapter. Mrs. Burr gave an interesting paper on the history of the Old Glass Works from a paper prepared by Mrs. J. M. Williams in 1929, also the Elizabethan home and the Governor Trumbull's home in Lebanon, Mrs. Burr showed many articles of the Revolutionary period—Pitkin bottles, an old loom used to weave suspenders. This was very old and carved from one piece of wood.

Among the architectural relics of by-gone days none stand out more prominently in this vicinity than the ruins of the old Pitkin Glass Works. The Pitkins built the first powder mill in the state, the manufacturing powder for the Continental Army in the town of Orford Parish, now the town of Manchester, who kept "the home fires burning" during the struggle for independence. They owned and operated several powder mills to supply ammunition to the government on long credit. Capt. Timothy Pitkin was relieved from active service to superintend this work. The young government was too poor to pay for the powder or even the salt-peter used in its manufacture. In lieu of compensation for powder supplied the government granted a patent of monopoly in 1785. William and Elizabeth Pitkin and Samuel Bishop to manufacture glass in the state of Connecticut for 24 years.

Made Bottles Mostly The principal product of the factory was bottles. The chief raw material used was from New Jersey to Hartford in barges and from there it was drawn by teams to the factory. High transportation costs made bottles more expensive than other forms of glass.

As the descendants of the Pitkin family are scattered all over the state, it is not surprising that it was feared that this Revolutionary relic the Glassworks ruins, would be without special care. To preserve these interesting ruins the Orford Parish Chapter, daughters of the American Revolution, conceived the idea of securing them. After six years of patient work on the part of Mrs. Frank Spencer, at the time report of Orford Parish Chapter, and the late Miss Mary Cheney, former report, as well as H. C. Brown, chairman of the committee, the late Judge William S. Hyde, deeds of transfer of the property from the Pitkin heirs by Orford Parish Chapter, D. A. R. were given in April 1945. Old Glass Works History Told At G.A.R. Meeting

Orford Parish Chapter, D.A.R., held its March meeting in the Federal room at Center church yesterday afternoon, with Mrs. Frank Spencer as hostess and Mrs. Raymond Burham, the regular presiding.

Following routine business and reports by chairman of committee on the new structure, the chapter, Mrs. Burham presented Mrs. C. R. Burr as a long, loyal friend and past report of Orford Parish chapter. Mrs. Burr gave an interesting paper on the history of the Old Glass Works from a paper prepared by Mrs. J. M. Williams in 1929, also the Elizabethan home and the Governor Trumbull's home in Lebanon, Mrs. Burr showed many articles of the Revolutionary period—Pitkin bottles, an old loom used to weave suspenders. This was very old and carved from one piece of wood.

Among the architectural relics of by-gone days none stand out more prominently in this vicinity than the ruins of the old Pitkin Glass Works. The Pitkins built the first powder mill in the state, the manufacturing powder for the Continental Army in the town of Orford Parish, now the town of Manchester, who kept "the home fires burning" during the struggle for independence. They owned and operated several powder mills to supply ammunition to the government on long credit. Capt. Timothy Pitkin was relieved from active service to superintend this work. The young government was too poor to pay for the powder or even the salt-peter used in its manufacture. In lieu of compensation for powder supplied the government granted a patent of monopoly in 1785.
