Washington, March 18.—(AP)—Secretary Forrestal said today the military high command wants "ceilings" on Army, Navy and Air Force manpower boosted.

He told the senators that recommendations will be submitted later for increases in authorized strength of the services.

Forrestal said he could not say just what increases will be asked, but he believes the Army will ask that its "ceilings" be boosted from 170,000 to 200,000 men.

**Films as Aid For Teachers**

**Green School PTA Is Informed of Modern Educational Methods**

Frank Sullivan, instructor of elementary education at the Williams State Teachers' College, spoke on "Using Films as a Teaching Aid" at the meeting of the Green School P. T. A. last evening.

Mr. Sullivan emphasized that sound moving pictures are only a part of the audio-visual aid program. It is also important for teachers to use slides, film strips, exhibits, radio programs and recording machines.

Motion pictures can present material which otherwise the pupils would never be able to see, for, as one maker of educational subjects puts it, the film "brings the world to the classroom." However, the teacher must be able to prepare the pupils so that they know what to look for when the movie is shown, otherwise much of the educational value is lost. Mr. Sullivan pointed out that the film should always fit into the subject being studied by the class and should serve to show merely for entertainment.

School is Complicated

As part of his talk, he showed a film which is used for teacher training to demonstrate the technique of using motion pictures in the classroom. He also complimented the Green School upon its possession of a movie projector which is one of the best made, saying that it's price would prove beneficial in enriching the classroom curriculum.

### The Week's Message

The fatal weakness of post-war, post-Roosevelt, post-Hull American foreign policy is once more its total support in President Truman's own message to Congress yesterday.

Once again, our national leadership is asking to take military measures which, although invoked in the name of defense, must take us closer to war unless they are accompanied by other policies which have a chance of building peace.

Once again, the capacity and willingness of our leadership to provide these necessary counter-measures is in doubt.

No American could have any hesitancy about approving any military measure of preparedness, no matter how extreme it might be and how responsive to peace-time American ideals, if he could have two companion assurances.

The first assurance should concern the purposes to which such military preparedness might be devoted.

The second assurance should concern this nation's willingness to maintain the moral capacity to make peace.

President Truman yesterday made specific requests for force, but gave nothing more than platitudes to those things which must accompany force in any truly peace-winning foreign policy.

No American objects to military firmness toward Russia. But every American must, or should, realize that such military firmness alone of itself cannot create peace, but inevitably creates war.

No thinking American can approve the specific military measures that President Truman requests until there is some valid assurance that American foreign policy is as intent upon being prepared for peace as it is intent upon being prepared for war.

The reason for such hesitancy is obvious. We have very little to gain from the display of use of military power alone. Our policy is merely negative at best, and can never, in itself, produce the security which is our goal. Therefore, although it may be a necessary ingredient in the American foreign policy today, it is worthless unless the other "necessary ingredients" are also present.

"But," it must be asked at this point, "did not President Truman yesterday enunciate precisely the kind of thing you claim is lacking?" Did he not say that "the door has never been closed, nor will it ever be closed, to the Soviet Union or any other nation which will genuinely cooperate in preserving the peace?"

To be sure, he did utter such words, which are the words which should be said at this juncture and the words which should be sincerely said of American foreign policy today.

But what did this same President Truman say a few weeks ago, when he was considering a diplomatic proposal by Stalin for a meeting with Stalin in Stockholm, and when he announced to the press that if he were ever to see Stalin again, he would have to be in Washington?

Was the door open then? And what specific proposal in the direction of peace does the President make now?

Another question must be asked: "Hasn't it already been sufficiently proved, did not the President himself clearly establish, that our past experiments with Russia has shown that it is impossible to negotiate, so that we have every right to feel ourselves free from any qualms of conscience?" Isn't it true, after all, that Russia is all black, and that we are all white? The answer to this question must be that it was precisely Mr. Truman's reading of recent history yesterday which made the value of his fine words about future peace efforts most questionable.

As any nation arrives at a position of crisis, it tends, perhaps inevitably, certainly very humanly, to progress towards an increasingly favorable version of its own conduct in the period which has led to that crisis. When it is in such a state, its own pronouncements represent an impossible trend of history. Worse, they represent a kind of moral jingoism upon which wars are built, and upon which peace can never be built. Mr. Truman's historical background yesterday was woven from this kind of moral jingoism.

"You know," said Mr. Truman, "of the sincere and patient attempts to take an initiative, to find a secure basis for peace through negotiation and agreement. Conference after conference has been held in different parts of the world."

What we said at these conferences has not always been beyond debate. Our proposals have not always, as he put it, been "in the name of peace." They have been proposals for international control of atomic energy, been proposals we should have found ourselves able and willing to accept and we in here.

"Most of the countries of the world have joined together in the United Nations in an attempt to build a world order based on law and not on force. Most of the members support the United Nations earnestly and honestly, and they are doing so as the Republic of the United States."

Against that Truman statement, it must be said that our belatedly adopted Truman Doctrine have been main pillars of American policy and they have been located outside the United Nations. Today American diplomacy is engaged in giving the United Nations the fatal stab from which it may never recover.

### Aiding China Seen Costly

Disagreement Over How Soon Military Aid Could Affect War

Shanghai, March 18—(AP)—Chinese and informed neutrals disagree on how soon and how sharply the American military aid in China's civil war—but most of them say it would take at least two billion dollars and two years more of fighting.

To assess opinion throughout the country, Associated Press correspondents interviewed foreigners and independent Chinese in Shanghai, Hong Kong, Nanking and Peking.

Here are their findings:

Shanghai—American military aid help can have little effect unless it is such as to be synchronized with economic aid—particularly towards stabilizing China's currency. Without such economic aid, American assistance might be nullified.

East Air Expansion Needed

Peiping sources estimated Chinese military needs would include vast expansion of her air transport service, to provide facilities to move as many as five divisions of troops quickly to danger spots. Victory could come within three months, they said. Even with every help, Nationalists probably could not hold on for long.

These sources reckon the cost in billions—and internationally, by the risk of making China an enemy of the United States, and other Spain, with a possibility of provoking or hastening World War II.

"Yet unless substantial help is given," they say, "the Nationalists will be gradually subjugated of all China by the Reds and inclusion of this country in the Soviet orbit."

These sources say any assistance approved today would be unlikely to produce important results on the military front for six months to a year, and that any lasting change would take twice that long. "The alternative is to help Chiang Kai-Shek can
