Demand for Probe Of Coup in Prague May Air Situation

Chile's Action Puts Russia in Role of Defendant Before World; Many Seen Possibility of East-West Showdown as Result

Lake Success, March 13.—(AP)—Chile's demand for United Nations investigation of the Communist coup in Czechoslovakia pushed Russia today into the role of a defendant before the world. It also opened the way for airing of conditions in at least one part of Soviet-dominated eastern Europe. Many saw the possibility of an east-west showdown. Put on Provisional Calendar The Security Council met today on its provisional calendar for next Wednesday. The Russian delegation refused to discuss the Chilean allegations that the meeting was a "member state against another member state" and that the extent and magnitude of the plans of the U.S.S.R. stand revealed. "This was the first time Russia has been called directly to account since the Truman case in early 1946. The feeling here was that the current case brings a test between Russia and the western powers over expansion of Soviet influence. Refrains From Comment The United States delegation cautiously refrained from comment. However, on the basis of recent statements by the Truman and Secretary of State George C. Marshall, strongest support for a probe of the coup could be expected. In filing the charges yesterday, Chilean Delegate Hernan Santa Cruz emphasized that he had not intended to bring the case against any other delegate under strict orders from President Gabriel Gonzalez Videla in Santiago. This apparently was to forestall any charges that the move was dictated by the United States. Action by the government of Chile forced consideration of the affair reflected another human misery in General Trygve Lie had ruled out.

Speed Arms For Greeks

American Mission Now Hastening Deliveries; Rebels Build Airstrip

Athens, March 13.—(AP)—Maj. Gen. James Alward van Fleet, military chief in the American mission to aid Greece, said today AMAG is speeding up arms deliveries to the Greeks. He announced the arrival of 30,000 latest-type British rifles supplied by the mission. He said heavy Vickers machine-guns and Bren submachine-guns are expected from England soon and delivery has been hastened on American 15-millimeter pack Howitzers. Greek forces are fighting Communist-led guerrillas in some parts of the country. Evidence that a cache of arms was found in the region of Preshiko Jozero (Lake Prespa) where the Communist forces have been building an airstrip. The lake borders Greece, Albania and Yugoslavia.
